THE EXHIBITION.

The Provincial Exhibition and Industrial Fair will open at 9 a. m. tomorrow in this city, and will continue until Friday evening.

Preparations for the exhibition are in a forward state, and everything points to unqualified success.

The display of live stock, farm and industrial products, manufactured goods, etc., will be a credit to the province and an attraction to the large crowd of visitors in attendance.

At 2 p. m. tomorrow His Honor Governor McClellan will be presented with an address by the officers of the agricultural society District 34, under whose auspices the exhibition is being held, and His Honor will formally declare the show opened.

Fine weather is all that is necessary to attract a large attendance of people at the exhibition, and we trust that the gentlemen who have labored early and late to achieve success may have every possible favorable condition.

THE DUKE'S RECEPTION.

The Duke of York was formally welcomed to Canada at Quebec today, and the heartiness of his reception must have deeply impressed His Royal Highness with the true, fervent loyalty of his father's subjects in this portion of the Empire.

The Duke has travelled nearly around the world since he left England last April, but every port at which he touched is included in the glorious old Empire on which the sun never sets. But he has a lot of British possessions yet to see. It will take him a week to cross Canada, travelling almost constantly.

His Royal Highness may be pardoned if he thinks a good deal of himself after he has seen the estate to which he is to fall heir on his father's death, and we are sure that no part of it will be appreciated more heartily than Canada, which has its arms wide open to receive him and his illustrious consort.

THE ANARCHIST CREED.

The Buffalo correspondent of The New York Herald reports that Czolgosz carried with him the creed of the Anarchist Society to which he belongs, and a pamphlet detailing advice for successful assassination issued by an organization whose avowed purpose is murder. These have been found by the police. They comprise two of the most cruel documents ever issued by civilized beings. A manual purporting to give some instruction for assassins is the work of the Free Society, which the Anarchists now under arrest in Chicago are said to comprise many of the members of the Executive Committee. It is the most sensational proof of an existence of a plot yet discovered and binds its members "to advocate and work for the destruction of the existing social order, with its laws and institutions and the common division of property."

"We hold it to be self-evident, the manual proceeds, that the Government, the law, the schools, the churches, and the press are in the pay and under the control of the capitalists, and will never consent to the laborers' demands unless compelled by force. We maintain that all property owned by corporations and individuals should be destroyed, and all capital which has been produced by labor should be transferred into common property, for it is only when capital is made common and indivisible that all can be made to partake fully and freely of the fruits of common activity. Only by the

impossibility of acquiring individual capital can everyone be compelled to work who claims a right to live. As in former times no privileged class ever relinquished its tyranny. No more can we take it for granted that the capitalists of the present day will forego their privileges and their authority without compulsion. Under all these circumstances there is only one remedy left—force."

A separate chapter is devoted to a directions on "how to be an assassin," and abundance of friends is promised those who undertake to carry out by force the tenets of the society.

When President Garfield was shot down by Guiteau July 2 1881, it was thought he could live only a few hours, but he lingered until Sept. 19. The President addressing his leading physician just after the shooting said "conceal nothing from me remember, I am not afraid to die, tell me the worst."

"Mr. President," Dr. Bliss replied, "your condition is extremely critical, I do not think that you can live many hours."

"God's will be done, doctor, I am ready to go if my time has come," the wounded man responded, firmly.

How similar to McKinley's last words "It is God's way, His will be done."

President Roosevelt has promised to pursue the policy of the martyred McKinley, and starts on his responsible mission with the good wishes of the great bulk of his countrymen. The gallant colonel of the Rough Riders has faced many difficult situations, and those who know him best have faith in his ability to fill the president's chair with acceptance to the nation.

Mrs. McKinley will be comfortably off, the President having left a snug fortune besides \$75,000 life insurance. When Garfield was assassinated \$360,000 was set aside for his family by public subscription, and his widow receives a pension of \$5,000 a year from the government.

Yes, Canada would willingly spare the Duke of York a couple of days to represent his father, the King, at the late President McKinley's funeral, but what of the danger. H. R. H. must be most sacredly guarded against the bullets of the anarchists.

According to an Opposition newspaper, the Liberal party in Cape Breton county is a combination of hidebound party hacks that vote as their fathers did, and numbers of renegade Tories. That is a pretty good combination, and one hard to down.

The evidences of grief all over the British Empire at the assassination of McKinley, bear eloquent testimony to the strong bond of kinship which unites the two great English speaking nations of the world.

The city council meets this evening to decide whether or not the city clerk shall deliver up possession of his back office to the chief assessor, and a brilliant debate is anticipated.

The great steel strike by which nearly 100,000 men were thrown out of employment in the United States, has been settled, and the men resumed work today.

The Nova Scotia exhibition which opened at Halifax Saturday, is said to be the most extensive ever seen in that city.

A report is current that the Duke of York may attend the funeral of the late President McKinley at Washington.
