Labor bodies in British Columbia forwarded to the Governor-General for approval an address which they desired to present to the Duke of Cornwall and York, when he reaches the coast. The address, however, contained strong expressions of dissent at the disallowance of the anti-Japanese legislation enacted by the province. A reply was, therefore, sent that, although it was desired to afford every opportunity for Canadians to approach the representative of the sovereign, such sentiments were scarcely suited to an address of welcome, but should be embodied in a memorial.

The \$35,000 needed to pay the Duke of Manchester's debts has been provided, not by the Duke's father-in-law, Eugene Zimmerman, but the Duke's mother, the Dowager Duchess of Manchester, the transaction being carried through by Mr. Holland, now here, partner of the Dowager Duchess's late brother, Ferdinand Yznaga. It was because of the hopelessness of trying to induce Mr. Zimmerman to put up the necessary money that the Duke's mother went to the rescue, in order that an agreement reached with the Duke's creditors might be fulfilled. The Duke, Duchess and Dowager Duchess are staying at Downe Place, near Windsor, where an interesting event is expected in October.

Bulgarian brigands, instead of Turks, kidnapped Miss Ellen H. Stone, the American missionary in Turkey, according to the latest advices to the State Department from Consul-General Dickinson at Constantinople. They are outside the Sultan's dominions. The Consul-General has been in communication with the brigands, who demand a ransom, and he asks whether the American Board of Foreign Missions is willing to pay this. Miss Stone was a resident of Chelsea, Mass., where her mother now resides.

SUCCESSFUL FAIR.

Fine Display of Live Stock at the Woodstock Exhibition.

WELL BRED HORSES WERE IN EVIDENCE.

Some of the Prize Winners.

Sept. 26.—Ideal weather prevailed for the second day of the grand fair and over 1500 visited the buildings and grounds during the day.

In the morning a grand parade of prize horses and cattle took place. The exhibit in these lines are counted the best ever seen at an exhibition in Carleton County and it is claimed by competent judges that they excel anything in the horse or cattle line in the province.

C. W. Betts of Pembroke, in the parish of Northampton, exhibited his thoroughbred black Percheon stallion, Harmony, which is the only thoroughbred Percheon in New Brunswick. The animal which is ten years old, weighs 1900 lbs, is 18½ hands high, and is a fine specimen of its kind. It was imported from P. E. Island by Mr. Betts, over a year ago, and has since taken several first class prizes.

E. D. Phillips of Northampton, has a Suffolk Punch stallion, eight years old and weighing 1500 pounds, which is a set of some imported stock owned by Sewell and Gellibrand, formerly of Springhill, N. B.

Some of the progeny of the Zapher and Prefer stock, imported some years ago by the local government, made an excellent showing today. Tomorrow the driving horses will be driven on the park track and prizes awarded there.

W. S. Hooper, Wm. E. Farrell, John Oldham, Dr. E. W. Henry, Spencer Sterling and Mrs. T. B. Winslow, of Fredericton, were among the visitors at the exhibition today.

The Woodstock band is not in attendance at the exhibition, but is giving concerts in the square each evening.

The exhibition will close tomorrow evening.

The builders for the Carleton county jail are making rapid progress in the erection of that structure. It is being erected off Main street near the Record office and presents a very neat appearance. The brick for the building is supplied by M. Ryan, of Fredericton.

At the Woodstock Exhibition on Friday the judging of driving and saddle horses took place on the Driving Park in the forenoon.

J. A. Hale's horse captured first prize. Mayor Belyea was awarded second for his driver and J. Allen Dibblee's horse came off third.

For the exhibition of saddle horses Howard Everitt of Wakefield was awarded second prize and Judson Briggs of Lindsay, captured second.

The largest number of prizes at the fair were carried off by Judson Briggs of Lindsay. Mr. Briggs took three first prizes for his potatoes; four first prizes for swine; a first on a colt and a first on apples, as well as two first on cattle, and he also succeeded in landing a number of second and third prizes.

A parade of prize horses and cattle took place in the driving park on Friday afternoon, and was viewed by a large number of spectators.

The fair throughout was most successful and the exhibits in stock and horses one of the best held in Carleton county for many years.

The space inside the building is small and will not admit of a very extensive industrial exhibit but the firms which had space in the building made a fine exhibit.

The best of order prevailed around the grounds during the exhibit.

The different judges all appeared to give satisfaction.

President Brown of Northampton and Secretary J. R. Murphy and his assistant Miss Corbett deserve great credit for their energetic work. Henry B. Smith, Woodstock parish, was superintendent of the horse committee and rendered valuable assistance in that line.

TEDDY ROOSEVELT.

Personal Characteristics of the New President.

HIS ADVICE TO MCKINLEY REGARDING THE SPANISH FLEET.

Strong in His Domestic Tastes.

Washington, Sept. 27.—Theodore Roosevelt, the man of action, the embodiment of American strenuous life, is personally well-known in Washington. Like his illustrious predecessor, he spent many years in public life here before being elevated to the first place in the land.

Col. Roosevelt has a unique personality. He is pugnacious in appearance, and when he talks or smiles he displays his teeth in such a manner as to make him an excellent target for the cartoonists. He is dignified in manner, earnest in speech, forceful in expression, and he has a command of language and a knowledge of public affairs which made him an effective speaker in the last campaign. There is nothing particularly striking in the appearance of Roosevelt. He would not attract attention in a crowd. His round head, with closely cropped hair, is indicative of the aggressive fighter, but his friends assert that behind his aggressiveness will be found a conservatism which will make him a careful and painstaking executive. In one respect at least Mr. Roosevelt resembles the late President, he has domestic tastes, and is devoted to his wife and family. At Philadelphia a year ago he was the recipient of an ovation which will long live in the memory of those who witnessed it. He was called to the platform to address the convention, and as he left his seat in the section reserved for the New York delegation the convention rose to its feet and applauded him to the echo. This outburst of affection for the rough rider lasted several minutes. In the midst of it, Col. Roosevelt stood like a statue, until his eyes, resting upon a row of seats not far from the platform, caught those of his wife. A pleased expression spread over his countenance. He smiled and bowed and waved his hand to Mrs. Roosevelt with manifest pleasure.

"Teddy is of an impulsive nature," said a member of congress in the midst of a crowd who were discussing the new President, "but his responsibilities will no doubt convert him into a safe man." The member then told a story which he had heard from first sources, of how Mr. Roosevelt, just before the war with Spain was declared, once burst tempestuously into the cabinet room during a cabinet meeting.

"Here comes Roosevelt," said President McKinley. "Let's hear what he has to say. What would you advise?" he continued, addressing Mr. Roosevelt, "as to the action of the United States in connection with Cervera's fleet."

Setting his teeth firmly together, Mr. Roosevelt replied:

"With all due deference to you, Mr. President, since you asked me for my honest opinion, I will say that my advice is to meet Cervera's fleet at the Canaries and sink every d— ship in it."

"But that would be an act of war," replied President McKinley.

"Certainly it would, Mr. President," said Mr. Roosevelt, "but I have noticed in studying history that the nation getting in the first blow, usually wins, and I believe in getting the first blow."

President Roosevelt is indifferent to dress. At Philadelphia he appeared before the convention in "store" clothes, a low turndown collar and a plain black tie, in striking contrast to the elegantly attired Tim Woodruff and other members of the Republican delegation from New York. He usually appears in a poorly fitting cutaway of not a late style, and when he affects a high hat it looks as if it were a product of the vintage of 1812. This is not affectation, but indifference. When he was assistant secretary of the navy he adapted himself to conditions. When it was warm Mr. Roosevelt wore a negligee shirt and a belt, and when it became uncomfortable in his office, he shed his coat and transacted business with a delightful disregard of convention and formality.
