

SCHOOL OF MUSKETRY.

Plans for Instruction and Other Details in the New Institution Have Been Approved.

The plans for giving instruction at the new School of Musketry, to be established on the Rockcliffe rifle ranges, at Ottawa, have been approved. The institution will be known as the Canadian School of Musketry, and the staff will consist of the following: One commandant and chief instructor, one officer instructor, one quartermaster-sergeant instructor, two sergeant instructors from the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry. Lieut.-Col. Cartwright has been appointed Commandant and Chief instructor. He will combine the duties with those of Inspector of Musketry. The officer instructor and quartermaster-sergeant instructor will be nominated by the Imperial authorities.

The courses of instruction will be held for officers and non-commissioned officers during the months of July, August, September and October of the current year. Each course will be of six weeks duration, and will include lectures and instruction in the following subjects: (a) Target practice and range finding; (b) armory work; (c) rifle range equipment and management; (d) rifle ranges, their selection and requirements; (e) small arm ammunition, testing and manufacture of; (f) musketry regulations and drill; (g) theoretical principles. The courses of instruction will commence on the first Mondays in July and September, respectively. Two certificates will be granted, ordinary and extra. The same rates of pay will be granted as at other schools of instruction. Soldiers, servants or batmen will draw the same rates of pay as privates in the permanent corps. A camp will be formed which will continue during the courses of instruction. Field officers will be allowed one tent each; other officers one tent for two; non-commissioned officers one tent for three. A camp bed, with mattress, bolster, blanket, rug and waterproof sheet, will be provided each officer, non-commissioned officer and man. The transport will be as for other schools of instruction. Applications for courses in instruction must be made in the usual manner, through the district officer commanding. Each application must be accompanied by a certificate from the applicant's commanding officer that he is proficient in the firing exercise. Officers intending to avail themselves of the July course are requested to make application as soon as possible. Only officers holding certificates will be eligible for appointment as regimental musketry instructor.

A Royal Prince for Canada.

Mr. Henniker Heaton's proposal that we should have royal Princes of Canada and Australia recalls the fact that there was once a Viscount of Canada, and still may be somewhere on the earth's surface, for any precise information we possess to count of Canada and Earl of Stirling the contrary. The titles of Viscount were borne during the 17th century by the Alexander family, whose representatives, though at present fallen from their ancient grandeur, are said not to be extinct. The original William Alexander for whom the honors were created, was a Scottish poet, born about 1567. Even the names of this heavy and prolix epic are hard to come by to-day, but by 1663 they had won him Knighthood, and by 1613 an attachment to the household of Prince Charles. In 1614 began to appear his huge poem, "Doomsday," which 1637 had not seen the end of. Honors and emoluments in the meantime accumulated on his head. He was made Secretary of State for Scotland, Keeper of the Signet, a Commissioner of the Exchequer, and a Judge of the Court of Sessions. In 1621 he received a grant of "Nova Scotia"—a vague term, which included what is now New Brunswick and a fair portion of the New England States—a boon, however, which the French successes in America soon made valueless. It was in 1630 that he was made "Viscount of Canada." In spite of his rare good fortune he appears to have died insolvent about the year 1640.
