Do not Want It.

A Merton citizens' meeting Saturday night voted down the proposition to purchase the street railway plant at \$12,000. After a lengthy discussion an effort was made to appoint a committee to investigate the value of the plant and report at an adjourned meeting Monday night, but this was rejected by a vote of 51 to 41. The Street Railway Company has an offer of \$12,000 for the plant but gave the city the first option.

A Cold Church.

The Lumber Drives.

Nothing of an authentic nature has been learned since Saturday concerning the lumber drives on the Upper St. John.

The water is still falling quite rapidly, and unless heavy rains occur a large quantity of lumber must be hung up. Messrs Lynch and Welsh's drives on the Southwest Miramichi reached the McKiltie bar on Saturday. They have still a long distance to come, but it is thought will get out all right. Mr. Welsh was obliged to abandon his drive on one brook.

The big Nashwaak drive was at Covered Bridge Saturday night and will soon be in the boom limits.

APPOINTMENT MADE

Rev. F. L. Carney, M. A. the New Pastor of St. Dunstan's Church

WAS A CLASSMATE OF BISHOP CASEY

And Has Seventeen Years Experience as Priest.

The Right Rev. Dr. Carney has been succeeded as parish priest of St. Dunstan's church by Rev. F. L. Carney M. A. of Debec. The appointment was announced by the Bishop to-day, and Father Carney arrived by this afternoon's train to take a look over his new charge. He will return at once to Debec to prepare for almost immediate removal to this city.

Father Carney who is under 40 years of age, has been seventeen years in holy orders, serving at St. John first and for the past ten or twelve years at Debec. He is a graduate of Memramcook College and St. Surplice Seminary, Quebec, and was a classmate of His Lordship Bishop Casey, distinguishing himself at both institutions. During his pastorate at Debec he built three neat little churches, and otherwise improved the temporal as well as the spiritual condition of his charge.
