

PEARY NEAR THE POLE.

The First News in Three Years Has been Received

EXPLORER IS WELL AND REMAINS NORTH.

He Reached 83 50 Degrees of Latitude—Mrs. Peary and Daughter Are Back.

Halifax, Sept. 13.—The steamer Erik arrived at North Sydney this morning after a most successful expedition. Lieut. Peary was found, and he and all his party are safe.

Lieut. Peary still remains north to continue his work, but Mrs. Peary and her little daughter Marie, together with Mrs. Pierce, stewardess of the Windward, have come back on the Erik.

Lieut. Peary succeeded in penetrating as far as 83 50 north, the furthest north ever reached before. The Erik found the Windward at Etah. Lieut. Peary was left at Cape Sabien.

The only mishap the Erik met with was the loss of an anchor at Alexandria. The relief expedition have brought back some 350 walrus heads and a number of kayaks and other curiosities. All the members of the expedition are well.

Lieut. Robert E. Peary sailed on his present voyage on July 7, 1898, over three years ago. The last news heard from him was dated in Greenland on August 13th of that year, and was simply to the effect that "So far all my plans have been successfully carried out." Lieut. Peary's first Arctic expedition was in 1891-2, when he determined the insularity of Greenland, and his second in 1893-5. He undertook summer trips in 1896 and 1897, and published the results of his work in "Northward over the Great Ice: A Complete Narrative of Arctic Work." During his summer trips he discovered and brought home the Cape York meteorites, the largest known in the world.

When Lieut. Peary left on his last trip it was with the determination to reach the Pole before he returned. He expected to be away perhaps two, perhaps five years. He made careful preparations for the trip, which he made in the Windward. The steamer Hope, which carried a cargo of coal and a large stock of provisions, sailed in advance and met the Windward at Cape York. There Peary had arranged for twelve Esquimaux and a number of dogs to meet him, and after taking them on board the two vessels sailed to Kennedy Channel, landing the party and their stores there and returning to St. John's, Nfld. From Kennedy Channel the intention was to push ahead for the pole by sled and boat, establishing a chain of depots of stores along the way, upon which the party could retreat if need be.

The Windward was to sail to Kennedy Channel every summer, returning to Newfoundland if there was no sign of the party there. This she did for a couple of years, but the last time she did not return. A relief expedition was then organized and sailed in the Erik. Nearly all the crew of the Windward were Nova Scotians and Newfoundlanders.

The point reached by Lieut. Peary is only six and one half degrees, or 450 geographical miles, from the Pole.

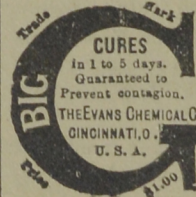
