SOMEWHAT OF AN ICEMAN.

The new tory leader has been puffed and exploited far beyond what his ability justifies in the effort of the party to lead themselves to believe that they made a real fund in Mr. Borden, and that gentleman must be very much amused to find that since he was elected to his present position, he has suddenly become a remarkably clever man, and an ideal person to succeed Macdonald, and Thompson and Abbott and Bowell and Tupper.

Liberals have no desire to belittle Mr. Borden or his abilities, but the latter are not of so brilliant a character that all men must fall down and worship him. As a matter of fact there are scores of men in Parliament with as much ability as the new Tory leader. There are a dozen men in the government cleverer than he, and there are not a few even among the opposition who are entitled to rank ahead of him in all that constitutes ability to lead a party. The factions however, could not agree on any of these, and Mr. Borden was accepted as a compromise, a sort of experiment, and he has certainly not proved a magnificent success. In Parliament Mr. Borden made very common place speeches, and on the stump he is said to be quite a large sized failure. He lacks magnetism that draws men towards a leader. There is no snap or dash in his public utterances, he is incapable of thrilling an audience, of arousing it to enthusiasm, and is indeed an iceman whose presence cools, rather than warms and electrifies. As soon as parliament closed Mr. Borden started on a short tour through Ontario, and opened up his stumping campaign at Toronto, where he spoke to only a partially filled house. Speaking of this meeting, the Toronto Star says:

"Without wishing to disparage Mr. R. L. Borden, it may be said that he is not the kind of public speaker to send electric thrills through such an audience as greeted him last night in Massey Hall. He is better in Parliament than on the public platform. He is a slow, and careful speaker. As a leader, his best quality is his cautious habit of mind, which makes it unlikely that he will lead his party into a mountain pass from which there is not an outlet at the further side. He is not a dashing commander by any means, but one who would arrange, with infinite care, for battle. In a tour he cannot stir up a blaze of enthusiasm, for his person transmits no fire and little warmth."

There is one point however, in which Mr. Borden is strong. He apparently believes that the mantle of prophecy has fallen to him from Sir Chas. Tupper, and at Toronto he prognosticated that after the next elections the Tories would be in power. The country will recall that in the last campaign, Tupper and Foster and Hugh John and all the rest of the Tory leaders foretold an immediate victory. Tupper declared that a great wave of Tory enthusiasm was sweeping from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and from the borders of the United States to the Arctic circle that would engulf and completely destroy the Liberal government. Foster assured everybody that the maritime provinces were all right. Mr. Monk answered for Quebec, declaring that the Tories would gain twenty seats, and the great Hugh John arrived from the west with the confident prediction that not a mother's son of a Liberal would be elected from Lake Superior to Vancouver Island. Such were the prophecies of the Tory leaders last autumn, and their failure of fulfilment should be a

warning to Mr. Borden not to indulge in such brilliant prognostications as he uttered at his Toronto meeting. It is a long time yet until the next general election, and a great many things are sure to happen in the meantime. The loyalty cry which the Tories worked with considerable success, especially in Ontario, will not serve them on the next occasion. People have seen through the Tory rant on that subject, and then the Senate, which has blocked useful Liberal legislation, and which prevented the passage of the redistribution bill intended to wipe out the infamous Tory gerrymander in Ontario, will soon show a Liberal majority and thus deprive Mr. Borden's party of one of its chief weapons.

Mr. Borden and his friends should keep cool, and not permit their imagination to run away with their judgment. They have a long time yet to spend in opposition.

July or August is put down as the time when Sir Louis Davies will become a supreme court judge at Ottawa, and Hon. H. R. Emmerson succeed him as minister of marine and fisheries. In the meantime Sir Louis is going on a trip to England for his health. It is not thought probable that any opposition will be offered to Mr. Emmerson's re-election in Westmorland.

The North Shore, and indeed all New Brunswick, has lost a highly esteemed citizen in the death of Edward Sinclair, the well known lumberman. The deceased gentleman was a pushing, energetic and successful business man, and he had a heart as large as his purse.

The Boers are still able to make a good showing against British troops in South Africa. In the last reported engagement 174 British officers and men were put out of business, although the enemy was driven off.

Coroner Seery and the counsel associated with the new Hewitson inquest, are sparing neither time nor industry in their effort to probe the unsavoury matter to the bottom.

The programme for Lord Minto's trip through the maritime provinces has been prepared, and will include twelve days with 2,400 miles travel.

We shall see what we shall see when the York election court opens on Monday.

THE BAND CONCERT.

Opening Event Enjoyed by a Large Crowd of People.

Parliament square and its vicinity was packed with people last night on the occasion of the 71st regiment band's first open air concert of the season, and everybody thoroughly enjoyed the outing. The evening was fine, just cool enough for comfort, there was no dust, the grounds were well illuminated by a couple of arc lights, and the music was first class. The new bandmaster Mr. Woolard an old British army bandman has brought his musicians along splendidly, and the programme, practically all new pieces, was heard with great pleasure from start to finish, several of the selections being heartily encored. A clarinet solo by Prof. Woolard was exceptionally well played, and well received, as was also a cornet solo by J. Albert Perkins.

Across the way the B. and B. club house was brightly illuminated and the members and their friends occupied the verandah.

The band this season is strong in numbers and efficiency, and won great praise for its performance last night. They hope to give an outdoor concert weekly, all summer, alternating between Parliament Square, and the Normal School grounds.
