

HE SUICIDED

P. E. Islander Arrested for Murdering His Mother

HANGED HIMSELF IN HIS CELL.

(Special to Daily Herald)

Charlottetown, P. E. I., May 6.—Archie McLeod, charged with murdering his mother, suicided by hanging in the jail during Sunday night.

McLeod's body was found by keeper opening the cell this morning. He had cut his towels in strips and finding bars of the window low inserted the bedstead between the bars, fastened the towels to the upper end of the slat. This enabled the suicide to swing clear of the floor by a few inches only. The body was cold when found, showing that the hanging had taken place during the night.

The prisoner when visited by friends Saturday was found reading a bible. He said should be home attending his crops and was greatly distressed about his wife and 3 children. Over seventy witnesses were moving from Rosy Valley by the morning train to give testimony at the preliminary examination to have been held at eleven o'clock. Instead an inquest was held at the same hour before the coroner who made a autopsy body of McLeod's mother. Suicide regarded practical confession of crime almost without precedent in Canada. The prisoner was a well off farmer, with a bank account besides. He was a member of the Presbyterian church which is on his farm.

SENTENCED TO DORCHESTER.

Wilson was arrested in Moncton some time ago for stealing a coat and gold watch and chain from his boarding house.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

London, May 6.—The Geneva correspondent of the Daily Mail asserts that President McKinley has informed Mr. Kruger that he cannot receive him either officially or unofficially.

Cape Town, May 6.—As a result of the appeal to Cecil Rhodes, the De Beers Mining Company has promised to give the Kimberley council \$40,000 annually for the next three years for the purpose of liquidating the municipal deficit.

London, May 6.—"News has arrived here," says the Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Express, "that Col Dennison, with a patrol of scouts, has been captured. The location of the mishap is not known in Cape Town."

Johannesburg, Friday, May 6.—General Delarey, the Boer commander, has now 4,000 or 5,000 men in the hills around Hartbeestfontein. General Babington, in command of the British forces in the district, is without a sufficient force to attack and is observing the Boers, while Generals Methuen and Rawlinson are converging hither. A battle appears imminent.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

To clean gilded frames, wipe them gently with a fine cotton cloth saturated with sweet oil.

Laces and other delicate trifles should be placed in a muslin bag before being boiled. This prevents their getting lost and torn in the wash.

If machine grease gets upon washable fabric it may be taken out with washing soda and cold water. Apply the soda to the spot and wash it in the water. Then wash it with soap and water.

To restore ivory knife handles which are stained, damp a rag slightly and with it apply a little salts of lemon to the spots. Wipe with a damp rag and then polish with a soft duster.
