

ON TO VICTORY.

Liberal Convention the
Most Representative
Ever Held in
York.

MR. GIBSON'S SPEECH IN ACCEPTING THE NOMINATION.

Addresses Made by T. H. Colter,
Dr. Moore and others

The Liberal convention yesterday afternoon is generally conceded to have been the most representative and successful ever held in York. The Y. M. C. A. hall was packed to the doors and every person present was a voter. Delegates came from every part of the county, even from far off North Lake, which had not been represented at a Liberal convention since confederation. The parish of Stanley sent a very strong contingent as also did the good old Liberal strongholds, Canterbury and Manners Sutton. The parishes of Bright, Kingsclear, Queensbury, Southampton and Douglas were represented by a posse of sturdy farmers who abandoned their work in the hay fields in order to assist in honoring Mr. Gibson. The gathering was of a most enthusiastic nature and those who composed it can be counted upon to a man to do all in their power to send Mr. Gibson back to parliament by a rousing majority.

Mr. Gibson's speech in accepting the unanimous nomination of the Convention, though short, was manly and straightforward and was applauded to the echo. He returned his thanks to the Convention for the honor done him, and expressed his pleasure at such a large attendance. He thanked the electors for the support given him in the last contest, and predicted that the victory won by him on that occasion would be repeated when next the electors had an opportunity to go to the polls. After a reference to the protest proceedings, he remarked that he had nothing against Dr. McLeod, but he could assure him that if he wanted an election he could have it. As long as you are willing to stand by me, I do not care how often we are called upon to fight him. He can have an election every year if he wants one. (Great applause.) Continuing, Mr. Gibson said he had had the honor of representing the county in the local legislature and had sat in Parliament for one session. He had not taken up the time of the House with long speeches, but had strived to do his duty as a representative. In conclusion he again returned thanks for the nomination, and promised if elected to do his best to serve the interests of the county and province. He wanted all to take hold and work for him, and thought if every man did his duty they would have no reason to fear the result. (Applause.)

T. H. Colter, ex-M. P. P. in response to loud calls, made a vigorous speech which was well received. He claimed that Mr. Gibson had run as pure an election as was ever run in York county by a Federal candidate, and was fairly entitled to the seat he had won. He made reference to the recent Orange demonstration at Bart's Corner when an attempt had been made to crowd him (Colter) out, but without success. The crowd had called for him to address them and he had responded. He assured Mr. Gibson of his hearty support and urged the electors to take hold and make the victory as emphatic as possible. (Applause.)

Dr. D. R. Moore, of Stanley, in response to loud calls from the delegates, delivered a brief address which was applauded to the echo. He spoke very highly of the present Dominion government, and paid an eloquent tribute to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Touching upon the local situation, he stated that a great change had come over the people of Stanley, and Mr. Gibson could confidently count upon a much larger vote in that parish than he received at the general election. Mr. Gibson was a man who needed no introduction to the electors of York county. He was essentially a man of the people and represented one of the largest manufacturing institutions in the country. He was well qualified to represent the county in parliament, and was in a position to materially advance its interests. It was true he was not an orator, but it must be remembered that the men who had accomplished the most for this county at Ottawa in the past were men of few words. The late John Pickard had been an excellent representative, but he was a man of few words and many deeds. The same could be said of the

late Thomas Temple. Mr. Gibson was a most capable business man, and had proved himself a most capable representative both at Ottawa and in the local house. No elector need be ashamed to have such a man represent him in the parliament of Canada. He was confident that the electors of York would send him back to parliament by a rousing majority. (Applause.)

After a few remarks by Conns Rowley and McManiman, the proceedings were brought to a close by rousing cheers for Mr. Gibson and the King.
