University Students Hold Their Annual Athletic Competition.

A NUMBER OF RECORDS WERE LOWERED.

Edward Ryan Wins the Championship Belt

A GOOD SHOWING MADE BY SEVERAL OTHER STUDENTS.

Owing to the rather threatening condition of the weather the annual sports of the University on the Athletic grounds yesterday afternoon were not as largely attended as in former years. There were probably about three hundred spectators in attendance, including a good sprinkling of ladies who occupied the grand stand. The number of entries was not large, nevertheless the several events were keenly contested, and a number of records were lowered. Edward Ryan a St. John student belonging to the sophomore class carried off the honors of the afternoon, lowering the records in the hop, step and jump and hurdle race, and capturing the beautiful silver belt awarded by the class of 1880 for the best general athlete. He was hard pressed by A. E. G. McKenzie of the junior class, who made an excellent showing all through and smashed his own record made last year in the hammer throwing competition. In the pole vault Weyman, a Kings County student, cleared 9 feet 7 1/2 inches, breaking the record held jointly by C. H. Elliot and T. E. Powers since 1894, and also the graduates' record held by C. E. McCullough.

Pole Vault—Weyman, 1st; Perley and Kerr a tie for second place. Distance 9 ft 7 1/2 in. All three competitors broke the former record of 9 ft 3 1/2 in, made by Elliott and Powers in '94.

Quarter mile run—Ryan, 1st; McKenzie 2nd; Grimmer, 3rd. Time, 58 1/2 sec. Record, 58 sec made by F P Barden '99.

Putting shot—McKenzie, 1st; Perley, 2nd; Howie, 3rd. Distance, 31 ft, 5 1/2 in. Record, 35 ft 3 in, made by J W Wetmore '87.

Hop, step and jump—Ryan, 1st; McKenzie, 2nd; Grimmer, 3rd. Distance, 42 ft 1/2 in. Former record 40 ft 6 in, made by McKenzie, '02.

High school quarter mile run—Brown (Moncton) 1st; Donald (Moncton) 2nd; Dewar (Normal school) 3rd. Time, 62 sec. Record, 59 1/2 sec, made by Ryan of St. John.

Running high jump—Kerr and Ryan tied at 9 ft 1 in, McKenzie, 3rd. Record, 5 ft 6 in, made by A N Vince, '98.

Half mile run—Ryan, 1st; Grimmer, 2nd; Bailey, 3rd. Time 2:23. Record, 2:16 1/2, made by Arnold, '98.

High School running broad jump—Christie (P N S) 1st; Brown (Moncton) 2nd; Donald (Moncton) 3rd. Distance, 17 ft, 4 1/2 in. Record, 18 ft, 10 1/2 in, made by Desbrisay, '98.

120 yards hurdle—Ryan, 1st; Kerr, 2nd; McKenzie, 3rd. Time 19 1/2 sec. Former record, 19 1/2 sec, made by Coll, '01.

Mile run—Grimmer, 1st; Bailey, 2nd; Bedell, 3rd. Time, 6 min, 7 1/2 sec. Record, 5 min, 10 1/2 sec, made by Peake, '92.

The first prize in each event was a gold medal and the other prizes were in kind. The winner of the mile race secured a gold medal presented by H F McLeod.

The following made up the list of officials who conducted the sports: Referee, Dr J W Bridges; judges, J D Fowler, R W McLellan, B R Armstrong; starter, J Stewart Campbell; timers, A A Sterling, H C Rutter, H F McLeod. The several events were pulled off without any unnecessary or tedious delays, and the best of good feeling prevailed.

At the conclusion of the sports the prizes were presented to the successful

competitors by Mrs (Dr) Davidson from the steps of the grand stand.

B R Armstrong, the South African hero of St John, who acted as judge, was given a most hearty reception from both students and spectators. Mr Armstrong is a graduate of the U. N. B., and was probably the best athlete of his day in the college. His record of 10 1/2 seconds made in the hundred yard dash was a fine performance and is likely to stand for some years. "Bay" has a host of warm friends in Fredericton, all of whom were pleased to see him looking so well after his trying experience.

MYSTERY CLEARED.

Remains of Editor Anslow of the Newcastle Advocate,

WHO WAS LOST IN THE WOODS NEARLY FOUR YEARS AGO,

Found by a Stream Driver— Identification Complete.

Newcastle, N. B., May 25.—A mystery of nearly four years was cleared up yesterday afternoon, when the remains of W C Anslow, editor of the Newcastle Advocate, lost Oct. 14, 1897, were found.

The remains of the editor were discovered eight miles from where he was lost and within half a mile of a house. A stream driver named Hubbard made the ghastly find and notified the people of his discovery.

A gun which the unfortunate hunter had when he was lost, a belt buckle, a watch and a pocket knife were found with the remains, and by these articles identification was made certain.

The editor and his son Charles went up country about 25 miles from Newcastle to hunt partridge. They got on a small island about 400 yards from a farmer's house when the son injured one of his feet and returned to the house to have his foot dressed, having told his father to remain where he was until his return. When the son returned to the scene in about half an hour he could find no trace of his father. After searching for several hours young Anslow reported at the farm house.

A number of the neighbors turned out and searched the woods on that and the following day without success. Later parties numbering nearly 100 scoured the woods but could not find any trace of the missing man.

A party went out early this morning to bring the remains to Newcastle.

When found the gun was lying beside the skeleton. When the unfortunate man was overcome evidently by exhaustion he was within 100 yards of the little rough-wet Miramichi, and with assistance in close proximity had he only known the direction and been able to traverse the distance.
