Their Island Trip.

The Fredericton Knights of Pythias, Fowler Division, Uniform Rank, thirty strong, leave on Monday next for the annual Pythian gathering at Charlottetown, P.E.I.

Police Court.

Two drunks were before Col Marsh at the police court this morning. Each was fined four dollars, and one not being able to pay up, was sent to jail for five days.

Pounded the Police.

Deputy Chief Jenkins, and Sergt. Campbell of the St. John police force, were badly pounded and cut up by a mob of toughs at Torryburn yesterday, and several of the latter are under arrest.

Making Improvements.

John McKnight, the Regent street grocer, is having his place of business enlarged and improved and a plate glass front put in. When the work is completed he will have one of the best appointed stores in the city.

Taken a Wife.

Harry Fradsham, an employee of the Canada Eastern Railway shops at Gibson, and well known in musical circles in this city, gave his friends a surprise this week, by being quietly married at Milltown, N. B., to Miss Hovey, of Marysville.

Heard Bad News.

Frank Kelly, formerly of Blissville, Sunbury County, who has been in Washington territory for the past ten years, arrived here yesterday, called home by the serious illness of his father, who, however, died some days ago. Mr. Kelly not hearing the sad news until he landed in Fredericton. He left for Blissville last evening.

A Clergyman's Illness.

Rev E S Parker has been ill in Fredericton for about ten days. He thought he would be able to be at work by this time, but last Sunday he was, by his physician's direction, taken to Victoria Hospital, suffering from typhoid fever. He hopes it may be a mild type and that in a few weeks he will be about again.—Religious Intelligencer.

The Late Rev Mr Jaffrey.

The funeral of the late Rev William Jaffrey will take place from his late home at St Mary's ferry at 2.30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The remains will be taken to church at Gibson, where the funeral service will be conducted, and interment will be made at Lower St Marys. It is likely that Bishop Kingdon and the Church of England clergymen from this city will take part in the service.

It Comes High.

The local board of health is determined that small pox shall not obtain a foothold in this city providing it is in their power to prevent it. They had a physician visit the Cadwallader house last week and vaccinate the five members of the family, and for this service the board has since paid him the generous sum of ten dollars, the amount charged by him. It does not look as if vaccination is destined to become popular in Fredericton at this rate.

A GALLANT RETREAT.

City Hall Committee Abandon Their
Office Shuffling Scheme.

A few weeks ago it was announced that there was to be a general redistribution of the offices occupied by civic officials in the City Hall building. The City Hall committee in a report to the council, recommended among other things that the police magistrate should move into the city clerk's private office and that the principal assessor should "double up" with City Treasurer Golding. The reason given for the proposed change was that a room was wanted for the exclusive use of the Mayor and another was needed by the council in which to hold committee meetings.

The Herald at the time pointed out the

absurdity of the proposition, and suggested that in future the council might find it convenient to make use of the newly furnished council chamber for committee meetings. The Herald's suggestion was afterwards adopted by the board, and the proposed shuffle of offices seems to have been abandoned altogether. Col. Marsh is still doing business at the old stand, and the city treasurer has not been called upon to share his quarters with the principal assessor nor is he likely to be. There is no great demand for the changes suggested by the city hall committee and they certainly acted very wisely in abandoning such an impracticable scheme.

The council held their first committee meeting in the council chamber Monday evening. All gathered around a table placed within the enclosure, and seemed to be well satisfied with the change.

TARTARS AT HALIFAX.

A Game in Which Former Fredericton
Players Distinguished Themselves.

One of the hottest games of ball played this season in the maritime provinces was that at Halifax Saturday between the St. John Alerts and the Halifax Resolutes the latter winning by a narrow margin. The following extracts from the Halifax Recorder's account of the game shows that the Fredericton men on the Resolutes, team were largely responsible for the victory. The Recorder says:

The Haligonians touched up Webber in the third. Finnamore opened with a safe hit, and after two were out, Tibbits got in a good drive for three bases, scoring Finnamore, and McLean drove out another, scoring Tibbits and tying the score. In the fourth Britt got in a great drive to centre, which, had it gone safe, would have meant two runs, but it was beautifully judged by Tibbits, who made a splendid catch, and the crowd gave him rounds of applause.

Tibbits made a sensational catch in the fifth off Curran after a beautiful run, and Finnamore wound up the inning, by deflecting White's hit to Brown, who got Malcolm at second.

A feature of the game was the work of Jack McLean; in the first inning while waiting to touch Dolan at the plate, the latter in attempting to score bounced into the big catcher, who had his nose bled and his wrist injured, so much so that Dr Curry was called and it was found that the player had his wrist sprained; the doctor bandaged the injured member, but McLean went on and played without an error, threw out a man at second, and banded out three hits and a long fly which would have likely been good for extra bases but for his injury.

Tibbits was the great strength to the Resolutes; he not only hit hard but got four fine catchers at centre, and one was so good that the crowd fairly went wild with their applause.

Finnamore put up a remarkable game at short; he cut off base hits, accepted all of his ten chances, and while he got one double play, assisted in several which should have been doubles.

Duke and Duchess of Cornwall Will Not
Visit Fredericton.

His Worship Major Crocket is in receipt of the following communication from the Governor General's secretary, in reply to one sent by him inviting the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall to visit Fredericton:

Government House,
Ottawa, 31st July, 1901.

Dear Mr. Mayor,—

I am directed by the Governor General to inform you that the arrangements for the Royal tour will not permit their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York to visit Fredericton in accordance with your very kind invitation of the 11th May last. It is a matter of great regret to His Royal Highness—regret in which His Excellency shares—that the shortness of the time at the disposal of the Royal party obliges His Royal Highness to forego the pleasure of visiting so many places of interest in New Brunswick and of gratifying by a personal visit the loyal desires of so many of its people.
