SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

First Annual Provincial Gathering to be
held in Fredericton.

Sunday School workers of this province
and especially of this county of York
have been looking forward for many past
months to the first Annual Provincial
Sunday School Convention of this cen-
tury, which is to be held in the city of
Fredericton. As the time draws near the
executive committees of the province and
of York county are busy in correspond-
ence, working together for the greatest
and best convention which the province
has ever had. Their visitor from abroad
will be the Rev Joseph Clarke, D D, suc-
cessor to Marion Lawrence in the Sunday
School work of the great State of Ohio.
All Fredericton Sunday School workers
will remember Marion Lawrence, and
therefore be prepared to accept the man
who can succeed and lead the hosts
further to the front. Dr Clarke is the
son of father and mother who themselves
were Field Sunday School workers. New
Brunswick will give him a good welcome.

The officers of York County Sunday
school Association are communicating
with parish officers, urging every parish
president and secretary to be present so
that York may get a large share of bene-
fit from these great meetings. They are
asking each superintendent to be sure
that his school is represented at the com-
ing convention, and that each school send
in its annual offering before October first,
that the county secretary may make a
good report for York. Mr James Wilson
of this city is county president this year,
and Mr A S MacFarlane of the High
school, the secretary treasurer. Mr E R
Machum, St John, is treasurer for the
province.

The dates for the great convention are
October 8, 9, and 10th. The sessions will
opened at 2.30 Tuesday afternoon, October
8th.

CANADA AND IRELAND.

They Make Characteristic and Attractive
Exhibits at the Glasgow Exposition—
Both in Physical Juxtaposition.

Russia is not the only agricultural
country which here enters the manu-
facturing lists. The Canadian con-
tribution is equally comprehensive
and scarcely less enterprising. All
the products of the Dominion are re-
presented, and visitors will be sur-
prised at their variety and extent.
Agriculture is most in evidence. It
is illustrated very prettily by a lofty
kiosk in the centre of the pavilion,
decorated entirely from top to bot-
tom with the cereals and grasses of
Canada. These are supplied by 250
farmers, and arranged by the direct-
or of the central experimental farm.
Then there are fruits, vegetables,
cheeses, wines, flour, honey, canned
goods, and so forth. But the manu-
factures will probably attract equal
attention. One realizes that Canada
is actually becoming a manufacturing
country. It turns out paper, wool-
en, cotton, silk, rubber, leather, iron,
and wooden goods. The agricultural
implements are, perhaps, the most
noticeable examples. It is, I believe,
a fact that Canada annually exports
about 1,000 reaping machines to
Germany. As to the mineral section,
the wealth of Ontario, Quebec, Nova
Scotia and British Columbia is dis-
played in a systematic fashion by
their respective governments, and
that of the Dominion as a whole is
looked after by the central govern-
ment at Ottawa. Forestry is similar-
ly treated.

The Irish Pavilion.

The Irish pavilion, which stands
hard by the Canadian, will attract
universal attention by reason of its
charming and characteristic exterior.
It is designed by Mr. T. Manly
Deane, and represents a small coun-
try house of Georgian period, at
Malahide, standing in its own
grounds. It is a low double-fronted
house, with white concreted walls,
rounded bow windows, and thatched
roof. The "friendly" aspect—to bor-
row a German term—of this modest
structure makes it conspicuous. The
interior is divided into several rooms
which are devoted to different
branches of Irish industry. There are
tweeds, linens, laces, basket work,
Donegal carpets, wood carving, and
models of ships from Belfast. Looms
are being put up and will be at
work. There was also some promise
held out of a still at work, but I in-
quired after it in vain. Perhaps it is
illicit, in order to make the national
character complete. The Department
of Agriculture and Technical Instruc-
tion for Ireland, which is responsible
for this pavilion, is to be congratu-
lated on the result.—Cathartic Union.
