

DARING ROBBERY.

Train Held Up and Safe Blown Open.

BANDITS STILL AT LARGE

And are Believed to be ex-Railway Men.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Texarkana, Sept. 4.—The passenger train leaving here last evening was held up four miles outside the city limits. The train was flagged and the robbers cut off the engine and express car, and ran them a mile down the track. They blew up the safe on the express car obtaining a large sum of money. The exact amount is not known.

The robbers next cut off the engine and went off at full speed, and the engine was not found till 1.40 this morning. The passengers were not molested.

The sheriff and a posse have gone in pursuit of the robbers, who are five in number. They are believed to be ex-railroad men.

DECLARED INSANE.

A Coal Monopoly.

Pittsburg, Sept. 4.—The Post says: "All the bituminous coal mining companies of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and West Virginia and Kentucky are to be consolidated into one great corporation by the J. P. Morgan syndicate.

The completion of this great project will mean the consolidation of from \$200,000,000 to \$300,000,000 of invested capital. This will represent not only the undeveloped properties in the six states, but also the actual coal properties under development."

Boer Murderers.

London, Sept. 4.—The colonial office publishes a despatch from the governor of Cape Colony, Sir Walter Haly Hutchinson, announcing that the Boers, Aug. 20, captured two unarmed British scouts near Haareekloof and shot them in cold blood. "De Wet has issued a proclamation," says a despatch to the Daily Mail from Cape Town, "that he will shoot all British troops found in Orange River Colony after Sept. 15."

A GREAT FLEET.

Halifax, Sept. 4.—About September 21st ten warships will arrive here from Quebec and will remain for a month. The fleet will include some of the finest vessels in the British navy.

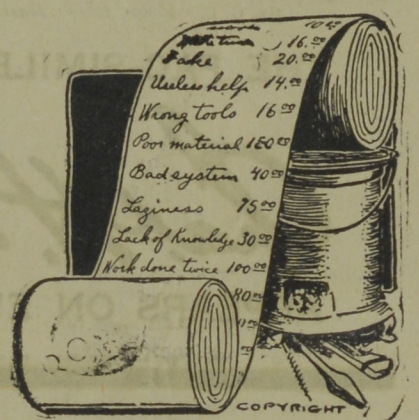

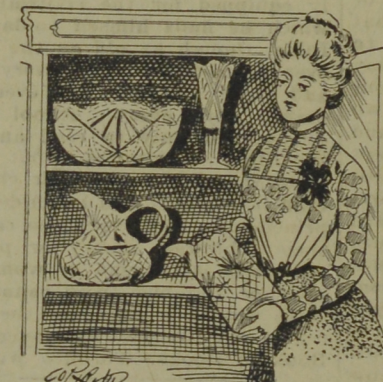
