Disastrous Railway Collision on the Grand Trunk.

Sixty Lives Lost in a Coal Mine.

A STRIKE THAT IS COSTING ENORMOUSLY.

Richmond, Quebec, July 17.—A passenger train running between Richmond and Coaticook, on the Grand Trunk, ran into a freight train which had taken a siding but did not clear the main line at Brompton Falls.

The express engine was badly wrecked. Engineer McLeay and fireman Evans, of the express, were slightly injured in jumping.

The passengers were very badly shaken up and several were severely bruised, but none were seriously injured.
