

THE DEATH SUMMONS

Coun. John Mowatt of Harvey Suddenly Called Away.

FOUND DYING BY HIS WIFE SHORTLY AFTER RETIRING TO BED.

A Prominent and Respected Citizen and a Leading Liberal.

HE WAS WIDELY KNOWN AND MUCH ESTEEMED.

Harvey Station, York Co., Aug. 21.—Councillor John Mowatt died suddenly in bed last night. He retired as usual and his wife found him dying shortly after. Heart disease was the cause of death.

Montreal, Aug. 21.—Rev. A. J. Mowatt, pastor of Eskine Presbyterian church, received a telegram from Harvey, N. B., today, announcing the sudden death of his brother, Coun. Mowatt, of that place. Mr. Mowatt and members of the family leave this evening for Harvey, to attend the funeral.

[The late Coun. Mowatt was well known in Fredericton and very highly esteemed. His last visit was in July when he attended the county council meeting, and presided at the Liberal convention which nominated Mr. Gibson for parliament. He was a native of Harvey, of sturdy Scotch stock, and was one of the progressive farmers of that place. He was a man of high character and universally respected. He has represented his parish in the county council for a long period and his presence and advice in that body was highly valued. He was a staunch Liberal and a warm supporter of the local government and took an active part in all political contests. Surviving brothers are Rev. A. J. Mowatt, of Montreal, formerly pastor of St. Paul's church in this city, and George Mowatt, of Harvey. The Herald extends to the bereaved family its sincere sympathy in their great and awfully sudden loss. Deceased leaves a wife and several children. He was about 55 years old.]

Stephen, ex-Mayor of Halifax, are interested in the success of Herrick Duggan's forty footer cat boat, which won so easily at Halifax last week has encouraged the Canadians to challenge if Lipton fails. Duggan will probably design a big boat.

STRAINED RELATIONS

Between France and Turkey—All Diplomatic Relations Broken off

NOTICE

Water Consumers.

The attention of water consumers is called to section 12 of the Water Bye Laws as follows:

12. Persons removing from any premises who have paid full rates in advance, will be entitled to an allowance for the time unexpired, provided written notice is given at the Superintendent's Office at the time of such removal.

Persons wishing to discontinue the use of water must give written notice thereof at the Office previous to the expiration of the time for which payment has been made, otherwise they will be liable for the rent for the ensuing six months.

Owing to the increasing tendency of water consumers to ignore the above Bye Law, it will be strictly enforced in future.

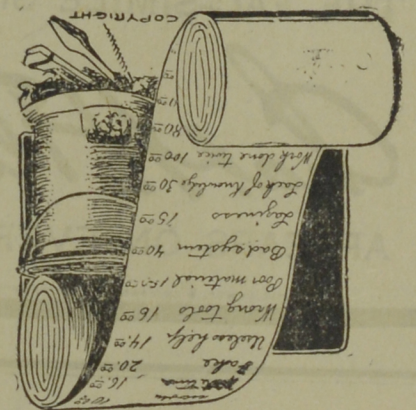
