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Former Governors General

Who Visited Fredericton and Were Given Cordial Reception.

The Dufferin and Aberdeen Trips Recalled—Former's Tribute to Alexander Gibson.

The first Governor General of Canada to visit Fredericton was Lord Dufferin who accompanied by Lady Dufferin and his staff left Quebec June 10, 1873 on the government steamer to Druid for a trip to the Maritime Provinces. After touring in Gaspe Quebec for a few days the vice regal party visited Dalhousie Chatham, Newcastle Charlottetown Picton, Louisburg, Sydney, and Halifax, and from the last named city His Excellency was called to Ottawa by the exciting political events connected with the Pacific Railway scandal, Parliament then being in session.

Resuming his maritime province trip after prorogation, Lord Dufferin visited St John and on Aug. 23 embarked with Lady Dufferin on the steamer David Weston for Fredericton. As the steamer neared this city she was met by other steamers and boats bedecked with flags, and salutes were fired all along the route.

On the arrival of the distinguished visitors here, a guard of honor was at the wharf and a battery of artillery fired a salute. Hon. L. A. Wilmot, governor of the province, Brigade Majors Otty and Inches, Col Saunders, A D C., Mayor Geo F Gregory and Sheriff Temple received their excellencies at the wharf. After dinner at government house the party took carriages for the exhibition building, (John H Reid's palace) where the formal welcome to the city took place. Mayor Gregory read an address in the presence of nearly 4,000 people, and His Excellency made a happy reply. In the evening a firemen's torchlight procession escorted the party through the streets of the city, which was brilliantly illuminated.

On the morning of the 25th their Excellencies made a trip up the N. B. Railway thirty miles, and returning picnicked at Keswick, where in a bower of spruce and fir an excellent luncheon was served. After discussing the liquids and solids Lord Dufferin made a speech, in which he spoke of the abundant welcome accorded him, of the loyalty of the people and referring to Mr Alexander Gibson said: "I have seen how one individual by persevering industry and enterprise has converted the wilderness into a smiling settlement and surrounded himself with a village of his own making, filled with a happy people, with a church wherein they may worship—a man who has turned the sources of industry to account, not for his own good alone but also for the good of those around him. My pleasure at seeing him and hearing of what he has done was enhanced by my learning that in his veins is the blood of Ireland, and that he is remotely connected with the home of my ancestry, and I may say, and it is something for so impartial a person as a governor general to say, that wherever I have seen marks of determined energy and enterprise in the country I have generally found that there was a little Irish blood at the bottom of it."

Governor Wilmot and General Warner also made pleasant speeches, when the pincers returned to the Government House where a dinner was given by the Governor and an "At Home" by Mrs Wilmot at a later hour.

Before leaving here Their Excellencies visited Marysville and Mr Gibson and his family were presented to the visitors, who left for Woodstock in carriages on the 26th.

THE ABERDEEN VISIT.

Lord and Lady Aberdeen arrived in Fredericton by the evening train from St. John on Wednesday August 15th, 1894, and remained in the city until noon on the following Friday, when they embarked

by the steamer David Weston for St. John.

Their excellencies were met at the train by Lient Governor Fraser and his A. D. C.'s, Major H. M. Campbell and Lient A. G. Blair, Premier Blair, Hon. James Mitchell, Hon. L. J. Tweedie, Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Hon. A. T. Dunn, Bishop Kingdom, Col Marsh, Major Loggie, Mayor Beckwith, and Aldermen Gilman, Farrell Macnutt, Moore, Golding Estabrooks, Rossborough, Walker and Macpherson, with City Clerk Beckwith, City Treasurer Moore, Auditor J. F. McMurray, and Water Works Supt. Burchill. The vice regal party were received by a guard of honor from the 71st commanded by Major Cropley with Lieuts Perkins and Gray as subalterns, and the band of the corps was also on hand. After inspecting the guard of honor, the visitors boarded a carriage in waiting and were driven to Somerville Place, where they made their headquarters while here. Many of the residences on York street were brilliantly illuminated, and Queen street was a blaze of light.

At 10.30 p. m. a reception was tendered their Excellencies in the Parliament building, by Governor and Mrs Fraser. No less than six hundred persons, representing every part of the province took part in the affair. The guests were presented in the assembly chamber, and afterwards a grand ball was held in the council chamber.

When the reception was over Governor Fraser with Lady Aberdeen on his arm led the way to the ball room and Lord Aberdeen followed with Mrs Fraser. Dancing was commenced at once, Harrison's orchestra of St John, furnishing the music. The following ladies and gentlemen took part in the official quadrille:

It was after three a. m. when the ball was over, and everybody voted it a grand success.

At nine a. m. on Thursday Their Excellencies, accompanied by Governor Fraser, Attorney General Blair and others went to Marysville by special train. They visited the residence of Alexander Gibson, and afterwards were accompanied by Mr Gibson and C H Hatt to the Methodist church. After inspecting the church they were shown through the cotton mill by Mr Hatt. The party returned to the city in carriages and paid a visit to the University, Cathedral and Normal School, and Lady Aberdeen afterwards visited the Victoria Hospital.

In the afternoon a grand agricultural conference was held on parliament square, at which no less than 4,000 people were present. At the commencement of the proceedings Lord Aberdeen was presented with a civic address by the mayor, to which he replied in eloquent terms. Immediately afterwards the aldermen, civic officials and members of the central committee, composed of Hon F P Thompson, F B Edgecombe, A S Murray, and Jas S Neill were presented.

His Excellency next received an address from the Farmers' and Dairymen's association, and replied to the same at some length. The other speakers were Prof Robertson, ex-Governor Hoard, of Wisconsin, Governor Fraser, Hon Jas Mitchell, D M McPherson, of Ontario, Col Blair and Prof Craig, of Ottawa.

The city was in its brightest attire in the evening in honor of the visitors, and the streets were crowded with visitors until after midnight. On parliament square the scene was one never to be forgotten and has never been equalled in the city. The parliament and departmental buildings were a blaze of light, candles burned in every window and the square itself looked fairy like. A line of Chinese lanterns was stretched on the trees entirely around the square and on Queen street from St John street to Farralline Place. The grounds and streets in the evening was one mass of humanity when the fireworks display was commenced at 9.30 o'clock.

At Government House, Governor and Mrs Fraser entertained their Excellencies and a number of ladies and gentlemen to a state dinner. This occupied about two hours and at the close there was a small reception. Outside the firemen made a splendid display of fireworks, and their Excellencies witnessed the latter portion with seeming delight.

At the conclusion of the fireworks the torchlight procession comprised of the firemen of the city and the bicycle club, was formed up and passed in review before their Excellencies. The vice-regal party then took carriages and with the members of the government and their ladies, the mayor and aldermen in barouches joined the procession. The first carriage was occupied by Lord and Lady Aberdeen, Hon Mr Blair and Hon Mr Mitchell, and an escort of six firemen with lighted torches marched on either side. A detour was made of the principal streets, and the procession disbanded at Somerville Place. Many residences and stores along the route of the procession were prettily decorated.

At 10.30 a. m. on Friday their excellencies held an informal reception, at the Parliament buildings and afterwards returned to Somerville Place to prepare for their journey to St. John. They embarked by the David Weston at 12 o'clock, being received at the wharf by a guard of honor from the 71st, Premier Blair and a number of ladies and gentlemen accompanied their excellencies to St. John.
