THE LATE DOWAGER EMPRESS.

London, Aug. 7.—It is now announced that King Edward, Queen Alexandra, Princess Victoria and Prince Nicholas, of Greece, who are guests of their majesties, will start for Homburg, Friday, to attend the funeral services of Empress Frederick Sunday. A resolution, providing for an address of condolence with the King, and sympathy for Emperor William, on the death of the Empress, was unanimously adopted in the house of commons today. Balfour eulogized the life of the deceased Empress.

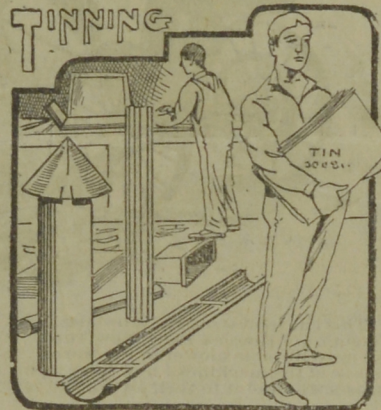

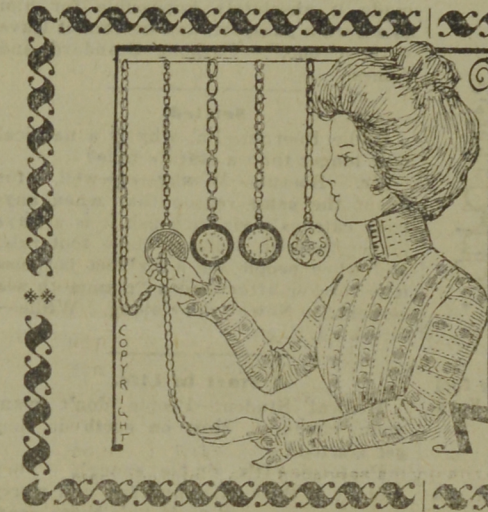
