

FATAL AFFRAY.

International Troops Come
Into Conflict in China.

**FRENCH SOLDIER KILLED AND
BRITISH AND GERMANS
WOUNDED.**

Trouble Arose Out of French-
men Housebreaking.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Tien Tsin June 3.—There was a serious affray yesterday, between the international troops. Some British fusiliers who were acting as police here and preventing French soldiers from house breaking, were attacked with bayonets and bricks.

The Fusiliers responded by firing into the air.

This brought a number of Germans to the aid of the Frenchmen. They numbered altogether 200 men.

Five Fusiliers fired again, this time killing one Frenchman and wounding three others.

In the subsequent fighting, four Fusiliers, five Germans and one Japanese were wounded.

The arrival of German officers and a strong guard ended the affray.

ELOPING GIRL DESERTED.

Sherbrooke, Que., June 3.—The excitement attendant upon the elopement of the hired man and the sixteen year old daughter of Mr West, a farmer at Fitch Bay, on Wednesday, was too much for the lover, and after braving and successfully overcoming many obstacles placed in the path of the fleeing pair, by the angry father of the girl, the prospective husband gave up the race, sought courage in drink, and finally deserted Miss West, at Dixville. There the father found her penitent and thoroughly disillusionized. She gladly accompanied him back home. The hired man had probably crossed into the United States.

In Favor of the Canteen.

St. Paul, Minn., June 3.—By a unanimous vote the Association of Military Surgeons, in session here, have passed a resolution in favor of the repeal of the anti-canteen law. The resolution recites: "That the abolition of the army post exchange or canteen has resulted and must inevitably result in an increase of intemperance, insubordination, discontent, desertion, and disease in the army." It deplores the abolishing of the said post exchange or canteen, and in the interest of sanitation, morality and discipline, recommends its re-establishment at the earliest possible date."

HE WANTED TO BE SURE.

Toronto, June 3.—"I wish to be buried in the family burying plot in the cemetery near Whitby. I also wish my executrix to see that every precaution known to medical science be taken to ascertain that I am absolutely dead before I am laid to rest in my grave."

Shortly after George Herbert Dartnell, late of Montreal, and a property-owner of Toronto, added the above lines to his will he was taken sick, and died in Los Angeles, Cal., leaving all to his sister, Florence Katherine Dartnell of Toronto.

A MILITARY RIOT.

London, June 3.—A military riot occurred at Shorncliffe. A detachment of the Dublin Fusiliers, actuated by some imaginary grievance, wrecked the barrack room. The guard was called out to arrest the ringleaders and shots were fired by the Fusiliers, who met the reinforced guard with a volley of ball cartridge and with bayonets. Two men of the guard were seriously injured by bayonet thrusts. The riot lasted for two hours.

THE BREACH HEALED.

Cleveland, Ohio, June 3.—After ten years' separation, during which time the father's heart ached for reconciliation with his son, General William Booth, founder of the Salvation Army, and his son, General Ballington of the American volunteers, have about reached an understanding that will reunite them. Ballington, it is said, will return to the fold of the Salvation Army and receive an appointment in some other country.

A HANDSOME GRANT.

Moncton, June 3.—A. S. Whitmore of Moncton, whose son Pte Harry Whitmore, died in South Africa, recently re-

ceived \$1,000 from the Canadian patriotic fund. He also received a box of articles from South Africa, belonging to his son, including Dutch bibles weighing 10 lbs, several Kruger \$5 gold pieces and other articles of value.

MACHINISTS' CONGRESS.

Toronto, June 3.—The convention of International machinists opened here this morning under President O'Connell with 200 delegates. President O'Connell spoke encouragingly of the prospect for victory for the men now out, and expressed confidence that ultimately a universal nine hour day be expected.

AN OTTAWA STRIKE.

Ottawa, June 3.—Carpenters, woodworkers, plumbers, and tinsmiths, to the number of some hundreds, ceased work this morning as their demands for increased pay had not been granted. The men ask for an increase of twenty-five per cent.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

London, June 3.—The Sun today publishes a sensational story to the effect that General Botha has arrived at Standerton and is communicating by telegraph with Mr. Kruger through the Netherlands government, appealing to Mr. Kruger to sue for peace. Lord Kitchener is said to have given Botha permission to adopt this course. The Sun further hears that 10,000 Zulus have gone on the war-path owing to Boer raids in Zoland.

The reticence of the government regarding the battle of Vlakfontein and other military events of some importance which have recently occurred at widely separated points in South Africa, has led to considerable anxiety. This is no way allayed by the answer of the war office today to questions regarding the accuracy or otherwise of the recent Boer report that the British were severely defeated near Pretoria, May 2, losing 46 killed, 80 wounded, 600 prisoners and six guns. The reply which the war office vouchsafed, "We have no official information," has aroused some discussion.

A MISSIONARY'S DEATH.

Toronto, June 3.—A cable from Formosa announces the death of Dr MacKay, a great missionary. He was born in Oxford county, Ontario, in 1844.

Dr MacKay, after ordination, decided to take up missionary work in the Island of Formosa, which he made his life work. He established 70 churches together with schools and college for the higher education of women.

He married a native in 1878, and adopted native costume. When Formosa was conquered by Japan, Dr. MacKay took an active part in reconciling the natives and saved much bloodshed.

Dr. Mackay's last visit to Canada was in 1894. He was then elected moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly as a token of appreciation of his great work. He leaves a son and two daughters, who are engaged in the work of civilizing their native land.
