THE GLOBE AND LOCAL POLITICS.

In a complicated and meaningless article the St. John Globe discusses local politics to the extent of nearly a column, in the course of which it brings on a general election before another session, secures a county court judgeship for Premier Tweedie, puts a new man at the head of the government, and finally admits that the policy of running local politics on federal party lines, which it advocated so strenuously for years, was rejected by the people of New Brunswick.

The whole tone of the article denotes an absence of information on the subject discussed, combined with a desire to have a fling at Premier Tweedie and Attorney General Fugle. The Globe's object is of course to discredit the government and to play into the hands of Mr. Hazen and his friends of the local opposition.

The attitude of the Globe is not a new one for that paper. While pretending to be friendly to some members of the local government, it has never lost an opportunity of stabbing others, particularly Mr. Tweedie, whose chief crime in the Globe's eyes, is that he was once a Conservative. The Globe should understand that there are thousands of men formerly prominent in the Conservative party who are now supporters of the Liberal party, and the leaders of the latter at least, are not insensible of the assistance rendered them in obtaining power by old time Conservatives. The policy of the Globe, apparently is to repel former Conservatives who for political reasons have changed their party allegiance, but that is not the way to build up a strong and united party. A personal disappointment should not influence a great newspaper to have a fling at its friends.

The Globe makes the following admission, which although late is nevertheless suggestive of a changed mind: "We must regard it as an absolute thing that the view held by many, that Federal and Local politics should run on the same lines is not the view of the New Brunswick people, but it is an issue which has been settled, and need no longer influence political action in regard to local affairs."

The Herald has always held the view that there was no sense in mixing up local and federal issues, but the Globe strenuously fought for a division of local parties on federal lines. In this view it agreed with the famous Conservative convention at Moncton in 1898, when Mr. Foster came down from Ottawa and strove to drive the Conservatives in a body over to the support of the Stockton opposition aggregation. Mr. Foster snatched the party whip and ordered all Conservatives to bow the knee to Stockton, Alward and Hazen, and the Globe rejoiced in the prospect that one of its long cherished ideas was about to be realized. The Conservative supporters of the local government however absconded and delivered over to the opposition at the mere behest of Mr. Foster, and they went to the polls and buried deep Dr. Stockton and his party and the Globe's cherished idea of local politics on Dominion party lines. Mr. Emerson stood for the administration of the local affairs of the province without reference to federal politics, and everybody knows how handsomely he won, notwithstanding the efforts of the Conservative machine, backed by the Globe. The result of that election has apparently convinced Mr. Hazen and his party that they must make a new move, and now their organs declare that local politics should not be run on Dominion party lines. Well, those who have striven for that idea welcome

the conversions, but doubt their sincerity. It is anything with Mr. Hazen to get into office, and if even turning Liberal would accomplish that purpose we doubt not the opposition leader would as readily make the change as he bolted from his party in 1890 and voted the straight government ticket in York. The Globe which once described Mr. Hazen's speeches in parliament as "boiled sawdust", and a very good description it was, is now evidently willing to swallow anything the opposition leader offers so long as the local government and particularly the Premier and Attorney General are thereby discredited. There may have been a time when our St. John contemporary was regarded as an Oracle, when its political opinions were influential and useful to the man or party for whom it assumed to speak, but times have changed. Men think for themselves in political matters, but if they seek editorial instruction they are not likely to look for it from a newspaper that wobbles so frequently as the Globe.

THE CENSUS RETURNS.

The Herald made the prediction that the census of 1901 would show an increase in Fredericton's population since 1891 of one thousand, and we still believe that there has been such increase instead of 615, as denoted by the returns published today. There have been at least 200 new dwellings erected here since 1891, and allowing five persons to each, a fair family average, and having in mind that there are practically none of the older dwellings vacant, it can readily be seen that the city has fully 1,000 more people than in 1891. Either neglect on the part of the enumerators to find all the people, or stuffing of the lists in 1891, or both combined, is responsible for the apparently small increase.

The conditions at Marysville are more satisfactory. The bustling Nashwaak town has added 553 to its population, an increase of 41½ per cent, while Fredericton's increase is only ten per cent.

It must be a source of great satisfaction to Mr. Gibson to know that the town which he has labored so hard to establish shows a degree of prosperity and increase in population unequalled by any other town in Canada except in the West and Cape Breton where unusual conditions have existed within the past few years.

The Sun announces that "in the coming season St. John is likely to have the largest winter trade in the history of the port" and that "it is part of the new order of things that the best and largest boats of the Atlantic line, which last winter went to the United States ports, are fixed to come to St. John in the coming season." These announcements are pleasant reading compared with the Sun's blueruin prophecies when it was trying to elect Mr. Foster in St. John less than a year ago. Mr. Blair seems to have known what he was doing when he stood with his back to the wall and defied the attacks of the Sun and Mr. Foster.

That Prince William meeting of Mr. McLeod's was a corker. Think of the \$10,000 prohibition commission beauty wasting his wind for half an hour on seven electors, and two of them inveterate Grits and another two independent. No doubt the faction candidate will report to his friends that he had a rousing meeting at Prince William.

While Liberals are anxious to secure a majority in the Senate, they do not desire that lives may be prematurely cut short to accomplish that purpose. All will rejoice therefore that the report that Sir Mackenzie Bowell was lost in the Islander disaster is incorrect. The hon. gentleman is returning from Dawson by another route.

According to the Halifax Chronicle, the only newspaper assisting Mr. McLeod has in this contest is from a "hemlock bark and pumpkin editor."

The veteran Dr. Bayard, of St. John, is 87 years old today and has practiced his profession in St. John for sixty-four years.
