STAND BY THE VERDICT.

York county, along with the great majority of the Canadian constituencies in November last, pronounced in favor of continuing the Liberal government in power, and the administration has done nothing since to demand a reversal of that verdict. The government has been carried on with a view to the development of the country, the administration has been singularly free from any suspicious circumstances, but Mr McLeod is asking the electors of York county to condemn Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues, to say that York county's decision a few months ago was all wrong, and that this constituency should place itself in opposition for the next four years.

And for what reason? Simply that Mr McLeod may occupy a seat in Parliament. Are the electors of York willing to stultify themselves by acceding to Mr McLeod's desire? We think not. When the polls closed on the night of November 7th the voters of this constituency had rendered their verdict that they were satisfied with the record of the Liberal government, and they gave the administration liberty to conduct the affairs of the country for the next five years. The Conservative leaders in the constituency, the men who had put up the fight for Mr. McLeod, accepted the verdict, but a faction led by Mr. McLeod who was deeply disappointed at his defeat, refused to be bound; they instituted proceedings in the election court, they were going to prosecute alleged bribers, but when it was known that the conduct of Mr. McLeod's own friends would also be investigated, Mr. McLeod agreed to swallow his professions of purity, his desire for satisfaction against the alleged corruptionists on condition that the seat be vacated. This was the bargain into which Mr. McLeod entered that he might have another opportunity of seeking a seat in Parliament.

With his conduct and that of his immediate friends since last November, we say the Conservative party has no sympathy, and many of its members are openly opposing Mr. McLeod's candidature. The attempt of the faction candidate to make the people believe that he represents the Conservatives in this campaign, is an imposition and a fraud which leading Conservatives all over the county will resent at the polls.

LOSS TO THE UNIVERSITY.

All friends of the University will regret the removal of Prof. Dixon, who has accepted the chair of physics in Dalhousie University at Halifax. Prof. Dixon has done excellent work in the university here. He came to it with youth, an excellent training and much enthusiasm, and he leaves his mark on the old institution. Especially are his services in connection with the new science building, appreciated. He is indeed the hero of it, he originated the idea, and carried it to successful execution.

However Prof. Dixon cannot be blamed for accepting the Dalhousie chair. He will enjoy a largely increased salary, with opportunities for greater usefulness, and his friends while regretting his removal from Fredericton will unite in congratulations to him on his preferment. The Dalhousie authorities and the Halifax people are evidently delighted with having secured Prof. Dixon, the press of that city reflecting the feeling of satisfaction over his appointment. The Halifax Herald says:

"Dalhousie college fills the ranks in her professorship without delay, and she gets good men. Dr. D. A. Murray will succeed the late Charles Macdonald, and

last night a man was selected to fill the chair vacated by Professor J. G. MacGregor.

Dalhousie's new professor is Stephen M. Dixon, M. A., who comes from the University of New Brunswick, his college training having been received in Trinity college, Dublin."

After reciting facts connected with Prof. Dixon's career, the Herald adds: "In the year 1892, he was appointed to the physics chair in the University of New Brunswick, where he has won golden opinions as a teacher and has proved himself to be one of the most energetic and successful professors of that institution. While Dalhousie feels the loss of such men as Professor Macdonald and Professor MacGregor, she is so be congratulated on obtaining such men to succeed them as Professor D. A. Murray and Professor S. M. Dixon. The Chronicle is equally flattering to Prof. Dixon. It is a pity we have to lose men like Prof. Fletcher, Dr. Bridges, Prof. Murray, Dr. Dyde, Prof. Dixon and Prof. Duff, but so long as other institutions offer larger salaries and larger opportunities than the University of New Brunswick is able to give, the exodus will no doubt continue.

"CONDITIONED BY EXPENDIENCY."

Rev. William Dobson, the well-known Methodist clergyman, now of Windsor, N. S., in a recent sermon on temperance observed: "Napoleon is reported to have said on the morning after his celebrated conference with Alexander on the raft at Tilsit, 'If you scratch a Russian deep enough you are sure to find a Tartar,' so there are many professed temperance men, whom if you scratch them deep enough you are sure to find a politician or some other creature wholly conditioned by expediency. Such, however, is humanity; we must make the best of it and pass on."

People are wondering if Mr. Dobson's mind was turned to New Brunswick when he made the above observations. The Rev. gentleman is familiar with the conditions here, and it is just possible he had reference to, say—well can you guess?

Nova Scotia journalism loses one of its best men in the death of Henry D. Blackader editor and part proprietor of the Acadia Recorder, Halifax. The sad event occurred Sunday morning, after quite a lengthy illness. The Recorder was established by Mr. Blackader's father eighty years ago, and under the management of the two brothers, Henry and Charles has proved a great financial success. Another brother is Postmaster of Halifax.

A YORK COUNTY INVENTION.

Samuel McIntyre, of Canterbury Station, York Co., on May 7th, through his attorneys, Marion & Marion of Montreal, succeeded in getting out patent for a combined shaft holder and hitch-up, of his own invention. Mr. McIntyre has been working on this novelty for the past six years. He says that owing to the many persons receiving injuries from runaway horses, he was prompted to make this device whereby these accidents would be averted and also for the convenience in hitching up. "The Holder" as above named is attached to the extremities of straps on back pad, which the points of shafts of driving wagon or sleigh rest in, and when the horse is placed before the wagon it is only necessary for the driver to place shafts in receptacle made for them, and press down the lever. By one movement of the hand the horse is then securely hitched. This patent can be used independent of the breeching, tugs and breastplate, while driving a sulky. The occupants of a wagon can free their horse instantly by pulling sharply on the safety line, which opens the shaft lock thereby releasing the horse from carriage. Arrangements are being made for the manufacturing of shaft holder. The retail price is put at \$5.00 per set. There are some particular points that the inventor would have noted and that is the lock moves freely on the shaft and the horse pulls from the whistle tree so that the breastplate will not chafe its shoulders also the tugs in the hold back are always in position and can be adjusted to suit any sized horse.

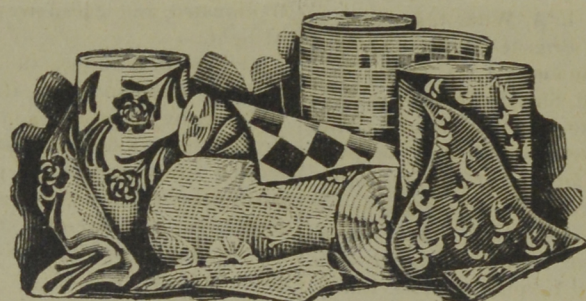
