IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Boers Threaten to Invade Cape Colony in Force.

LAST INCURSION WAS MADE BY A PATROL.

A Peace Commission Being Formed at Bloemfontein.

INVALIDED CANADIANS LANDED AT HALIFAX BY THE CARTHAGENIAN.

Cape Town, Jan. 7.—At a meeting of Afrikaner members of the Cape parliament today, it was resolved to send Messrs J. X. Merriman, former treasurer of Cape Colony, J. W. Sauer, former commissioner of public works, and J. H. Holmeyer to England to represent the state of affairs in South Africa to the government, parliament and people of Great Britain.

General Brabant has arrived here to complete the organization of the Colonial forces.

It is reported that 1,500 Boers are nearing the town of Sutherland and that other parties are close upon Richmond.

The invaders reached Calvinia and are expected at Clanwilliam within a few days.

Scouts report that the Boer commandos under Dalrey and Steinkamp, in the Bufferspoort district, number 5,000.

Martial law has been proclaimed in the districts of Calvinia, Clanwilliam, Piquetberg, Talbagh, Paarl and Stellenbosch.

Cape Town, Jan. 7.—The editor of the Out Land, the principal Afrikaner newspaper here, has been arrested on the charge of seditious libel.

Berlin, January 7.—Christian De Wet, nephew of the Boer general, is making speeches in South Germany in behalf of the Boer cause and arousing great sympathy.

The meetings which he addresses adopt resolutions protesting vigorously against the overthrow of the two republics, the resolutions being telegraphed to Count Von Buelow and Mr. Kruger.

Piquetberg Road, Cape Colony, Jan. 7.—The Boers boast that their present incursion is only a big patrol preparatory to an invasion in force by Gen. De Wet.

The latter's influence over the Dutch is so enormous that there is no doubt his actual presence would result in a general rising.

Bloemfontein, Jan. 7.—It is reported that an influential peace commission is being formed here to interview General De Wet, Mr. Steyn and other leaders, to explain Lord Kitchener's terms and to endeavor to induce them to yield.

Toronto, Jan. 7.—The Telegram's special cable from London says: The report current in Canada that four Canadians had been awarded the Victoria Cross for distinguished bravery in South Africa does not receive confirmation here.

The military secretary, at the war office says that no award has been made to the Canadians since Pie Lindey Richardson was decorated several months ago.

The foundation for the story that four Canadians were to receive the Victoria Cross was received at Quebec. It is stated Lieut. R. E. W. Turner, of Quebec, Lieut. H. Z. C. Cockburn, of Toronto, Sergt. E. J. Holland, of Ottawa, and Pte. W. A. Hensley, of the Halimand Rifles, had been recommended for decoration for heroic deeds on the battlefield.
