Death From Diphtheria.

Daisy E. Tims, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Tims, died at her home on York street last evening, aged three years and eleven months. Her death was due to an attack of diphtheria, and occurred after a week's illness. The funeral took place at four o'clock this afternoon, Rev. Mr. Bedell officiating. Mr Weddall will finish out the year at St John, and leave for his new charge in July, 1902. Mr Weddall enjoys the distinction of being the first pastor in Queen square church to remain in charge for five continuous years.

Died in The West.

Clarence Currie of Bath, Carleton County, who went west with the harvest excursion, died recently at Port Arthur, Ont., after a short illness from typhoid fever. He was taken ill while on his way back to New Brunswick. The deceased was only sixteen years of age, and a very bright and promising youth. He was a brother of George W Currie of St John, son-in-law of R. A. Estey of this city. Mr Currie went to Newburg

Junction this morning, to meet the remains on their arrival from the west, and accompany them to Bath, where interment will be made. The friends and family of the unfortunate young man are prostrated with grief over the sad event.

HAD TO BE STOPPED.

Telephone Lineman made a Bad Job of Trimming Trees.

The telephone company's linemen, acting upon a resolution passed at the last meeting of the city council, started in yesterday to trim some of the trees on University Avenue, lately known as College road. The men selected to do the trimming either had very poor tools to work with, or were without previous experience in that line. Several citizens who noticed what they were doing, called Ald. Farrell's attention to the matter, and the latter at once ordered the work of mutilation stopped. The trees were to have been trimmed under the supervision of the roadmaster, but that official was not in evidence while the mischief was being done yesterday.

Organizing a Company.

George Wettlaufer and Benjamin Allen, of Stratford, Ont., are in the city with the object of organizing a stock company to manufacture a combination wagon box, and hay stock and grain rack. One of the latter has been on exhibition in the yard of Long's hotel for several days, and has attracted a great deal of attention from the farmers and others. It is a most ingenious contrivance and to charge it from a hay-rack to a wagon box is but the work of a moment. The promoters of the company are meeting with every encouragement, and anticipate no difficulty in disposing of the stock. The authorized capital of the proposed company will be about \$25,000 and the factory to be located here, will manufacture for the lower provinces.

Was in a Hurry.

NARROW ESCAPE.

A Tobique Man's Fierce
Battle With a Bull
Moose.ARMED WITH NOTHING BUT AN
AXEHe Fought the Animal Single
Handed and Finally Laid
Him Out.

William Day, a resident of Plaster Rock, Victoria county, had an exciting experience with a large bull moose in the woods near the mouth of the Wapskie River, a few days ago. He was at work chopping wood, when it came along and without a moment's warning lowered its head and charged straight for him. Mr. Day attempted to dodge behind a tree, but he was not quick enough, and one of the animal's horns caught him upon the left side. His clothing was torn, and he was badly lacerated upon the arm and side before he could free himself. He was armed with nothing but an axe and defended himself from the vicious onslaught of the beast as best he could. Finally, after considerable dodging and when he was almost ready to succumb from loss of blood, Mr. Day managed to get in a well directed blow on the bull's head, which sent him to earth. He followed up his advantage and soon had his four footed antagonist hors de combat.

Mr. Day is suffering from the effects of the combat but he has the satisfaction of knowing that the moose came out second best. There are said to be very few cases on record where a moose has been known to attack a man in the woods without the slightest provocation as is claimed was done in this case.
