Interesting Occurrences

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

The Czar of Russia will witness the close of the French grand manoeuvres at Rhems.

The same day that R C Kimber, gentleman usher of the black rod, died at Ottawa, his father died in Paris, France.

A lad named Murphy was nearly drowned at Brantford, Ont, while trying to see how long he could stay under water.

The ladies of the Presbyterian church, St Andrews, experienced an unprecedented success at their sale and tea on Thursday last. The total receipts amounted to \$133.

A pair of twin calves owned by Daniel Dempsey, St Stephen, are attracting a great deal of admiration. They are thoroughbred Jerseys, standard and registered, and are very handsome youngsters.

Chief Census Commissioner Blue states that he has revised the count for St. John, and finds it 40,711, as given in the census bulletin, and not 40,829, as claimed by the census commissioner of St. John.

London "Truth" says the late Dowager Empress Frederick recently destroyed her journals and correspondence with Queen Victoria to prevent the leakage of such state secrets as were contained therein.

H Kelsey Hall, of Peterboro, Ont., one of the best known stamp and coin collectors in the trade, was robbed of upwards of \$2,000 worth of stamps and old coins while visiting the Buffalo Exposition Wednesday.

A fifteen foot seam of coal has been discovered at Upper Muquodobit, Halifax county, N. S., on the line of the projected Muquodobit railway. There is great excitement in the neighborhood and also in commercial circles as the discovery means a new colliery close to Halifax.

The British barge Linwood, Captain Douglas, from Manila, November 14, for New York, has been posted at Lloyds as missing. The Linwood hailed from Maitland, N S, where she was built in 1887. She registered 1,196 tons. She was owned by Alex Roy & Company. She has never been heard of since she sailed.

Rev John Read, D. D., has concluded his vacation and for the past two Sundays, has favored the Methodist congregation at St. Stephen, with forcible sermons full of sound common sense. The parsonage has been newly painted and a new ell erected. The repairs will be completed at an early date, after which Dr. Read will be joined by his wife and daughter.

There passed into rest August 9th, Archibald Stinson, a native of Stanley, York county, but for upwards of forty years, a resident of White Head, Grand Manan. The death occurred at Nantucket Island, where Mr Stinson has resided for several years. Deceased was in his 69th year, and leaves a widow, three daughters and an adopted son. The remains were taken to White Head for burial.

The spiritual affairs of all Saints' church, St. Andrews, are at present in charge of Rev. Dean Sills, of Portland, Me. A successor to the late Canon Ketchum will doubtless be named shortly. The congregation have six months in which to agree upon a rector. If they fail to agree in that time then it becomes the duty of the Bishop to fill the vacancy. The names of several clergymen are being discussed as possible candidates for the rectorship.

In a despatch dated July 8, and detailing the conditions of affairs at the front at that time, Lord Kitchener says: "There are no more than 13,500 Boers now under arms. Although they are not able longer to undertake extensive operations, their apparently inexhaustible supplies of food enables them to maintain an obstinate resistance without retaining anything or defending the smallest portion of this vast country." Since the despatch was written the losses of the Boers have brought their forces down to about 11,000.

On Monday a herd of steers was taken over from Longueuil in the ferry to Montreal, and while passing along Notre Dame street en route to the abattoir, one of them left the funeral and went into a little cigar and taffy shop. When the drover got back to seek his straying one he found him causing all that excitement peculiar to the bull in a china shop. The proprietor of the shop with a club, and his wife, armed with a hammer, assailed the forward end of the animal, while the drover corkscrewed the tail at the back end, and by their combined efforts managed to get the youthful cow's son to retire and proceed to his grave in a decent and orderly manner.

Dr Louis Knop, aged 40, a practising physician of St Louis, has separated himself from his wife and four children, and will become isolated from the world to nurse Dong Gong, a Chinese leper, who was found there two weeks ago. The doctor, who is a graduate of a Detroit medical college, took final leave of his family Wednesday. Dr Knop and his patient will live in a three room frame house, new being built by the city authorities at quarantine until the necessity for his services shall have ended. Dr Knop will take his library to the quarantine and devote the greater part of his time to the study of leprosy. There were five other applicants for the position.

Karl M. Creelman, the young Nova Scotian, touring the world a-wheel, will reach St. John, N B., on or about August 27 on the S S Maritima from Manchester. From St John he will wheel to Truro, his home. Creelman has done 14,910 miles a-wheel. He first crossed Canada, proceeded to Australia, thence to India, taking ship to Egypt, and going from the land of the Pharaohs to Great Britain, where he made his tour a-wheel as well as one of Ireland. He crossed to the continent and wheeled through Holland and part of Germany and then returned to England, embarking for Canada on August 15th. During his trip Creelman wore out four sets of tires and three chains; ten pairs of boots and four suits of clothing. The time consumed has been about a year and a half.

An accident on the C P R occurred early on Monday morning, when the Imperial Limited, No 1, ran into a tree near Hope, B C, and was derailed. Driver P Righter, had one of his legs broken in two places, and Alex. Allen, the mail clerk, had his head badly cut. The train was going at full speed when Engineer Righter suddenly noticed an obstruction on the track a short distance ahead. He reversed the lever but was unable to lessen the speed of the train to any extent, and the engine crashed into an immense tree and then rolled over. The baggage car, mail car and colonists were also ditched, as was a car of cotton which had been shipped by the express for the Orient. The baggage car and the car containing the cotton were completely wrecked, while the engine was also very badly damaged.

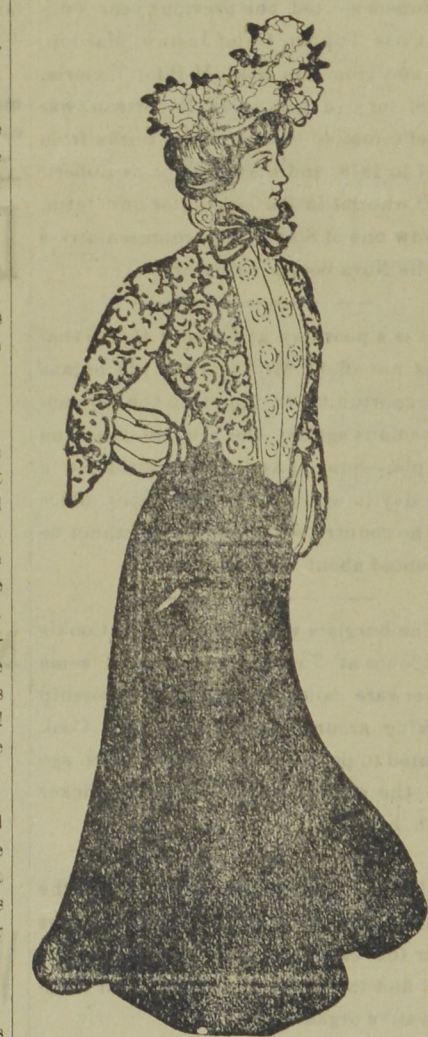

SHIRT WAISTS.

Their Number Is Legion and Their Place Assured.

Shirt waists have become a subject which is always in season. The new models show more variations from former types, chiefly in respect to the sleeves. These are rather scant, and instead of having a wide, stiff cuff like a man's shirt are gathered into a nar-

row band scarcely two inches broad, which buttons upon itself with a point and may or may not be stiffly starched. The sleeve is made a little fuller at the wrist than elsewhere.
