The River.

A telegram from up river states that the water has risen a foot at Grand Falls as the result of a rain storm in that vicinity the latter part of last week. The river at Fredericton is now about stationery.

Joseph Patterson the colored man harged with indecent assault has been admitted to bail on the strength of an order granted his counsel, A.J. Gregory by Judge Wilson. He is held in the sum of \$500, and two sureties of \$150 each.

Rev H E Cooke has arrived at Burt's Corner to take charge of the Christian Church of that place. He has been for a number of years pastor of the Christian Church of Kempt, N S, and leaves there with the deep regret of his many friends.

Customs Returns.

The value of goods entered for consumption at this port during August was \$32,498 and the duty collected was \$4,111.66. For the corresponding month last year the imports were valued at \$28,269 and \$3,192.67 was collected in duty.

Death at Rustiagornish.

Zopher Phillips, a well known resident of Rustiagornish, died at his home there this morning at the advanced age of 88 years, leaving two daughters and four sons. The funeral leaves his late home at 2 p. m., Thursday, with R. B. Adams undertaker in charge.

Congratulated the Judge.

The September Circuit Court met this morning at 11 o'clock, His Honor Judge Gregory presiding. A large number of legal gentlemen had assembled and congratulated the learned judge on his improved appearance and safe return from a recent trip to Vancouver.—St John Gazette.

He was lodged in jail for the night, and was taken to Woodstock this morning, for trial. Dennison was at one time employed as brakeman on the Gibson Branch railway.

Let off Easy.

A man named David Shanks, of Macnaquac, was before the police court Tuesday morning on the charge of stealing a hat and two figs of tabbacco from a section man on the Gibson branch of the C. P. R.

He pleaded guilty to the charge and was sentenced to three months in jail. Col. Marsh taking into consideration the prisoners imbecility allowed the sentence to stand. Shanks was arrested on Saturday by W. R. Scott, a C. P. R. detective.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

An Important Session
Now Being Held in
This City.A NUMBER OF DELEGATIONS
BEING HEARD.Premier Tweedie Will Investi-
gate Charges Against Chief
Clark.PREFERRED BY THE EVANGELICAL
ALLIANCE OF ST. JOHN.

The local government held a meeting last evening and received a report from George Robertson, M. P. P., and the sub-committee appointed to arrange for entertaining the Duke of Cornwall and York and party during their visit to St. John. Matters in connection with the reception were talked over at some length and the committee's action was approved of.

This forenoon a delegation composed of C. N. Skinner, Geo. W. Allen, M.P.P., E. G. Evans, Capt. Elkin and A. P. Barnhill, representing the N. B. Coal and Railway company, were heard by the executive in reference to acquiring running powers over the Central railway. They are being given a further hearing this afternoon.

A lot of routine business was transacted at this morning's session, and Premier Tweedie was appointed a committee to investigate the charges prepared by certain St. John clergymen identified with the evangelical alliance against Chief of Police Clarke, in connection with the enforcement of the Sunday observance law.

F. E. Came, the well known horseman, was heard in regard to an importation of thoroughbred horses, to defray the cost of which he wants government assistance. The matter was referred to a committee composed of Hons. L. P. Farris and Mr. Hill.

W. A. Hickman, government immigration commissioner to Great Britain, was to submit his report to the government this afternoon.

A delegation of North Shore lumbermen and representatives of the Royal Trust company were being heard this afternoon in reference to renewing the license of the Maritime Sulphite Fibre company to the Royal Trust company. The lumbermen are opposing the application made by the Trust company.

Dr. E. B. Fisher, secretary of the provincial Board of Health, is to make a report this afternoon or this evening on the small pox outbreak in Carleton and other counties, and Hon A S White is to make a report on the work of consolidating the statutes. The business of the session will likely be completed this evening.
