The Grocer—Yes.

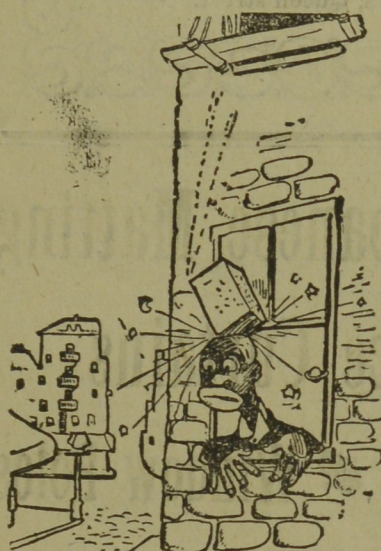
"Have you got any very old cheese?"

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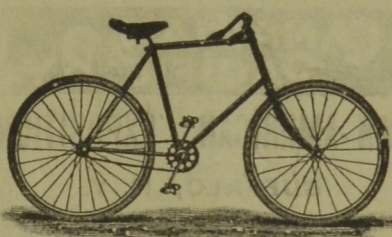
