INSECTS CARE FOR YOUNG.

Provisions Made for Food Supply During
the Winter Season—Nature's
Wonderful Works.

Katydid, grasshoppers and locusts, crickets and beetles, like the poor fly, are killed by the frost. Millions of eggs had been hidden, however, in the ground, or in the barks of trees to furnish the supply of next year. All of these are outdoors, and the balmy winter is especially grateful. Beetles exhibit a wonderful instinct in caring for their helpless young. Among certain species a ball of suitable material for food is made, and the eggs are rolled into it, providing in the spring something to eat near at hand for the voracious appetite that characterizes the beetle from the start, as the farmers know very well. The burying or sexton beetles deposit their eggs in the bodies of dead birds or field mice. The bodies and eggs are carefully buried and the newly-hatched beetle, as a result of this maternal forethought, finds a store of food waiting him when in the spring the sun stirs the budding life and by its strange alchemy bids it come forth. Butterflies and moths are victims of the first frost. Both lay eggs in a suitable feeding ground during the early summer. The hatched larva or caterpillar eats voraciously, gorging itself until it can eat no more. Finally it spins a cocoon and makes ready for winter. Through the cold season it apparently slumbers in its snug quarters, nourished by the plentiful store of food it accumulated when a caterpillar. At the proper time it emerges as a gorgeous butterfly, ready to be the element of beauty it ever is among the summer fields.

Spiders store away no food supply for the winter. Quantities of eggs are laid and are carefully stored away in velvety cobweb sacks, impervious to any but the most severe weather, and eminently snug when there has been no excessive cold.

Hon. Sydney Fisher and Danish Dairies.

The Hon. Sydney Fisher's object in coming to this country on his present visit is to open the eyes—if such a thing be possible—of the English importers of foodstuffs, says the London correspondent of The Toronto Telegram. But there are other countries besides Canada that are trying the same thing, and to a certain extent they seem to have succeeded better than Canada.

Some English farmers have just returned from Denmark, where they have been on a tour inspecting Danish dairies. The co-operative dairy, Hørle, said to be the largest in the world, they were particularly impressed with. This dairy is owned by forty Danish farmers, who send nearly 100,000 pounds of butter for treatment daily.

The co-operative movement in Denmark at the last return shows a total of 837 societies, with 130,331 members, rather good showing, considering that the whole population of Denmark is only half that of London. Last year alone their exports in pigs, bacon, butter and eggs amounted to over £10,000,000, the whole of the profits going into the farmers' hands.

All milk must, by law, be heated to 180 Fahr. before leaving the dairies. All cattle are killed under the eye of veterinarians, the meat being afterwards stamped according to quality, so that the purchaser knows exactly what he is paying for, and, lastly, the excursionists were surprised to receive practical demonstrations at the Royal Veterinary College that many diseases of horses for which in this country slaughter is considered the only course, are there successfully treated and cured.

Canada's Oats Much Admired.

Mr. W. M. Hay, of the Ottawa Central Experimental Farm, has returned from Glasgow, where he has been looking after a portion of Canada's exhibit. Contrary to the reports sent out, all the exhibits at the Glasgow Exposition are not ready to be shown to visitors. The Russians, for instance, have not yet opened their building to the public. Canada's agricultural exhibit is said to be the finest the British public has ever seen. One of the features of the exhibit is an octagonal stand 6½ feet in circumference and 35 feet high, covered with Canadian grain. About the bottom of the stand, which is called "Canada's Agricultural Trophy," large sheaves have been arranged. The stand is covered with red cloth, and against this the grain shows to great advantage. The Scotch people, who produce the best oats in the world, were surprised at the excellent Canadian oats displayed, and Mr. Hay says one miller asked where he could buy 100,000 bushels annually of Banner oats, such as were exhibited in the Canadian section. Canada has 10,000 samples of grain on exhibition. The hybrid grains developed at the Central Experimental Farm attracted a great deal of attention. These grains were secured by crossing different kinds of grain, and the result was an improved variety. The Canadian exhibits, Mr. Hay says, get plenty of attention, and are helping the British public to realize what the Dominion can do.

Cummings on Canada.

A recent issue of The Natal Advertiser of Durban contains an interview with Mr. Cummings of Brockville, the Canadian Trade Commissioner to South Africa. After describing the fiscal and economic position of Canada, Mr. Cummings observed: "In addition to manufactured goods we have for disposal enormous stocks of healthy, vigorous cattle, that I believe would be very useful to restock South Africa with after the war. Good cows can be bought in Canada for from £8 to £10. Canadian cattle are being taken to the United States for breeding purposes. I think I may safely say that Canada has the most highly developed cows for milking purposes on the continent of America. On arriving in Durban I found the merchants here handling Canadian cheese and bacon; also Canadian lumber bought in New York and England. That being so, the advantage of buying in Canada will be apparent."

The Governor-General's Salary.

The British North America Act, constituting the Dominion of Canada, provides that "unless altered by the Parliament of Canada, the salary of the Governor-General shall be ten thousand pounds sterling." This amount has been paid yearly since 1867.
