TYPHOID IN THE MILK.

Quebec, Aug. 23.—Illustrative of the danger resulting from infected milk, Dr. Goseel in this city and a servant in his household are both almost hopelessly ill with typhoid fever, and 14 cases of the same disease have developed themselves amongst the pupils of the Levis convent.

These cases are traced to the use of milk supplied by the Levis milkmen.

MANITOBA FROST SCARE.

Winnipeg, Aug. 23.—There was a frost scare last night. It was the coolest night of the season, and people were afraid that the crops would be damaged, but the thermometer only went down to 34, and there are no unfavorable reports from provincial points today.

Manager Thompson of the Ogilvie Milling Co., thinks that if the present conditions continue the yield of wheat will exceed fifty million bushels, or an average of 23 bushels per acre. He estimates that two-thirds of the wheat is cut.

NIPPED IN THE BUD.

Ottawa, August 23.—There was an interesting scene at the Union station yesterday, when a proposed elopement between a married man and a married woman was nipped in the bud by the sagacity of the latter's husband. The couple had procured tickets for the West, and were waiting for the arrival of the Winnipeg train, when suddenly the husband of the erring woman, accompanied by the sister of the erring man's wife, appeared, and, after a wordy war, carried off the weeping woman, who was fully fifty years of age, back to her husband and family.

THE PRESS VISITORS

Given a Hearty Reception at Truro.

Truro, Aug. 23.—The Canadian Press Association arrived at four o'clock yesterday afternoon in a special. They were met at the station by a deputation from the board of trade and a large number of representative men of Truro. They were escorted to car-

riages, of which there were thirty, large and small, in waiting, and driven to Victoria Park, where they spent an hour viewing the beautiful scenery. They were then driven around the suburbs, through the principal streets of the town, disembarcking en route at C. M. Blanchard's, Bible Hill, for lunch. The ladies and gentlemen of the party were presented with handsome bouquets by the ladies of the town. Souvenirs of different kinds were also among the gifts. A large number of flags and decorations were displayed along the route. They left for Halifax at eight-thirty last night.

AN IMPROVED SERVICE.

New Electric Lights Elicit Much Favorable Comment.

The new dynamo lately installed at the electric light station by the Canadian General Electric Company was given a trial last evening, and the result exceeded the most sanguine expectation. A large number of the new street lamps were also used for the first time, and the improvement on the old ones was very marked. The new lamp, which is fitted with a double globe, and is of the most modern design, gives forth a brilliant light of a bluish tinge. The carbon burns with remarkable steadiness, and there is an entire absence of that pounding noise, which was such an annoying feature of the old lamps.

As above stated the new dynamo was given its first trial last evening, and was not altogether in perfect working order. Some slight alterations are still to be made, and even better results are expected than were obtained last evening. All the old lamps have been replaced by new ones, and the light will be turned on again this evening.

The city council has ordered new lamps to be placed in front of St. Dunstan's church on Brunswick street, and on the corner of Smythe street and Victoria Lane. These will probably be placed in position in the course of a few days.

Tourist Dropped Dead.

Halifax, Aug. 23.—One of the passengers who arrived at Point Tupper on the Sydney express yesterday, dropped dead on the platform while walking from the train to the steamer. He had no companion and therefore it was impossible to identify him. 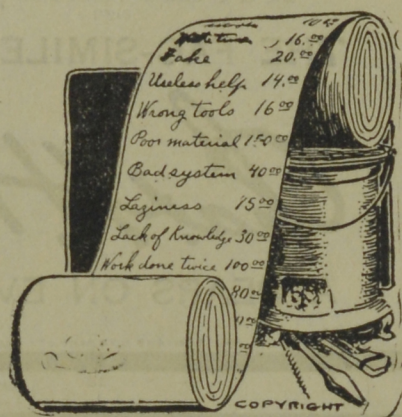
