ECHOES OF THE EXHIBITION.

The gratifying success which attended the provincial exhibition held in this city, is peculiarly pleasing to the Herald, which steadily advocated the holding of the show, and encouraged its promoters to go ahead when other local papers were writing down the enterprise, and throwing obstacles in the way of the gentlemen who had the project in hand.

The Herald alone of the Fredericton newspapers backed up the local members in the stiff fight they had against the efforts of St. John to secure the government grant, and it was the Herald too that kept driving at the city council until that body voted a substantial sum for the exhibition.

The service which the Herald was able to render the exhibition promoters in these and other respects, was freely and voluntarily performed, and we say that it affords us peculiar pleasure that the enterprise has been such an unqualified success, fully justifying the expenditure made to carry it through, bringing a large profit to almost every line of business in the city, and arousing a healthy, stimulating spirit of emulation among the competitors in the various departments of the show.

The result of the exhibition demonstrate that Fredericton can handle a provincial show successfully; that the people of New Brunswick and the neighboring state of Maine appreciated the opportunity of attending an exhibition in the capital of New Brunswick, and that exhibitors as well as spectators derived profit as well as pleasure from their attendance.

The variety and extent of the exhibits, the commodious and convenient buildings, the excellent treatment extended to exhibitors by the management, the smoothness with which the exhibition machinery ran, were all causes contributing to the success of the big show, but the primary organization, the excellent widespread advertising it got, were powerful influences in securing a fine exhibit and a large attendance of people.

It is sometimes difficult to properly place the credit for the success attending public functions, but the Herald feels that it can, without wounding anybody's feelings, acknowledge the valuable service rendered by the local members, Messrs Campbell, Allen, Whithead and Thompson, F. B. Edgecombe, C. Fred Chestnut, F. S. Hilyard, M. Tennant, Geo. Y. Dibble, William McKay, Donald McCatherine, Secretary Murray, Assistant Sec'y Jago, Treasurer D. L. Babbitt and Assistant Treasurer Prof. Scott.

The exhibition association it is hoped will have practically a clean sheet when the financial matters are adjusted, and having the building in good shape, will no doubt be prepared to hold another show, say in two years from this time and the experience of the exhibition just closed will be invaluable for the future.

The Herald very heartily congratulates all the gentlemen concerned on the great success which has crowned their efforts. The city as well as the province owes them a deep debt of gratitude for their unceasing, unwaried efforts to make the exhibition a credit to New Brunswick, as it undoubtedly was.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT.

A Washington despatch tells us that President Roosevelt traversed several streets of that city, walking unattended and unprotected. It may be taken for granted however, that "Teddy" had

something up his sleeve in the shape of a shooting iron, and any anarchist would have had to get in lively work to draw a bead on the Rough Rider before the latter produced his weapon. The President is a brave man, who has faced Spanish bullets and shot mountain lions, and given a fair chance. is well able to take care of himself. While the people like to get as close as possible to the president and see him mingle freely with them at public gatherings, far too much opportunity is given for the enactment of such tragedies as stained Buffalo, and lost to the nation a much revered ruler.

It is presumed that the gentlemen who were invested with Imperial honors at Ottawa by the Duke of York, on behalf of his father the King, will not be the only Canadians receiving such distinction during the visit of His Royal Highness to this country. Only Quebec and Ontario are represented in the list, and the west and maritime provinces will certainly not be neglected. His Majesty has recognized the bench, the gubernatorial office, education, the civil and civic services and the C. P. R., and it naturally follows that gentlemen representing these important interests in other parts of Canada, will not be overlooked.

A notable conversion to Liberalism in Nova Scotia is Col. W. M. Blair, ex-M. P. P., well known in this province as an eminent authority on agriculture. Col. Blair represented Colchester for a dozen years in the legislature as a red hot Conservative, but has now seen the error of his ways, and is stumping Colchester for Pears and Lawrence, the Liberal candidates. He is an effective platform speaker, and enjoys a large degree of popularity.

The Nova Scotia election campaign is growing hot. Conservative candidates in Lunenburg, having declared in their card, that the Halifax Chronicle, is the paid organ of the Dominion Coal Company, our enterprising contemporary pronounces the charge an absolute falsehood, and suggests that if they do not take it back it will be compelled "to brand them both publicly as cads and liars."

It looks as if the Duke will have to charter a special steamship to transport to England the addresses he is receiving in Canada. No less than nineteen were launched at him Friday at Ottawa.

The Sun is worrying lest Hon. H. R. Emmerson may not become a cabinet minister. The Sun is assured that the Westmorland M. P. is not losing any sleep over the matter.

It is reported that Premier Parent of Quebec, refused the honor of knighthood, declaring that he has always been a democrat and will remain one.

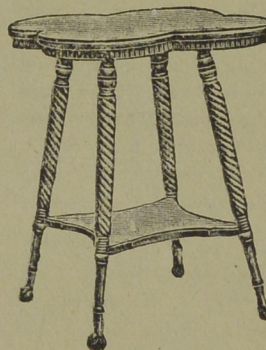
