TOO POOR AND TOO BUSY.

Toronto despatches represent that Mr. Foster having been questioned as to the likelihood of his contesting Addington County, Ont. for the House of Commons, declared he would decline for several reasons, (a) that it is too warm for politics, (b) that he has not found a fortune in politics (c) that his duties as manager of a Trust company prevent him from reentering public life (d) and that it is the expense of the game that keeps him out.

These reasons do not all coincide with each other, and probably they are not the real ones in Mr. Foster's case. There is an impression in New Brunswick that Mr. Foster has reason to complain of the cold rather than the heat in his political career. A terrible rigid wave struck him in St. John last November. There is also a general belief that Mr. Foster has not found public life so unremunerative as he pretends. A cabinet salary of \$8,000 with perquisites for some dozen years, was not calculated to render a gentleman of Mr. Foster's economical habits a subject for the almshouse.

Mr. Foster's declining to allow his name to be used in connection with the Addington vacancy is no doubt due to the fact that it is rather an uncertain constituency and likely to defeat an outsider, especially if that outsider happened to be a Tory. Mr. Foster is looking for a snap. He has settled in Toronto, there are Tory hives in that city where no Liberal can hope to be elected, and Mr. Foster is looking forward to a nomination in one of these. In the meantime it is most apropos that he should be manager of a trust company. He and his fellow Tories have little else but trust to solace them at present in the political world.

In the meantime it is evident that the ex-finance minister has cut New Brunswick entirely, as he has cut prohibition and taken up with the Gothenburg system. At Mr. Foster's home at Apohaqui weeds occupy the place of his former potato patch. He finds no more pleasure in agriculture in this province when it cannot be prosecuted in connection with successful political farming. We fear the Hon. George Ueberschlag has deserted us for good, and we can scarcely restrain our tears.

DOING GOOD WORK.

Mr. Hazen and his party in the legislature last session condemned the government for keeping Mr. Hickman in England on immigration business, and opposed the voting of his salary, but the testimony of Senator Ellis, who has just returned from England, and does not often exert himself to say anything favorable to the government, declares in an interview with the Sun that the good work being done by Mr. Hickman, the local government's representative, is greatly increasing the interest felt by the English in this province. Senator Ellis adds that Mr. Hickman has the ear of many of the leading newspapers, and the result of his labors was evidenced by the great number of enquiries received concerning New Brunswick and by the increasing amount of local immigration.

Having thus delivered himself to the Sun interviewer, we may naturally expect from Senator Ellis in the Globe, an editorial article warmly commending the local government's immigration policy.

In the meantime if the Sun will turn over its files it will discover that the Ellis interview published in its columns, does not square with the opposition view of Mr. Hickman's labors and the government's action in keeping him in England on immigration business.

Either Mr. Hazen and his followers, or Senator Ellis is wrong. The opposition leader has never been in England to discover what Mr. Hickman is doing, while Senator Ellis is just fresh from the old country, where he evidently kept his eyes and ears open. If the Senator is able to convert Mr. Hazen and the Sun to his own views of the value of the work Mr. Hickman is performing, we may witness a combination of the Globe and the opposition organ commending the government for that which Mr. Hazen has condemned Premier Tweedie and his colleagues who will be able to feel some satisfaction in receiving words of approval from their political opponents, and Mr. Hazen, who very often gives expression to opinions second hand, may also be constrained to bear witness to the wisdom and practical results of the government's policy.

It is intimated that the maritime province Tories talk too much and do too little. This may be true, but in York the party seems to be saying no more than it is necessary and getting along fairly well with its work.—Sun. [Our contemporary, if its ears could reach to Fredericton, would discover that the Tories of York are talking very much and very decidedly, but it is about themselves, and what one faction says of the other is not at all complimentary. Some of the brethren are also making ugly faces at the Sun for its foolish interference in the family quarrel. The Sun puts its foot in it every time it attempts to discuss the situation in this constituency.]

Hon. A. G. Blair, and the other Canadian ministers in London met a distinguished company when they were entertained to luncheon Friday by Gilbert Parker M. P. the eminent Canadian novelist. The party included the Duke of Argyll, Lord Aberdeen, Lord Onslow, Lord Cranborne, the American Ambassador, Lord Strathcona, Hon. Geo. Wyndham, Hon. St. John Brodrick, Hon. C. T. Ritchie, Sir Charles Dilke, Sir Edward Carson, Lord Advocate Graham Murray and the Governor of Dongola. The cable says that "the Ministers make up a strong delegation, and their presence in London has strengthened the good relations between Canada and the Mother Country."

It is now officially known that the Governor General and Lady Minto will be here at 5 p. m. Tuesday July 30, and the city council committee should immediately set about making arrangements for the proper reception and entertainment of the distinguished visitors, and in this they should seek the cooperation of the citizens. Let a public meeting be called at once.

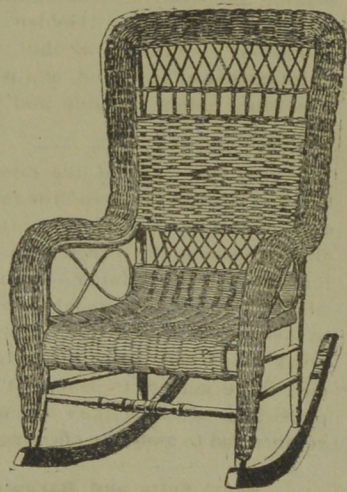
