### MR MCLEOD AND THE COMMISSION.

An attempt is made by the solitary Fredericton newspaper supporting Mr McLeod's candidature to influence the temperance men of York in his favor because of his connection with the prohibition commission, but neither the government, which appointed the commission, nor the members of it, are entitled to any credit for having by their acts in that connection, forwarded the temperance cause in Canada. The government created the commission simply to shelve the prohibition question, which was then embarrassing them in parliament and in the country, and Mr McLeod accepted a place on the commission, because well there was money in it for him, and Mr McLeod, although a preacher, was not unlike other men when a good fat government job was offered him.

The commission cost the country over \$200,000, and if any temperance man can discover what benefit its enquiries conferred on the temperance cause, the columns of the Herald are open for him to do so.

Mr McLeod we admit, was most diligent in his attendance at the meetings of the commission. He travelled all over Canada and in parts of the United States, in semi-regal style. He drew \$10 a day salary and \$4 a day for expenses, besides other perquisites which ran his total scoop from the government up to nearly \$10,000. It was a regular picnic for Mr McLeod, one which he enjoyed at the expense of the taxpayers of Canada, and there is nothing to show for it except huge volumes of reports which nobody has read.

Of course Mr. McLeod and his friends try to justify the expenditure, but it cannot be done. A profitable job was wanted by some of the government, friends Mr. Foster, a kinsman of Mr. McLeod, had a say in the appointments, and Mr. McLeod secured a place on the commission and the \$10,000 reward.

### THE LATE MR. SIMMONS.

General regret will be felt at the announcement of the death of Mr. James E. Simmons, of Gibson. The deceased gentleman was well known as a successful contractor, and as a staunch member of the Liberal party. For several years he was president of the York Liberal association, and discharged his duties most satisfactorily. He was an energetic and capable business man, honest, honorable, upright, and enjoyed the confidence and esteem of a large number of friends who sincerely mourn his death.

To the bereaved family the Herald tenders its sympathy.

Some of Mr Gibson's supporters are trying to make it appear that Dr McLeod is in some way out of harmony with the Conservative party, and that he has not the sympathy of the leaders. —Sun. [No not exactly, Mr Sun. The "out of harmony" business is splendidly illustrated by Mr McLeod's former organ, which declares that the Conservative party leaders are not responsible for Mr McLeod's candidature and are not supporting him. The Sun's ignorance of the situation is amazing.]

An Orangeman complains to the Herald that the gentleman who had all the free trips arranging for the Moncton excursion on the 12th, declined to sign the guarantee bond demanded by the railway authorities, and also declines to resume any responsibility for the deficit.

The change in the Governor General's programme for his visit to Fredericton will necessitate considerable crowding. His Excellency will spend only one afternoon here, arriving by train at noon Tuesday, July 30, and departing five hours later by the same means of conveyance. There will therefore be small opportunity for giving him a fitting entertainment. It is to be regretted that His Excellency has made no provision for voyaging down the St John river.

### ARMY REMOUNTS.

Col Dent of the British Army Coming to N B to Purchase Horses.

The following letter, which is self explanatory, has been received by the Commissioner of Agriculture:

Calgary, N.W.T., 13th July 1901.

Hon. L. P. Farris,  
Commissioner for Agriculture,  
Fredericton, N. B.

Sir,—I purpose going to New Brunswick the latter part of August, dates to be hereafter fixed, to buy horses for H. M. government as remounts for the army. I should be greatly obliged if you would inform me of the most likely places in New Brunswick to find horses and the names of men who would collect them for my inspection. My time will be limited and I can only visit two or three principal towns. The classes of horses I am buying are:

Artillery horses—15.1 to 15.2½ hds, stout, blocky, active horses, quiet in harness.

Cavalry horses—15.1 to 15.2 hds, quiet to ride.

Infantry cobs—14.2½ to 15 hds, quiet to ride. Ages 6 to 9 years old.

No greys or collar marked horses will be accepted.

I will esteem it a favor if you will make my visit known as widely as you can, so that horses can be collected quickly when my dates are fixed. I am, Sir,

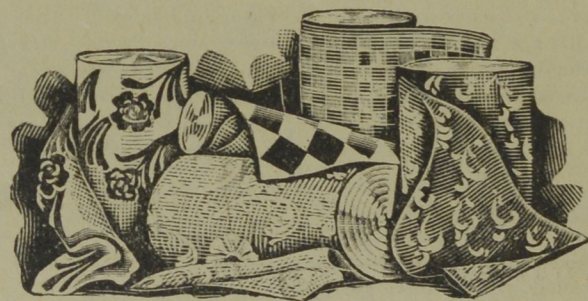
