## GET AT HIM.

**Alds. Slipp and Rossborough Have a Little Tilt at the Council Meeting.**

**ECHOES FROM THE MINTO RECEPTION.**

**Proposed Aldermanic Junketing Trip Voted Down.**

**ADDRESS TO BE PRESENTED TO THE DUKE.**

**Mayor, City Clerk, and Alds. Moore and Everett to Perform the Duty.**

The special meeting of the city council last evening was attended by Mayor Crockett, and Alds. Slipp, Vanwart, Everett, Farrell, McNally, Clarke, Rossborough, Moore and Ryan.

The mayor read the notice calling the meeting and on motion of Ald Moore the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

Ald. Ryan moved, seconded by Ald. McNally, proposing a junketing expedition for several members of the council: "Whereas, The time has arrived when it has become necessary in the interest of the health and comfort of the citizens that the water supplied them through the city water works should be filtered so as to remove all bacteria and noxious substances.

"And Whereas, Before undertaking such a work the best possible information should be obtained from the experience of other cities to enable this council to deal intelligently with the matter and render them capable of deciding upon the best forcible means of purifying the water supply.

"Therefore Resolved, That this council do appoint a delegation to consist of the water superintendent and water committee to visit some of the cities who have adopted and are using the system of filtering their water supply, obtain all possible information on the subject, and report thereon back to this council."

During the brief discussion which followed, the opinion was expressed that if it was deemed necessary to make an examination of the filtration system in use in other places, the chairman and the superintendent would be delegation enough to send.

Upon the vote being taken the resolution was declared lost, only the mover and seconder supporting it.

A LOYAL ADDRESS.

The question of presenting an address to His Royal Highness the Duke of Cornwall and York, on the occasion of his visit to St John, was introduced by the mayor, and the council were unanimously of the opinion that such a step should be taken. After some discussion a resolution that the mayor and city clerk be a committee to prepare an address and submit it to the council for approval, was unanimously adopted.

Some difference of opinion existed among the aldermen as to whether or not two aldermen should be sent to St St John with the mayor and clerk to present to address.

Ald Slipp moved, seconded by Ald Ryan, that the address be presented by the mayor and clerk, to which an amendment was moved by Ald Moore, seconded by Ald Rossborough, that two aldermen accompany the delegation.

Alds Slipp and Farrell were opposed to more than two persons being sent and Alds Clarke, McNally, Rossborough and Moore took the opposite view.

Ald Slipp, in the course of his remarks, said something which apparently wounded the feelings of Ald Rossborough, and the latter in reply said that if sent to St. John he could assure Ald Slipp that he would not get his back up and act in a childish manner as Ald Slipp had done on the occasion of Lord Minto's visit. Ald Slipp, he said, had certainly acted in a manner not very becoming to him and had insulted the mayor and aldermen. He (Rossborough) was a member of that committee—

Ald Slipp—How did you get on?

Ald Rossborough—City Clerk, was I not appointed on the reception committee?

The City Clerk—I have not the minutes here but my impression is that you were.

The Mayor—This is all out of order.

Ald Rossborough—This is not the first time Ald Slipp has been slinging at me. Such conduct ill becomes him, for I was the party who put him where he is. I hope we won't have him representing Kings ward another year.

Ald Slipp said he could assure Ald Rossborough that he had nothing to do with his (Slipp's) getting a seat at the council board. He had been urged by a number of citizens to offer for the vacancy and had arrived at a decision without ever consulting Ald Rossborough.

The vote was then taken on Ald. Moore's amendment which was carried by a vote of 5 to 4.

Ald Rossborough made a motion the object of which was to limit the committee to a certain sum in regard to the cost of the address.

Ald Farrell and Clarke were opposed to curtailing the power of the committee, in this regard and their view prevailed. Ald. Rossborough's motion was not seconded.

On motion of Ald Farrell, it was resolved that the expenses of the delegation to St. John be borne by the city.

PAINT THE POLES.

Ald. McNally called attention to the unsightly condition of the electric poles, and moved that the electric light, telegraph and telephone companies be notified to have them painted in the following manner: Two coats of red paint for a distance of six feet above the ground, the cross-bars to be red, and the balance of the pole to be white.

Ald. Moore seconded the resolution.

The city clerk, in reply to a question, said he was not certain that the law applied to the telegraph companies, but would look the matter up.

The resolution was adopted without discussion.

REST FOR THE WEARY.

Ald McNally thought in view of the approaching exhibition, it was desirable that the council have a number of seats placed in public places about the city for the use of citizens and strangers. He thought that permission might be obtained to have some placed in front of the post office, and also on the common in front of the parliament building and moved a resolution to that effect.

Ald Rossborough approved of the idea and told about assisting Ald Farrell to put down seats on Regent street some years ago, prior to the arrival of a Hibernian excursion from St. John.

Ald Farrell said that the military authorities had control of the land in front of the post office, and a short time ago had removed the wooden benches placed there by the city. He (Farrell) had asked Col. Dunbar for permission to replace them but had been refused. The Colonel stated however, that he would have no objection to the benches being replaced by neat iron seats.

After some further discussion the resolution was put and carried.

Ald McNally wanted to make a report for the sub-road committee, but was informed that it could not properly come up at a special meeting.

ROADS AND STREETS.

Ald Farrell reported that the supply of stone for street purposes had become exhausted, and there was still some work on Brunswick street to be done, and about 100 tons additional would be required.

Ald Moore, moved, seconded by Ald Rossborough that authority be given the road committee to purchase one hundred tons of gravel or thereabouts for street purposes.

Ald McNally thought that Carleton street from Queen street to the bridge was badly in need of repairs, and he thought that sufficient stone should be procured for the purpose.

Ald Moore's motion was amended accordingly and carried unanimously.

Ald Farrell called attention to the dilapidated condition of the sidewalk near Hale & Murchie's mill, and stated that the roadmaster thought it advisable to have it removed altogether.

A motion by Ald. McNally that the plank sidewalks at the Victoria mills and also at Grant's hill, be removed and replaced with gravel, was carried.

Ald. Farrell stated that the roadmaster did not consider the proposal to asphalt the gutter on Queen street as a practical one, and wanted to once more hear from

the council on the subject. If the council still wanted the work done, he (Farrell) would so instruct the roadmaster and insist on his going ahead with it.

Ald VanWart thought that some importance should be attached to the roadmaster's opinion, and suggested that one block be asphalted as an experiment.

Ald Moore had every faith in asphalt gutters and wanted one laid down on the business portion of Queen street. He thought the members of the council knew as much about the matter as did the roadmaster. He pointed out that the gutter on Phoenix Square had given every satisfaction.

Ald McNally thought that the roadmaster should be instructed to carry out the orders of the council.

Ald Farrell said that if the gutters were asphalted, about ten additional barrels of asphalt would be required.

A motion by Ald. Slipp that the chairman of the roads and streets be instructed to procure ten barrels of asphalt was carried.

A motion by Ald. Moore that the asphalt be prepared on the city lot near the C. P. R. station, was carried.

Ald McNally moved that the roadmaster be authorized to purchase 200 tons of Bellisle gravel, not to exceed 50 cents a ton, and 200 tons of river gravel not to exceed 40 cents per ton, for use on the city streets. He explained that the Bellisle gravel was to be used on George street and the other on government lane and elsewhere.

Ald. Farrell was at a loss to know how it was that the sub-road committee had failed at the outset to take the roadmaster and chairman of the road committee into their confidence. He contended that one outcome of the work of the sub road committee was that some of the city streets were at present in the most ridiculous condition that they had been in for fifteen years. On George street where it had been plowed up, there was now about three inches of mud, and it would be a great deal worse when the fall rains came on. It was now evident to Ald. McNally that a mistake had been made, and he gave him credit for trying to make amends.

Ald Slipp complained that the work done on government lane was very unsatisfactory. There was altogether too much sand and dust in it, and he would oppose making any further purchase of gravel unless assured that a better quality could be procured.

Ald McNally spoke at some length in defence of the work done by the sub-road committee and contended that better work was being done on the streets this season than ever before. He ridiculed the statement by Ald Farrell that only \$16 worth of work had been done in Carleton Ward this year. The alderman seemed to forget that in addition to the work done on Needham street, that a block on Kingstreet had been macadamized and repair work had also been done on Brunswick street.

After some further discussion, Ald McNally's motion was put to the meeting and carried.

The mayor said he would remind the sub-road committee that they were getting near the end of the appropriation.

On motion of Ald Moore, council adjourned without taking up the back drainage question.
