

MET INSTANT DEATH

Former Member of the
R C R I Killed on a
Railway.

FELL BETWEEN CARS AND WAS
HORRIBLY MANGLED.

Deceased Served in the Klon-
dyke and Leaves a Fre-
dericton Wife.

William Betts, a native of Havelock, Kings County, and a former member of the R C R I, Fredericton, was instantly killed near Somerville, Mass., Wednesday.

He was employed as a brakeman, and falling between the cars, met his death. His body was very badly mangled. The remains will be interred at Somerville tomorrow.

Betts, who was about 30 years of age, was brought up by his uncle at Havelock, Wm Cusack, with whom he lived until a few years ago when he came to Fredericton and enlisted in the R C R I. He was one of the men chosen to go to the Klondyke and immediately after returning he left the regiment and went to Boston where he secured employment on the railway, which was about two years ago. His wife, who belonged to Fredericton, is left with two small children.

Winning Base Ball Laurels in Maine—
Lewiston Pleased with Howe and
Tibbits.

James Tibbits, the Tartar captain, has arrived at Lewiston and joined Tommy Howe in the New England League team of that town. Tibbits played his first game against the Portlands at Lewiston on Thursday, both the Fredericton men doing excellent work, as witness the following from the Lewiston Evening Journal:

"Howe was the hero of the game—Howe and Tibbits. Tibbits is a red-cheeked boy from Fredericton, the home of Howe. Howe has recently taken the veil; promised to go to bed early nights; play ball all the while and be good. His purpose shows in his works. Far and away the swiftest third-base proposition in the league, he can wear the badge of servitude in any team in any league in the world, if he keeps on coming. Tibbits comes on Howe's recommendation and his stick work and his outfield play were all that one could ask. Howe made two plays that would have aroused the enthusiasm of even the followers of James McCormack whom he much resembles in his style of play. One of them was a fierce drive from Wiley's bat. Going like a bullet it struck at the feet of Howe. His stop was instantaneous and electric. Old-timers swore by the memory of George Wright that it was the most remarkable that ever happened. Howe fielded it to second and stopped O'Brien."

Tibbits, who played centre, was five times at bat, had three hits, one of them a two bagger, had two put outs and no errors.

Howe got one run, one base hit, four put outs, four assists and no errors, also taking part in a double play.

EMMERSON FOR MINISTER.

Evidence that the Arrangements Out-
lined by the Herald Months Ago
will Shortly be Completed.

A Halifax despatch which is based on an authoritative private letter from Charlottetown, says that Sir Louis H Davies will retire from the position of minister of marine and fisheries in July or August and will take the place made vacant on the Supreme Court bench by the death of Hon George E King, and will be succeeded as minister of marine fisheries by H R Emmerson, M P, for Westmorland, N B, formerly premier of New Brunswick.

Confirmatory of this we find the following in an interview had by the Montreal Star with Mr Logan, Liberal M P, for Cumberland.

"I believe that if Sir Louis Davies retires from the Cabinet, as there seems some possibility of his doing in the near future, his place will be taken by Hon. H. R. Emmerson. The Maritime Provinces are entitled to the portfolio of Marine and Fisheries if it should become vacant just at present. Hon Mr Emmerson is a gentleman of great ability, and in my opinion, will be the successor of Sir Louis Davies."
