## REPUDIATION COMPLETE.

The local Tory organ's analysis of the personnel of the convention that nominated Mr. McLeod for Parliament last week, more than corroborates all that the Herald has said of the non-representative, irresponsible character of that gathering, and proclaims to the electorate of York, that the Tory party in this constituency is not called upon to father Mr. McLeod and his candidature. As we have also pointed out, Mr. McLeod, recognizing that he has not the countenance and backing of the Tory party, declared at the convention that he did not follow its leaders; they could go their way and he would go his. These circumstances and declarations therefore place Mr. McLeod outside of the Tory party and should preclude the possibility of any organized effort of that party to secure his election. It is a well known fact that without the assistance of that party in the last election, Mr. McLeod would have cut a very sorry figure, and what he expects will take the place of it in the approaching contest, is probably not very clear, even to Mr. McLeod himself. The doubts which the Sun expresses as to the passive attitude the party here displays towards Mr. McLeod, serve only to amuse those who know the real condition of affairs, and are a poor substitute for the active support rendered Mr. McLeod last November.

The fact is, the leading Conservatives of York have no lot nor part in Mr. McLeod's candidature, as they had no sympathy with his protest proceedings. They simply ignored the convention called by Mr. McLeod, they have no place on his executive committee, and as far as the Herald can learn, they propose to let him and his candidature severely alone, and in the position they take have the backing of the Conservative party throughout the province. Mr. McLeod is regarded by the Conservatives as one of the wreckers of their party, and they propose to let him perish politically in the wreckage. He has absolutely refused to accept Conservative advice; he spurned party counsel; he thinks he is stronger than his party, and those who gave him able assistance before, are now quite properly exhibiting to him the marble heart.

Mr. McLeod will discover before this campaign is over, that whatever prestige he had in the last contest has been very largely destroyed by his own course. He was hailed as the deliverer of the constituency from the thralldom of bribery and corruption, but as everybody knows, when he discovered that the conduct of his own friends was to be investigated in the election court, he suddenly abandoned his declared intention of prosecuting the bribers to the bitter end, and accepted what—the vacating of the seat so that he might have another opportunity of satisfying his personal ambition by contesting for a place in parliament. Mr. McLeod's loud declarations of purity, etc., are but covers to entrap the unwary into supporting a candidate who thinks he has a heaven born mission as a politician, as years ago he perceived a special call to follow another profession which he has now largely abandoned.

York Liberals will please remember that the party convention to nominate a candidate for the House of Commons will be held at the Y.M.C.A. hall, York street, Fredericton at 2.30 p. m. Tuesday July 16.

The military authorities can add greatly to the attractiveness of the men's barracks on Queen street, and generally to the appearance of the city, by adopting the suggestions made by prominent citizens with regard to abolishing the penitentiary like fence which at present runs in front of the barracks. There is a nice plot of green between the building and the fence which will form a pretty foreground if the fence is demolished, and the present gates set back on a level with the building. Col. Dunbar was so struck with the prominent citizens' suggestions that he kindly ordered work on the fences in progress to be discontinued until he reported the matter to Ottawa, and he hopes to receive a reply that will meet the request for the proposed improvement.

The government organ in York finds something to criticize in the fact that the Sun supports the liberal conservative candidate in York.—St. John Sun. [But there is no Conservative candidate in York, according to the local organ of the party, and Mr. McLeod. The Sun as often the case, is pursuing a shadow.

Evidently Premier Ross, of Ontario, is not alarmed at the prospects of his government in the approaching elections. He is booked for a three months' trip to Europe.

## ACCIDENTS AND DEATHS.

Two Persons Killed by Lightning—Drowned While Bathing—St. Stephen Man Severely Injured.

Forterie, Ont. July 7.—During a terrific thunder storm here Saturday night a colored boy was struck by lightning at the race track and killed. Wm. Benner was also struck and killed.

Rertin, Ont. July 7.—Henry Jonas, a farmer living near here, came into town Saturday with his wife, leaving their two boys, aged 5 and 11 years, at home. During the parents' absence the eldest boy found a loaded shotgun and, while playing with it, shot his little brother dead.

Annapolis, N. S., July 7.—A drowning accident occurred here yesterday afternoon when George Moses (colored) went over Corbitt's wharf to swim. After being in the water for a short time he suddenly threw up his hands and sank. Moses was about 50 years of age and a widower. The body has not yet been recovered.

St. Stephen, July 7.—On July 4 R. W. Grimmer, while driving on Water street collided with an electric car, throwing Mr. Grimmer, heavily to the ground. The injured man continued at his work in the store until Friday, when he was forced to give up and was taken to his home, where he lies quite seriously injured. It is feared his spine is affected.

Bridgewater, N. S., July 7.—William Munies, mate of the schooner Alma, loading lumber here for New York, fell overboard between the vessel and the wharf this morning and was drowned.

Sherbrooke, Que., July 7.—Word was received here today of the drowning of four men in St. Francis River, near Brompton Falls. Nine men were crossing the river in a boat when it upset, throwing the occupants into the river. Three swam ashore, two clung to the boat and four were drowned.

Sydney, N. S., July 7.—Henry Patton, former station agent at Louisburg, was instantly killed at the Coke ovens, Saturday afternoon, while braking on one of the D. I. & S. Co's trains.

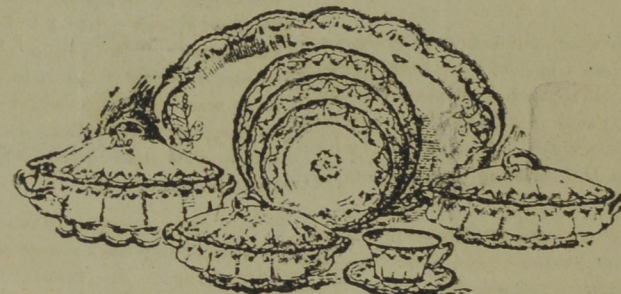
