

C. OF E. SYNOD.

19th Century Thanksgiv-
ing Fund of \$50,000 to
be Raised.

DELEGATES APPOINTED TO THE
GENERAL SYNOD.

The Synod resumed proceedings at
three o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

A memorial was read from Shediak
Church Society, regretting the taking
away of the aid to religious education in
that parish, the fund which they had
formerly held. This communication re-
ferred to the Madras school matter which
was before a committee of the Legislature
at last session. Judge Hanington moved
that the petition be referred to a commit-
tee.

W E Smith, treasurer of the Synod,
read a list of parishes in the province
which had not paid their assessment.

The secretary read a communication
from the diocese of Huron, wherein later
referred to the widows and orphans fund
and asked that the society take such
action as may be deemed proper in the
matter.

The Bishop appointed T C Allen and G
O D Otty a committee to consider the
matter mentioned in the communication.

On motion of Rev H Montgomery the
sympathy of the Synod was extended to
the secretary of the Synod, Rev O S
Newnam, in his illness.

The Bishop, speaking to the motion
referred to the deep interest always taken
by Mr Newnam in the work of the
Synod.

Rev W O Raymond, of St. John, pre-
sented a report from the executive com-
mittee.

Rev J DeWolfe Cowie presented a re-
port of the board of diocesan missions.

The report of the board of Finance was
presented by W M Jarvis. Report was
received and adopted.

J Roy Campbell, St. John, read report
of the board of church literature, which
showed the amount received from the
sales of books for year ending Dec. 1900
was \$996.07, as compared with \$798.96
for the previous year. The value of the
stock on hand at the close of the year
was \$2,389.91, or about three hundred
dollars increase over that of the previous
year.

Report of memorials and deceased
members was presented by the Dean and
showed that while no clergymen had
passed away during the year, four lay
members had departed this life.

The memorial in the report presented
by the Dean recommends that no change
be made in the Glebe law as it at present
exists.

W E Smith, treasurer of the synod,
presented a report which was received.

Dean Partridge as governor of the
board of Kings College presented a report.
The Dean stated that last year he with
the late George A Schofield were appointed
to represent the Synod of N. B. as gov-
ernors, and that owing to the death of
Mr Schofield he (the dean) was the only
surviving governor. The Dean paid a trib-
ute to the memory of Mr Schofield.

Judge Hanington presented a report
of the Edgehill school for girls at
Windsor N. S.; received and adopted.

The committee on education reported
through Rev. J. A. Richardson.

Archdeacon Neale read report regard-
ing lay cooperation which report offered
certain suggestions regarding the help to
be received by lay members.

Rev A. G. H. Dicker read a report of
the society for propagation of the gospel.

Very Rev Dean Partridge asked that
the rules of order be suspended and that
Mr Herbert Carleton, general secretary
of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew be in-
vited to address the Synod at three
o'clock this afternoon. It was decided to
invite Mr Clarke to address the meeting.

Mr G. O. D., Otty read a report from
the sub-committee on the proposed cen-
tury fund, recommending the formation
of such a fund to be known as the Nine-
teenth Century Thanksgiving fund, to
extend over a period not exceeding three
years, and be not less than \$50,000, and
to be expended for (1) increasing the
capital of the Diocesan Mission Fund, (2)
the church education fund, (3) the in-
capacitated clergy fund, (4) the payment
of parochial debts if any.

The report was adopted.

The Bishop extended his thanks to
Chancellor T C Allen for the efficient aid
he had rendered and the Synod adjourn-
ed until 8 o'clock.

At last evening's session of the
Diocesan Synod, parish reports were read
from the different rectors throughout the
Diocese. The session adjourned at 10.15
o'clock.

Report of Rev Canon Roberts of St
Ann's Parish church, Fredericton, show-
ed that two confirmations had been held
at the Parish church during the year,
one on Aug 5, 1900, when seven candi-
dates were present, and one on May
15th last when eight persons
received confirmation. There was a
greater prevalence of sickness than usual
and the parish diary shows 705 visits to
the sick. A goodly number of collectors
from the Cathedral and parish have
undertaken to obtain contributions for
the Home Mission fund and also about
\$100 has already been promised by new
subscribers chiefly through appeals of Rev
J. DeWolfe Cowie.

Another report of Rev Canon Roberts
states that \$400 has already been
promised in the parish for the Home
Mission Fund and that there is good
prospect of \$900 being raised.

The Synod assembled again at ten
o'clock this morning.

The Dean referred to the death of
the four lay members of the Synod
who passed away since the
last meeting and in introducing resolu-
tion of condolence on the death of the
late Geo A. Schofield, and in moving the
resolution he paid a warm tribute to
deceased. T. C. Allen, seconded
the resolution in an appropriate
address. Rev. J. DeSoyres added
a word expressing his feeling of re-
spect and admiration for deceased.

Judge Hanington added a word to
what had been said.

Rev Mr Street, of Bathurst, introduced
a resolution of condolence on the death
of the late Charles W Raymond, of
Woodstock, paying an eloquent tribute
to the memory of the deceased.

the committee who was the proper per-
son to instruct the roadmaster. He
thought that a little too much feeling had
been shown in regard to the matter, and
hoped that a better understanding would
be arrived at in the future.

Ald McNally said the sub-committee
had at first given their instructions
through the chairman of the committee
but they found that the roadmaster was
not carrying them out. Then they were
obliged to take other steps, but he claim-
ed that there was no disposition on the
part of the sub-committee to ignore Ald
Farrell.

Ald Farrell said that he did not wish
to be ignored in the matter and if it was
the understanding of a majority of the
board, that he was to be consulted in
future, he would not press his motion.
The matter then dropped.

A petition from Miss Alice Thompson
praying for permission to erect a balcony
over the sidewalk at her residence on
King street, and a counter petition from
N J Smith praying that the prayer of the
petition be not granted, were read to the
council.

On motion of Ald Farrell the petitions
were received and ordered to be placed
on file.

The city clerk stated that the council
had no power to grant permission to any
person to put up a structure extending
over the street. The authorities had not
usually interfered in the past where no
objection was made.

A request from Lilly & Sons for permis-
sion to erect an awning was referred to
the road committee, and they were also
asked to enforce the law in regard to low
cross signs.

The financial committee were instruct-
ed to sell \$4,000 worth of 4 per cent city
debentures and redeem debentures now
falling due.

The special tax committee was author-
ized to stir up the tax collector, and
make a new appointment if necessary.

The question of having signs placed on
street corners was introduced by Ald
McNally, and after some discussion the
matter was referred to a sub-committee,
with power to call for tenders for the
work.
At midnight the council adjourned sine
die.
