DOMESTIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS.

The Ontario educational authorities are taking steps to have the female pupils of the public schools in that province instructed in cookery and sewing. An experienced lady teacher in these subjects is to be sent by the government to towns and villages to give practical demonstration in cookery and sewing, with the idea that the school boards will come to realize their necessity as a part of the regular curriculum. Any school board desiring these demonstrations must send in word, and while the expenses will be mainly borne by the Department of Education, that portion incidental to lessons will have to be borne by the school boards.

This is giving education a practical turn, and may result in young men from other provinces seeking Ontario wives in the future. The Ontario government, innocently of course, is really establishing an effective matrimonial bureau, which is likely to yield important results. Down here in New Brunswick such a scheme might work to advantage, but there is less need of it than in the premier province. The mothers of our girls of course see to it that their daughters are instructed in the arts of housekeeping. The young ladies who are to be seen daily on our streets, decked out in the height of fashion, who dance, and go camping, who play tennis, and skate and flirt, have lots of time to prepare themselves for future usefulness as caretakers of households. The young men who are looking for wives with the homely, yet necessary accomplishments—girls who can cook and sew and manage to make home a pleasant place, never for a moment doubt that the objects of their search are endowed with all the qualities that go to make a cherished, useful and thrifty helpmeet, and they are not often disappointed. Occasionally of course there are girls, who garbed in stylish shirt waist, high collar and fashionable skirt, find their chief occupation in promenading the streets, or when at home, thumb the family piano and sing "Who will care for mother now," while the latter wrestles with pots and kettle in the kitchen, or sweeps the cobwebs from the attic timbers, but they are the exception, and not the rule. The girls of Ontario will receive instruction in sewing and cooking in the schools, but ours learn these useful arts in the home, and are well equipped to resist the attack of the newly formed Ontario matrimonial bureau. The Herald thinks so at least, and it is scarcely possible that we can be mistaken. Perhaps the girls will institute a searching self-examination on the subject, now that it has been called to their attention.

MR GIBSON'S CANVAS.

Rev Dr McLeod is conducting an active platform canvas all over York County, N. B. He is speaking night after night. The Liberals are as yet taking no part at all in the contest. Turo Daily News.

Editor Dimock must have drawn his information from a McLeod source. Mr Gibson has been pursuing a vigorous canvas ever since his nomination, and has been meeting with most gratifying success. It is true no public meetings have yet been called in the interests of the Liberal candidate—these will come later—but Mr Gibson has met the electors in their homes and in their fields, and has been most warmly received. The people like to make the personal acquaintance of gentlemen seeking to represent them in the legislature

in parliament, and they find in Mr Gibson one who thoroughly knows their interests, a practical man of the people, without ostentation or swelled head, and they are glad to know him and offer their support in the approaching election. Mr Gibson has visited more than half the parishes of the county, has traversed them from end to end, has been everywhere received with kindness and cordiality, and his canvas will tell in his favor when the electors go to the polls.

Mr. McLeod has held a number of meetings, but in most instances has spoken to a large array of empty benches. There is no enthusiasm over his candidature, and a Conservative M. P., who knows the county and Mr McLeod pretty well, declared only this week that the faction candidate is much discouraged at the coolness of his reception in the constituency.

FREDERICTON'S OPPORTUNITY.

The Duke of York will not visit Fredericton, but it is open to the mayor and aldermen of this city to present an address to His Highness, at St. John, assuring him of the loyalty and devotion to the Crown, of the people of this city.

Addresses to the Duke may be presented at the following centres: Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Regina, Vancouver, Victoria, Toronto, London, Kingston, St. John, Halifax. Addresses from other cities or towns should be presented at the centre. Addresses should be short and worded as concisely as possible.

Drafts of addresses for presentation to Their Royal Highnesses should reach the Governor General's secretary at the Citadel, Quebec, by the first of September next, for approval. It should be stated at which centre it is proposed to present them.

A deputation intended to present an address should be limited to four individuals. The names of the proposed deputation should, in every case, accompany the draft of the address.

Fredericton's address could be presented to the Duke at St. John, and no doubt Mayor Crockett or some of the aldermen will move in the matter of preparing such a document at the next meeting of the council.

A COSTLY ADDRESS.

When the question of the validity of the Manitoba prohibition law came up in the English privy council, their Lordship, asked the Attorney General of Manitoba if he had anything to say in defence of the legislation, and Mr. Campbell's reply was "Nothing my Lords." The Manitoba Free Press commenting on the incident, says this will prove the costliest address ever delivered. It figures that the attorney general's expenses to England will be fully \$700, so that Manitoba will have to pay \$233.33 for each of the three words uttered by its attorney general in the highest court of the realm. The Free Press adds that it is to be hoped that every taxpayer will feel it a privilege to be blessed with a government which enacts a law and then declines to explain or defend it.

The visit of Hon. Sydney Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, to England, is resulting in benefit to Canada in many ways. One of the things Mr. Fisher accomplished was securing from the British war office large orders for further supply of Canadian hay for use in South Africa. By means of this all the old hay in Canada, of suitable quality, will be cleaned up and exported in September. Orders were taken for all the hay that could be secured in Canada. New hay, of course, will not be fit for export for several months. No less than four steamers are to load hay at St. John next month.

Our correspondent at Harvey, writing this Friday morning, says: "Mr. Alex. Gibson, jr., the Liberal candidate for the House of Commons, was here on Wednesday, and called upon a number of the electors. He is meeting with much encouragement in his canvass, and will increase his majority in this parish."

VIOLENT ELECTRIC STORM.

Two Persons Killed and Several Injured.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 9.—A violent electric storm accompanied by a wind of unusual velocity struck this city late yesterday afternoon causing loss of life and a heavy damage to property. The roof of a large stone shed, at the navy yard in which 60 men were at work collapsed, burying half of them in the wreckage. A woman who had sought shelter in the shed from the tempest was killed and many of the workmen maimed. It is feared other bodies are buried in the ruins. Property at the yard was badly damaged.

The dead are: Mrs. L. M. Mealey, of New York, wife of Howard H. Mealey, a member of the Naval band at the navy yard. Joel Pearson, stenographer. The injured: John Robinson, stonecutter, right leg broken and contusions on the left leg, John Karlstrom, stonecutter, finger cut, Inspector of Granite Sullivan of Concord, and Superintendent of Granite Webber, badly bruised. All were buried in the wreck.

Toronto Doctor Suicides.

Toronto, Aug. 9.—Dr. Overton F. MacDonald, a prominent physician of this city, committed suicide at his home last evening by shooting himself in the heart with a shot gun. He had been in poor health for some time as the result of an attack of la grippe and had acted peculiarly of late, apparently having a religious mania. He was 36 years of age and leaves his wife and one daughter.
