New York Yachting Expert Declares

THREW THE RACE

Because His Wife was not Allowed on the Shamrock.

New York, Oct. 5.—J. R. Speers, a yachting expert for the New York World, claims that Jameson, Lipton's yachting manager, threw the race to the Columbia, that he ordered Captain Sycamore to change the course of the Shamrock in such a manner as to lose several minutes time.

Speers claims that Jameson quarrelled with Lipton because he would not allow his (Jameson's) wife to remain on the Shamrock during the races, and took this means to be revenged.

ARCHBISHOP MAKES SENSATION

Calls on British People to Observe Day of Humiliation on Account of South African War.

London, Oct. 5.—The Archbishop of York's pastoral, proposing a day of national humiliation because of the slow success of British arms in South Africa, and of penitence for national sins, has been received with astonishment, especially as he openly suggests therein, an imitation of the Boers, who proclaimed Aug. 9 as a day of national humiliation.

The Archbishop quotes the Boer proclamation in full for the edification of the British clergy.

ST. JOHN'S PREPARATIONS

For Receiving the Royal Visitors—The Programme Curtailed.

George Robertson, M.P.P., and Lieut. Col. McLean had a conference Friday at St. John, respecting the provision of quarters for the visiting troops on the occasion of the royal visit. The colonel and the secretary of the government executive paid a visit to the Barracks square and discussed the advisability of using Agricultural hall for the purpose mentioned.

Decisions relative to the schemes mentioned will be reached next week, when, also, contracts in connection with the maintenance of the troops will be awarded.

Several loads of materials for decorating the government buildings in St. John arrived yesterday from Ottawa.

The advices from Major Maude state: A telegram received by Lieut. Governor McClellan from Major Maude, secretary to Lord Minto, announces that the royal party will leave St. John at 11.30 a. m. on the second day of their stay in St. John. The programme according to the wishes of his royal highness now stands fixed.

Seventeenth of October, arrive two in the afternoon, procession to exhibition building, presentation of addresses.

Three o'clock in the afternoon, presentation of colors and medals.

Nine thirty, evening reception at exhibition building.

Eighteenth October, 11.30 a. m., leave St. John.

Their royal highnesses and her excel-

lency will gladly dine and sleep on night of 17th at houses so kindly provided for them. Please notify all around.

This intimates that the governor general is not coming to St. John, but that Lady Minto will be there.

YALE'S BI-CENTENNIAL

Dr. Harrison Will Represent the U. N. B. and Dublin University.

The authorities of the University of Dublin, have appointed Dr. Harrison of the University of New Brunswick to represent them at the Bi-Centennial celebration of Yale College to be held at Yale College on October 20th. Dr. Harrison, who is a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin, has been authorized to take with him two other graduates of the same college living in America, Prof. Stockley, of the U. N. B., if he likes, and some one else, but the choice is left entirely with the doctor. Owing to the fact that two professors cannot leave the U. N. B., at the same time, Prof. Stockley will be unable to go, and Prof. Dixon, another graduate of Trinity, who has been asked to become one of the delegates, cannot very well leave his duties at Dalhousie College. Dr. Harrison has extended an invitation to Dr. Johnson, Vice Principal of McGill University, to be one of the three, and the latter has intimated that he will accept. Dr. Johnson, it will be remembered, attended the centennial of the U. N. B., and made a most agreeable impression by his speech at the City Hall. The third delegate selected by Dr. Harrison is still to be heard from.

The U. N. B. has received an invitation to be represented at the Yale Centennial, so that Dr. Harrison will have the honor of representing both universities.

Provincial S. S. Convention.

Letters from the Field Secretary of the province to the local committee of the Sunday School convention, to be held in this city next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, indicate that there is a deep interest awakened in these approaching meetings. The distinguished visitor, Dr. Clarke, of Columbus, Ohio, will spend Sunday in the city of St. John, coming up here on Tuesday next. Toronto, Oct. 5.—A nine-year-old boy named Coates yesterday shot and instantly killed the 19-month-old girl of Ernest Chater, his uncle. The boy came into Chater's residence with a message, and after delivering it, lifted up a rifle lying in the corner, and pointing it at Mrs. Chater and the baby in her arms, fired. The bullet struck the child in the head, killing it instantly. The boy did not know the gun was loaded.

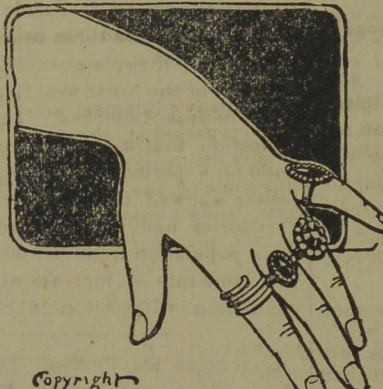
