Duke and Duchess of York

RECEIVED WITH WILD ENTHUSIASM AT CAPETOWN.

H. R. H. will Unveil a Tablet at McGill in Honor of Harold Borden.

POSTMASTER GENERAL TALKS OF AUSTRALIAN CELEBRATION.

Cape Town, Aug. 19.—The royal party landed at Simonstown from the Ophir and came on here today by train.

The city was lavishly decorated, and there was wild enthusiasm.

Montreal, Aug. 19.—When Their Royal Highnesses visit McGill on the second day of their visit to Montreal to open the new medical building, the Duke of Cornwall will unveil the tablet placed in the students' room to the memory of Major Harold Borden son of Hon. F. W. Borden and Gunner Orielly, of the Royal Canadian artillery who lost their lives in South Africa.

Toronto, Aug. 19.—Hon. Mr. Mulock, who returned from Australia yesterday, said: "The reception tendered Their Highnesses, in addition to being most hearty and sincere, was attended by a certain dignity, and there was not a single disturbance of the most trifling character from the commencement of the visit until it ended.

"I saw thousands of people lining streets of different cities, all of them as orderly as soldiers on parade. Nothing that the government could furnish [to show their appreciation of the royal visit was denied by Australians. They stopped at neither expenditure of energy nor money, for with them it appeared to be a labor of love. The street decorations showed a great deal of artistic taste, and in most instances represented progress and manufactures in the colony."

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

Constabulary Surprised the Boers Killing 23 of Them.

(Special to the Daily Herald).

London, Aug. 19.—Lord Kitchener in a despatch from Pretoria says the S. A. constabulary yesterday surprised a strong Boer laager near Middelburg, killing 23.

The constabulary numbered 150, but owing to the strength of the enemy were unable to follow up their success.

London, Aug. 19.—Despatches to the Standard from Pretoria says: "Boer women just taken at the concentration camps, whose husbands are still in the field, declare loudly that the Boers are going to win. They claim that the continental powers will intervene. The wives of burghers, still in the field, are continually insulting the wives of those who have surrendered."

Capetown, Aug. 19.—A small column of the Duke of Edinburgh's Second Volunteers and the Second Welch Mounted Infantry made a forced march from Prieska Cape Colony, and surprised a Boer camp at Middlepath. The Boers fled, dismounted, in the darkness and abandoned everything, including 86 horses and a large quantity of ammunition. Eight colonial rebels were captured. A portion of the Boer force which occupied a neighboring kopje, opened fire on the British. The fire was returned and lasted until dawn. Two British soldiers were wounded. The Boer casualties are unknown.

NEW BRUNSWICK GIRL

Killed at Chicago by an Illinois Central Train.

Chicago, Aug. 19.—Miss Walsh, a native of New Brunswick, was killed Saturday evening by an Illinois central suburban train.

She was a student at the University of Chicago. Eye witnesses affirm that she threw herself in front of the train. Her friends on the other hand, say she was affected with heart trouble and fell accidentally before the train.

Water Consumers.

The attention of water consumers is called to section 12 of the Water Bye Laws as follows:

12. Persons removing from any premises who have paid full rates in advance, will be entitled to an allowance for the time unexpired, provided written notice is given at the Superintendent's Office at the time of such removal.

Persons wishing to discontinue the use of water must give written notice thereof at the Office previous to the expiration of the time, for which payment has been made, otherwise they will be liable for the rent for the ensuing six months.

Owing to the increasing tendency of water consumers to ignore the above Bye Law, it will be strictly enforced in future.

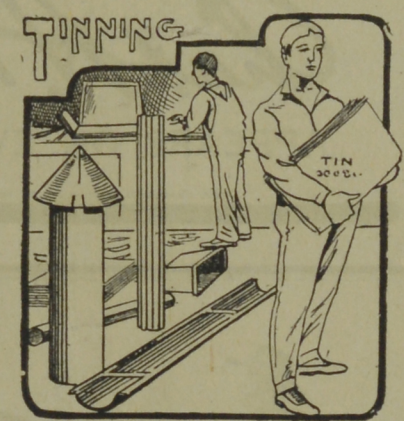
