MR. RICHARDSON'S POSITION.

The Conservative newspapers these days, are great friends of Mr Richardson of Winnipeg, who, elected to parliament in 1896 in Lisgar, as a Liberal, thought he was about to become a great Liberal leader, and a dictator of western affairs. Mr Sifton at that time was in the Manitoba government, and Mr Richardson like some others nearer home, thought he was especially designed for a cabinet position. He assumed to be leader of the western Liberal contingent, and when Sir Wilfrid Laurier in forming the government passed over the member for Lisgar and called Mr. Sifton to the administration. Mr. Richardson took mortal offence, and while assuming an independent attitude became a bitter opponent of the government. He professed to be horrified that the Liberals had not carried out their platform of 1893, and stormed and railed against the government, giving great comfort to the opposition. This of course, would never have happened had Mr. Richardson been given a cabinet position, nor would he now be in the depths of political despair, without a seat in parliament, and unlikely to secure one.

When Mr. Richardson appealed for reelection last November, the Conservatives felt so kindly disposed towards him for the services he had rendered them in Parliament for four years, that they did not put up a candidate to oppose him in Lisgar. He got the straight Conservative vote which with a personal following secured his election, but it appears from the records of the election court by which Mr. Richardson was unseated, that extensive corruption was practised by his friends.

Mr Richardson blames the Liberals for working up evidence against him, and the loss of his seat has not improved his temper towards the government. In an open letter to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Richardson is most abusive of the premier, charging him with all manner of political crimes, to which Sir Wilfrid replies in quite vigorous language showing that a man who like Mr. Richardson preached political purity, should have been above accepting a seat in Parliament secured by corrupt means.

From the temper of Mr Richardson's open letter it is quite evident that he despairs of being re-elected, and he possibly finds some satisfaction in hurling a great mass of violent language at the Premier and the Liberal party. This is, of course, peculiarly pleasing to the government's opponents, but it is not likely that Mr Richardson's role of martyr will excite any great amount of sympathy or compassion in the political party with which he formally acted, and in which he might still occupy a prominent place, had he not come to the conclusion that he was "it," and strong enough to bend the party to his own will.

Mr Richardson's present position is a warning to the politician who develops swelled head, and thinks he can assume the position of dictator when his position and talents only warrant him in becoming a follower and not a leader.

It may be added that the ex-member for Lisgar is editor of the Winnipeg Tribune, which is quite as violent in its denunciation of the government as Mr. Richardson is in his open letter to the Premier, and that it assumed that position after its editor had been overlooked in the cabinet organization, and Mr. Sifton had adopted the Winnipeg Free Press as the organ of the government in the West.

A NEWSPAPER'S DUTY.

The late Mr. Black's newspaper affects to be very much concerned because, as it alleges, the Herald has attacked the personal character of some of its friends who are financial wrecks. The Herald is not aware that it has made any such attacks. It has simply stated the facts as a matter of news, and if they reflected on the honor of the persons concerned surely the Herald is not to blame. When men shout for honesty and purity in public affairs, and condemn their political opponents for the same game they are playing themselves, it is in the line of a newspaper's duty to point out that those who seek to cast a mote out of their neighbor's eye, should first remove the beam from their own.

The Herald certainly has noted the hypocrisy of some of the men who supported Mr McLeod in the last campaign in which they elevated themselves to pedestals of honesty and purity, while they looked down in assumed scorn at their opponents, and we have endeavored to impress the lesson that persons taking such a position should themselves be clean. Later events revealed quite the contrary condition, and the public conscience was shocked by the exposures that followed.

Of course the late Mr Black's newspaper never attacked a man in financial difficulties, it never hurled charges of dishonesty and criminality against friends of the Liberal party. Its course has been straightforward, its references to persons in difficulty most refined and delicate, and its director never having had any financial or other troubles little or big, it is in a position to mount the pedestal of truth and honesty from which some of its friends were so unceremoniously knocked, and continue their exhortations in the interest of honor, integrity and all the other virtues.

A VETERAN'S DEATH.

A veteran Nova Scotian Liberal politician, Hon Robert Robertson, popularly known as Honest Bob, is dead at his home Barrington Head, Shelburne county. The deceased was first elected to the Nova Scotia legislature in 1855, sat continuously in that body until 1878, was one of Joseph Howe's stalwart supporters and helped him to overturn the Johnston Tory government in 1860. Of the 55 members elected the previous year only Sir Chas Tupper, Chief Justice Macdonald and Hon Wm Ross, M P for Victoria, N S, survive him. Mr Robertson was chief commissioner of public works from 1867 to 1878, and his son Thomas Robertson, who sat in Parliament for one term, is now one of Shelburne's representatives in the Nova Scotia legislature.

Discord in a Brooklyn Flat House Because 12 Husbands Admire Pretty Josephine Jerome.

New York, Aug. 22.—Twelve wives are at odds with the daughter of widow Jerome. Twelve husbands declare that Josephine Jerome is the "sunshine of the block." It is on account of this difference between husbands and wives that discord prevails among the married couples in the flat house at 477 Hudson av., Brooklyn.

Mrs. Nellie Jerome moved into the house a week ago with her pretty daughter and a son who supports them. She has been asked to vacate the apartment by agent Cheeseborough in response to a petition from the 12 wives.

They aver that their husbands are becoming too fond of the widow's daughter. Josephine, the innocent cause of trouble in so many households, is 17. She is dimpled and her blue eyes sparkle and her hair is plaited in two heavy braids. Her beauty appealed to the 12 husbands from the first day they saw her.

A good wife on the ground floor was the first to observe a greeting from her husband to Josephine. She was indignant. Then a wife on the second charged her husband with a like pleantry. Thus it continued until 12 hands waved adieu to the widow's daughter and 12 wives became jealous.

The result was that all believed their domestic happiness in jeopardy and joined in an appeal to landlord, Cheeseborough. The agent watched the husbands and easily detected the admiration which they made no effort to conceal. Cheeseborough reported to the 12 wives that their husbands were at fault and not Josephine. The women insisted nevertheless that Mrs Jerome be dispossessed, and notice was served upon her.

NOTICE

—TO—
Water Consumers.

The attention of water consumers is called to section 12 of the Water Bye Laws as follows:

12. Persons removing from any premises who have paid full rates in advance, will be entitled to an allowance for the time unexpired, provided written notice is given at the Superintendent's Office at the time of such removal.

Persons wishing to discontinue the use of water must give written notice thereof at the Office previous to the expiration of the time for which payment has been made, otherwise they will be liable for the rent for the ensuing six months.

Owing to the increasing tendency of water consumers to ignore the above Bye Law, it will be strictly enforced in future.
