Weather Probs.

Shut Down.

The Chatham pulp mill is in financial difficulties and has been shut down for an indefinite period, throwing 250 hands out of employment.

THE BAPTIST CHURCH.

Pastor Macdonald Creates a Favorable Impression.

The services in the Baptist church yesterday were conducted by Rev. G. H. Mcdonald, the new pastor, who delivered eloquent and scholarly sermons both morning and evening. Large congregations were present, and the Rev. gentleman made a most favorable impression.

Rev. Mr. Macdonald is a young man of commanding presence, and a speaker of

more than ordinary ability. He was for a time pastor of the Baptist churches at Woodstock and Amherst, and for several years has ably filled the position of Principal of Acadia Seminary. He will be formally inducted to the pastorate at a public meeting to be held in the Baptist church this evening. Several city clergymen have been invited to attend and deliver addresses.

DARING BURGLARY

Conductor Crookshank Robbed by a Sneak Thief.

At an early hour on Saturday morning a sneak thief entered the residence of Andrew Crookshank on St John street through a pantry window and helped himself to one of Mr Crookshank's best suits of clothes, which he donned and departed. He also took along with him, the contents of a cash box containing about \$15 and some papers, and left behind a well worn suit of clothes which he evidently had on when he entered the house.

Mr. Crookshank and his family were away the time, and the robbery was not discovered until the afternoon, when Mr. Crookshank, who is a conductor on the Canada Eastern, arrived from Chatham with his train. He gave a description of the missing clothes to the police, and a diligent search was made for the thief but without success. As Mr. Crookshank's residence is not far from Scully's Grove is was thought that possibly the robbery might have been the work of one of the circus navvies, but a searching investigation by Detective Roberts and Constable Crookshank failed to establish this theory. A woman who lives near Mr Crookshank's residence claims that she saw a man break into the house about four o'clock in the morning after making an unsuccessful attempt to enter another house near by. The police have the thief's clothes for a clue and are keeping a sharp watch out for the owner of them.

Doaktown Wedding.

A very pretty wedding took place at the residence of Mr and Mrs Chas Betts on Wednesday, July 17th, when her cousin, Frances L Freeze, was united in marriage to Stewart Hinton of Bathurst. After the ceremony a very elaborate supper was served the table being beautifully decorated for the occasion. The happy couple left on the evening train for Bathurst followed by the good wishes of many friends. The bride was presented with many useful and handsome presents.

MINTOS AT CHARLOTTETOWN.

An Enthusiastic Reception Tendered Them at The Island Capital.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 22.—Owing to the fog in the gulf the governor general and party did not arrive here until 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The city was crowded with people and flags were flying everywhere. A salute of 19 guns was fired as the party landed. Their excellencies were met at the wharf by Governor and Mrs. McIntyre, judges, Bishop Courtney, the mayor and council, and a guard of honor of 100 men. The mayor read an address of welcome, his excellency replying off hand in a pleasant vein.

Little Miss Waburton, the mayor's daughter, presented Lady Minto with a bouquet. After inspection of the guard, the party drove to the provincial building, where an address was presented by acting Premier Peters on behalf of the government and people. His excellency replied at some length extempore. Little Miss Peters presented a bouquet to Lady Minto.

At 3.45 the vice-regal party arrived at the Caledonian grounds and were received by a guard of honor composed of the Highland brigade. Major Stewart presented an address and a bouquet was presented by Master McMillan, son of Chief McMillan, on behalf of the club. His Excellency inspected the brigade and complimented them upon their appearance.

A reception was held at government house and then afternoon tea was followed by a band concert from 5 to 6. The party were entertained at luncheon and afterwards enjoyed a sail on the harbor and embarked at 8 o'clock for Nova Scotia.

DR GUNTER LAID AT REST.

Many Prominent Men Attended His Funeral at Charlottetown.

The funeral of Dr Adolphus B. Gunter, one of the most prominent citizens of Charlottetown, well known in the medical profession as a careful, conscientious and skilful physician, took place Wednesday afternoon from his home, 2 Dexter row, Charlottetown.

The services, which were of a very simple, but impressive nature, were attended by many professional and business men of this city, and were conducted by Rev Orville Coats, pastor of the East Somerville Baptist church.

During the services there was singing by Mrs Frisell and Miss Baker.

The floral tributes were both beautiful and numerous, and included several inscribed standing pieces from the many fraternal organizations of which Dr. Gunter had been a member. Several pieces were sent by Monticello lodge, A. O. U. W., Faith lodge, A. F. and A. M., Howard lodge, I. O. O. F., Signet Royal Arch chapter, Coeur de Lion commandery Knights Templars and the 999th artillery association. Several other floral tokens were sent by relatives and friends.

Five members of the fraternal organizations of which Dr. Gunter had been a member acted as pallbearers, as did Dr. William Hammond, Dr Roy Dearborn, Dr Blood and Benjamin F Stacey. The interment was at Woodlawn cemetery.
