

SUDDEN DEATH.

Of James E. Simmons the
Well Known Bridge
Builder.

PASSED AWAY AT GIBSON
EARLY THIS MORNING.

Heart Failure the Cause of His
Demise.

A WELL KNOWN RESIDENT OF DUM-
FRIES DIES UNEXPECTEDLY.

It is our painful duty today to record the death of James E. Simmons, the well known bridge builder, which sad event occurred at his home at Gibson at 4.30 o'clock this morning. He had been confined to his residence for about five months suffering from a sore foot, but otherwise his health seemed good. He was about the house yesterday as usual, and after partaking of a hearty dinner repaired to the verandah, where he remained for some time chatting with his old friend and neighbor, Hubbard Niles. He retired to rest at the usual hour in the evening, and about four o'clock this morning was taken suddenly ill with what he thought was an attack of acute indigestion. He complained of violent pains in the region of the chest, and everything possible was done to alleviate his suffering, but he grew rapidly worse, and passed away before Dr. Mullin, who had been sent for, could reach his bedside. The doctor after making an examination gave it as his opinion that heart failure was the cause of death.

The deceased gentleman was a native of Lakeville Corner, Sunbury County, and was in the 68th year of his age. He leaves a sorrowing widow, and a family of five sons and two daughters. The sons are Dr. Harry F. Simmons of Greenwood, B. C.; Thomas L. Simmons, assistant inspecting engineer of the government canal system, Ottawa; Bruce L. Simmons, of Loggieville, Charles J. B. Simmons of Gibson, and S. Dow Simmons, official court stenographer, who resides at home. The daughters are the Misses Nellie and Edna Simmons, both at home. He also leaves one brother, Thomas L. Simmons, of Lakeville Corner, and three sisters, Mrs. John Ferguson and Mrs. Isaac Davidson, of this city, and Mrs. George Hunter of Florenceville, Carleton County.

The late Mr. Simmons was a practical bridge builder by trade, and for many years has carried on business with his brother-in-law, David C. Burpee, of Gibson, under the firm name of Simmons & Burpee. They have erected a great many fine bridges in different parts of the province including the great wooden structure which spans the St. John River between Fredericton and St. Marys, which was completed in 1885.

Mr. Simmons removed to Gibson with his family about seventeen years ago, and has since been looked upon as one of the foremost residents of that place. His duties brought him into contact with a great many people, and he was held in high esteem by all who knew him. He always took a warm interest in public affairs, and in politics was a staunch Liberal of the old school. He was chairman of the board of revisors for the parish of St. Mary's and for some years held the office of assessor.

The news of Mr. Simmons' sudden death was a great shock to his host of friends in this locality, and was received on all sides with expressions of sorrow and regret. The bereaved widow and family have the heartfelt sympathy of the whole community.

Mrs. Simmons and her sister-in-law, Mrs. Ferguson have been visiting friends at Loggieville, and the sad news was wired to them at that place this morning. They were unable to take passage for home by the regular express, but returned this afternoon on a special placed at their disposal by Supt. Hoban.

The funeral will take place on Sunday with interment at Sunny Bank, at 10.30 a.m., and will probably be under the auspices of court St. Marys I. O. F. of which the deceased was a member.

John J. Rossborough.

John J. Rossborough, a well known farmer of Dumfries, dropped dead on Wednesday afternoon while on the way from his house to the barn. Heart failure is supposed to have been the cause of his demise. He was 60 years of age, and leaves a widow and family of children. The funeral took place this afternoon

with undertaker John G. Adams in charge.

James Forbes.

The death occurred at Roslagornish on Friday of James, the eight year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Forbes. He had been suffering for some time from a blood tumor, and since early in May has been obliged to take his rest in a chair. The funeral will take place at ten o'clock on Sunday morning with R. B. Adams in charge of the arrangements.

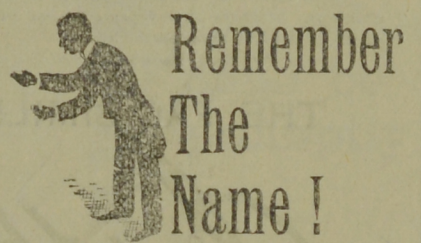
