THE CALL FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

Less than two years ago the call came from the British provinces of South Africa to Canada for help in the work of driving back the Boer invasion, and how nobly that call was responded to is written in the history of Paardeberg and a dozen other bloody fields of battle, on which our brave soldiers in their defence of the Empire laid down their valuable lives, and added a new chapter to the glorious records of the past.

There was no hesitation in accepting the invitation. Our fellow colonists were in dire straits, the Empire was in danger, and Canadians hurried to enlist themselves under the banner that has stood for ages as the embodiment of freedom, of progress, of civilization and Christianity.

Now another call issues from the conquered and annexed republics which are to join the British federation in South Africa. The Transvaal and Orange River provinces send in a request, not for soldiers, but for men and women to engage in the peaceful pursuits of life, who are equipped and prepared to educate the youth of these countries, to organize a school system and administration, and lay the foundation of their future greatness. The invitation comes especially to New Brunswick for teachers to labor in the public schools, for men to lay broad and deep the basis of a free school system that shall do for the emancipated provinces what it has wrought in our own country.

And what response shall we make.

One day last autumn a cultured, attractive gentleman presented to the Chief Superintendent of Education in New Brunswick, credentials from the British department of education in England, and sought an opportunity of observing something of our public schools. He spent a day at the Normal and Model schools in this city, closely looking into the admirable work done there. He asked many questions, evincing a remarkable interest in the subject of education for what he was then believed to be a mere casual visitor, interested generally in educational matters. But he was more, as subsequent events have proved. The gentleman was none other than Mr. E. D. Sargent, the director of education in the Transvaal, and Orange River colonies, sent by Sir Alfred Milner at the instance of the British government to study our educational system, and to make notes for future guidance in the work before him in distant South Africa. He learned much and appreciated much, and he arrived at the conclusion that he could not do better than to copy our educational methods, in installing a system of public schools in the provinces committed to his charge. He wants not only a copy of our system, but our men and women to assist in its introduction and management. His request to Dr. Inch for assistance has already been referred to in the Herald and has attracted widespread attention. Not only has Mr. Sargent made a request in a general way for assistance, but he has named at least three persons in the employ of our educational department whom he desires to help him in his work in South Africa. He wants to borrow Principal Mullin of the Normal School, Dr. H. S. Bridges superintendent of the St. John, schools and Miss Clara Bridges teacher of the primary department of the Model school. These three he has seen at work, he has studied their methods, observed their high professional accomplishments, and he concludes that in the organization of the schools in South Africa, they are equipped to play an im-

portant part, and he wants to borrow their services, and to induce others to remove to the new British provinces.

The Herald does not know what may come out of Mr. Sargent's proposal. Doubtless it will be laid before the Board of Education, and the individuals most interested duly consulted.

Whether or not any response is made to Mr. Sargent's urgent call, the fact remains that he has paid our educational system, the officials who administer it, and the teachers who labor in the schools, the highest possible compliment—one that will be jealously regarded by those of other provinces and countries.

The military and civil tangle which arose at Halifax over the court martial of a soldier has been unravelled. The writ of habeas corpus issued by Judge Townsend to prevent the prisoner being lodged in Dorchester penitentiary, has been overruled by the Supreme Court, and the offender was taken to Dorchester today. Col. Wadmore appeared before the judges to answer to the charge of contempt in having thrown the writ out of the window of the barracks when an attempt was made to serve it on him, and after expressing his regret at his hasty action, done in the heat of temper, he was admonished and permitted to depart.

The St. John Tory Star informs us that the recent contest for grand-master of the Provincial Orange lodge was run on party lines, bearing out the general impression that the institution has degenerated into a political machine, of which Tories profess to have full control.

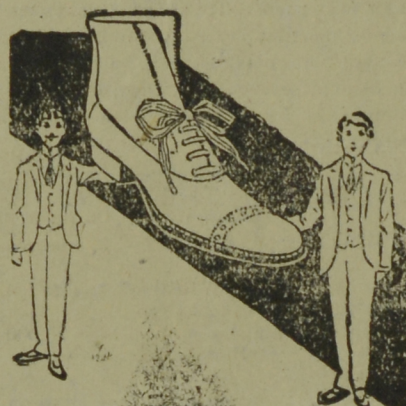

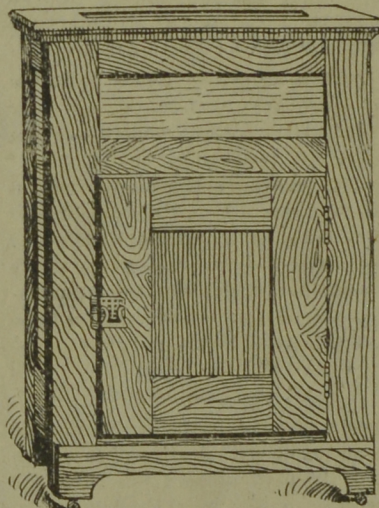
