Fire Destroyed a Large Number of Buildings

AT LAPRAIRIE, QUEBEC.

Verdict of Not Guilty in Celebrated Fosburg Murder Case.

Montreal, July 26.—A fire at La Prairie which raged all night destroyed 29 buildings, including the convent of the congregation of Notre Dame. In all 29 buildings were destroyed. Loss \$100,000.

The blaze broke out at 11 o'clock and was not under control until early this forenoon.

The Montreal brigade arrived on the scene in time to render assistance.

With the exception of the convent, all the buildings burned are small residences. A large number of families are homeless.

FOSBURG IS FREE.

A GRAND EVENT

Fredericton in the evening presented a fairy-like sight; its streets were never more brilliant or crowded. The illumination from the parliament building along the front street was very general. The officers square, where the fireworks were set off and the band played, was the centre of attraction, the lamps hung on the old willows had a beautiful effect, the windows of the officers' quarters shone with red, white and blue lights, and the words of welcome to Lorne and Louise shone out from the colored lights in front of the club. The hotels and stores along Queen street and the public buildings were magnificently illuminated, the display passing all expectations.

On Sunday forenoon the vice regal party attended divine service in the Cathedral, the Metropolitan being the preacher. Large congregations assembled at St Paul's church both morning and evening and were disappointed that the distinguished visitors did not worship with them.

At eleven o'clock on Monday forenoon the vice regal party visited the Normal school and were shown over the building by Dr Rand and Principal Crockett, and afterwards wrote their names in the visitors book.

From the Normal school the vice regal party drove to the University, where their Excellencies were received by Dr Jack and members of the Senate, and shown through the building.

In the meantime, the exhibition building was being filled by the lieges of all conditions; galleries ground floor and aisles of the carpeted pathway from the main entrance to the dias; expectation lighted up every eye, animation pervaded every gesture; and members of the city and county councils, all in new tall beavers, with the Mayor the Warden and the city clerk and county treasurer and auditor assembled in front of the dias. A thrill went through the throng when the skiel of the bagpipes was heard, followed by the clangor of the band; the main entrance was thrown open, and soon the governor general and princess walked up the pathway to the dias followed by their suite and a civic procession, headed by the

mayor and sheriff, amid the cheers of the great assemblage.

His Excellency was presented with an address by Mayor Gregory of Fredericton and William McBean, warden of the County of York, and he replied to them separately.

A beautiful bouquet was presented to the Princess Louise by little Miss Agnes Sterling who had Misses May Blair and Agnes Neill with her, and the governor general shook them by the hand pleasantly.

The aldermen, county councillors and high sheriff were afterwards presented to their Excellencies and most of them acquitted themselves with inborn grace. The proceedings came to a close with hearty cheers for their Excellencies and the Queen.

In the evening there was a state dinner at Government House, and afterwards a reception was held, when the following were among the ladies and gentlemen presented to their Excellencies:

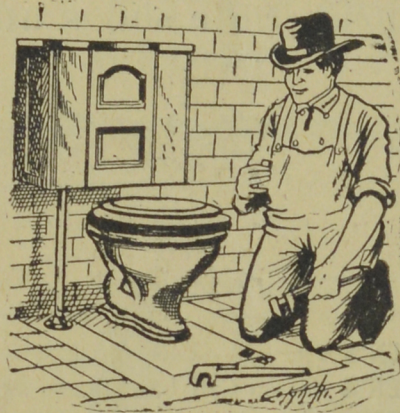

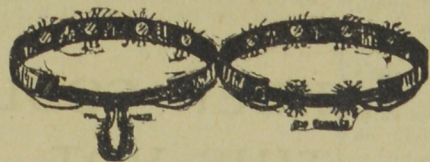
