Ottawa, Aug. 6.—In military circles it is believed, as the English court is again in deep mourning, there will be no reviews or military displays in connection with the visit of the royal party.

HALIFAX FIREMEN'S FESTIVAL. (Special to the Daily Herald)

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 6.—Owing to D. A. R. train being delayed, the firemen's procession did not start until one o'clock. It was an immense affair. The weather is very fine. The firemen go on a harbor excursion this afternoon.

The weather was fine, but the light was very bad, and no very heavy scores were made. The first competition for the Loggie Silver Cup was shot at Queen's ranges and won by Lieut. Howard Douglas, after he had shot off a tie with Mr. Clarke. Darkness set in before the second competition for the Whitehead Silver medal could be completed. In this match, which was shot at 500 and 600 yards, Mr Mack put on a score of 55, Capt Hawthorn 48 and Col Loggie 40.

In the evening the riflemen had their annual reunion and supper at Brown's Hotel. An excellent repast was served, and after justice had been done to it, there was a round of toasts and speeches. Eloquent and patriotic deliverances were made by Major Howe, Col. Loggie, Col. McLearn, Sgt Mack, and Capt. Hawthorn, the latter holding the gathering spellbound by his matchless eloquence. It was after midnight when the happy function came to an end. The city contingent enjoyed their drive down the Nashwaak Valley by moonlight very much, and reached home about four o'clock.

An Official Visit.

Messrs Fred Cook, grand president of the Sons of England, and J. M. Carter, grand secretary, paid an official visit to Islington Lodge last evening. At the conclusion of the meeting the visitors were entertained to supper in the Church hall.

For the Louisiana Purchase Exposition an effort is to be made for the removal of a huge tree, root and branch, by water more than 1,000 miles from the wildest section of Arkansas to Forest Park. The tree is a red oak 160 feet high and 12 feet in diameter at the base. It stands in the forest about two miles southeast of Tiffin, Ark., and one mile from the Bank of the Black river. The first thing to be accomplished is the construction of a double tramway with the tracks thirty feet apart from the tree to the river, where it will be floated and towed to St. Louis. It is estimated that this will be dug up by the roots instead of cut in the usual manner, and none of its branches will be trimmed, but will be put on exhibition just as it now stands in the woods.

They were in the water for over half an hour before any sign of help came in sight. Finally, they were picked up by the steamer Kenosha. The young ladies were almost completely exhausted when rescued.
