

COLUMBIA WINS.

Very Hot Race All Over the Entire Course.

SHAMROCK TOOK THE LEAD AT FIRST.

And Showed Her Heels to the Turning Stake

BUT WAS OVERHAULED ON THE HOME STRETCH.

By the Yankee Boat Which Finished Slightly Ahead.

(Special to Daily Herald).

New York, Sept. 28, 8 05 a. m.—The wind is blowing 12 knots an hour at Sandy Hook.

10.02.—Both yachts are near the starting line. The wind is about eleven knots.

10.28.—The committee boat has just set signal for a course east by south, with the start at the Sandy Hook light ship. The committee boat signal calls for a fifteen mile race to windward and return. The wind is at little south of east and still fresh.

10.45, a. m.—Both yachts are now jockeying for position, waiting for the signal.

10.47 a. m.—Preparatory signal fired at 10.45 a. m.

10.54, a. m.—The yachts are having a fight for position and it looks as if the Columbia had the best of it, a little to the windward.

10.56, a. m.—Startling signal at 10.55, with both boats on the port tack.

10.58, a. m.—The yachts are off. Unofficial start time. Columbia, 11.00-02; Shamrock, 11.00-03.

11.02, a. m.—The yachts went over the line on the starboard tack, with the Columbia a trifle ahead, seemingly in the same position they occupied on the other trial.

11.03, a. m.—For the first five minutes the sailing looks as if the Columbia was outgunning the Shamrock.

11.13, a. m.—The Shamrock leads by 150 yards.

11.15, a. m.—Official time of start. Shamrock, 11.00-14; Columbia, 11.00-16.

11.20, a. m.—(Marconi). The Shamrock to windward, but astern.

11.23, a. m.—The Columbia has just put about on her port tack and is leading. The Shamrock is coming down on the starboard tack.

11.27, a. m.—The Shamrock is now ahead and on the starboard tack. The Columbia is going on the port tack, forced about by the Shamrock.

11.47 a. m.—Shamrock is still ahead and seems to be doing great windward work.

12.08 p. m.—Both boats are now on the port tack and Columbia has worked slightly to windward and still a little astern.

12.23 p. m.—Both boats have sailed about nine miles of the course. Both are on the port tack and Shamrock appears to have worked out from under the Columbia's lee.

12.36 p. m.—Both boats have gone on the starboard tack and the mark is now in sight.

12.39 p. m.—Shamrock is ahead and forces the Columbia about. Both are now on the starboard tack and the Shamrock to the windward.

1 p. m.—Both boats on port tack, very close together. Columbia has the wind but is behind.

1.10, p. m.—The wind is increasing and the Shamrock is gaining slightly.

1.17, p. m.—The Shamrock still ahead.

1.19 p. m.—The turn will be very close.

1.26-30 p. m.—Shamrock turned at 1.24-47. Columbia 1.25-33 unofficial.

1.30 p. m.—Both boats running before the wind on an north west course, neither racer has yet changed sails since turning outer mark.

1.32 p. m.—The yachts are coming home before the wind with booms to port and spinnaker to starboard, the Shamrock leading.

1.25 Official time of turning; Shamrock—1.25-12. Columbia 1.25-53.

1.59, p. m.—The yachts have covered about five miles of the running and the Shamrock seems to have maintained her relative distance ahead.

2.10, p. m.—Both are running home under a cloud of canvas with no perceptible change in their positions. The wind is falling off somewhat.

2.11, p. m.—The Columbia is gaining.

2.14, p. m.—The Columbia is now ahead.

2.20 p. m.—Columbia is a length ahead.

2.28 p. m.—The Columbia gains slowly.

2.30 p. m.—The Columbia still gaining. The crowds on the excursion boats are cheering.

The exact time allowance as corrected Wednesday is 46.7 seconds in favor of the Columbia.

2.31 p. m.—Columbia is only two lengths ahead but is still gaining.

2.42, p. m.—The light ship now in sight eight miles away, Columbia still gaining slightly.

2.51 p. m.—Columbia is four lengths ahead and the light ship is four miles away.

3.10 p. m.—The wind has fallen away to seven knots.

3.10 p. m.—The Shamrock has been gaining and has almost overhauled Columbia, they are two miles from the finish. It is anybody's race.

3.15.—The Columbia maintains a positive lead and should now win the race.

3.25.—Columbia leads by two lengths.

3.28.—Shamrock gaining. Columbia only a length ahead. Nearing the finish line.

3.30.—The boats are now even and within a half mile of the finish.

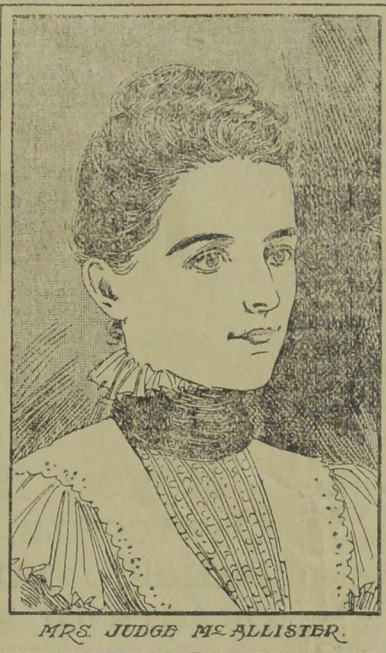
3.32 p. m.—Columbia wins.

3.38.—Columbia wins by 23 seconds. Shamrock crossed the line 3.31-10 Columbia at 3.31-15, Columbia winning by 35 seconds.

Constantinople, Sept. 28.—The Rev. Mr. Haekell, a missionary at Samakov, (Bulgaria) has received a letter from Miss Helen H. Stone, the American missionary who was carried off by brigands. It does not reveal the whereabouts of Miss Stone, but says she is in good health and has been well treated by the brigands, especially in the earlier stages of the abduction. Latterly, in consequence of the vigorous pursuit of Turkish troops, she has been subjected to privations. Miss Stone adds that the brigands demand a ransom of 25,000 Turkish pounds. The opinion is expressed in Constantinople that the Bulgaro-Macedonian committee was actively concerned in the abduction of the missionary.

CATTLE ATE DYNAMITE.

Many Animals Near Princeton, Ind. Dead as Result and Others Affected.

The cattle have been dying in terrible agony, for several days, and others are still seriously affected. The owners have taken steps to sue the construction company.
