

## KISSED A NURSE

And as a Result Doctor May Lose His Job.

DETECTED BY A CANADIAN: NO BUSINESS TO GET CAUGHT,

Says One of the Men Who Sat in Judgment.

New York, July 15.—The Medical Board of the German Hospital in Brooklyn held a special meeting on Monday night for the purpose of taking some action on the alleged unprofessional conduct of Dr Reuss, one of the youngest of the house physicians at the hospital. The president of the board is Dr Lewis S Pilcher, of 386 Grand Avenue. The other members of the board are George R Fowler, Weisbrod, Pfug, Meyer, Schalck, Bender, Groge, Schilling and Brunning. Some of the members of this board are old and eminent physicians and surgeons, and others are not so old.

According to the story, some of the older members of the board were very sure that Dr. Reuss ought to be disciplined. He was charged with being so unprofessional as to kiss one of the youngest and best looking of the nurses at the hospital. Dr. Reuss is just starting on his professional career. So is the young woman he is alleged to have kissed. The young woman has been on the hospital staff of nurses for about two months. Dr. Reuss has been on the staff of house physicians not very much longer. The doctor is extremely popular with his fellows on the staff, and the young nurse is no less popular with her co-laborers in the wards.

MISS PRITCHARD TOLD.

The Medical Board would never have been called upon to pass judgment on Dr. Reuss' conduct had it not been for Miss Pritchard, the supervisor of nurses at the hospital. Miss Pritchard is a Canadian, and a graduate of the Seney Training School for Nurses. She is not much older than the young woman for whom Dr Reuss is alleged to have shown especial fondness. But Miss Pritchard believes in discipline in a hospital and she doesn't believe that kissing tends to increase the discipline. At any rate, so the story goes, it became known to Miss Pritchard that one of her nurses had actually been kissed by one of the young doctors. Any breach of hospital discipline must, according to the rules of the hospital, be reported to the chairman of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board. The chairman of that committee was Dr George R Fowler, one of the most eminent of Brooklyn's surgeons. The matter was reported to Dr Fowler, and he and the members of the Executive Committee investigated.

At the meeting on Monday night Dr. Fowler reported the result of the investigation. It is said that all the older members of the Medical Board on hearing Dr Fowler's report were in favor of suspending Dr. Reuss and recommending his dismissal to the Board of Managers. It is also said that all the younger members of the board weren't in favor of doing anything of the kind. They believed, it was said, that the offence with which Dr Reuss was charged was not so fearfully and awfully heinous, and that he ought to get off with a reprimand. According to the unofficial reports of the meeting, the older members of the board carried the day, and it was voted to suspend Dr Reuss and to recommend his dismissal to the Board of Managers.

DON'T BLAME HIM ANYWAY.

There is no official report of the meeting to be had for publication. When Dr. Fowler was seen last night he said:—

"This is a matter that I cannot discuss. It hasn't yet been disposed of, and it is something to which publicity should not be given."

Another member of the board, who was so modest that he didn't care to be quoted largely, because he said he didn't want to get mixed up in kissing games anyway, said—

"The story that Dr. Reuss was caught kissing one of the youngest and prettiest nurses in the institution is true, and it is also true that he has been disciplined. I don't care to say any more about the case than that."

Still another member of the board added this statement to the history of the case:—Reuss may have been indiscreet, but I would say he was idiotic. His business was not to have got caught, and then nobody would have blamed him. I don't know that I blame him much anyway."

The young woman was on duty at the hospital last night, and the superintendent didn't know that Dr Reuss had been disciplined.

The London correspondent of the Evening Post cables as follows: A new turn is likely to be given to affairs in South Africa. Lord Kitchener is, according to an uncontradicted public statement, destined to the position of Commander-in-Chief in India, upon the vacation of that post on April, 1902, by Sir Power Palmer. The assertion in military circles that Lord Kitchener expects to return to England early in September fits in with this announcement, allowing for a holiday. His successor in South Africa will, it is said, be Lieutenant-General the Hon Neville Lyttelton, a brother of Lord Cobham, and himself distinguished in the Egyptian and Sudan campaigns. General Lyttelton is now in London, and his movements suggest that he is quietly electing his staff, preparatory to his return to the front in chief command.
