He—Fourteen months.

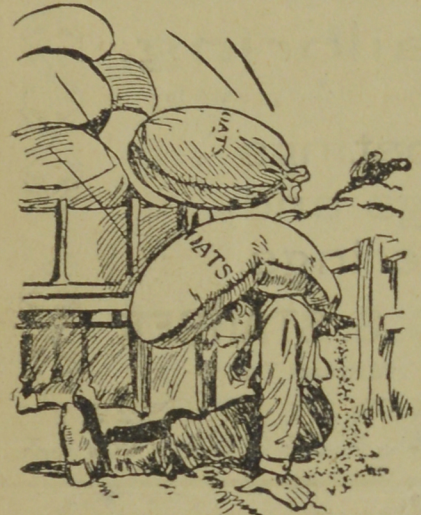
"Have you picked out a profession for him yet?"

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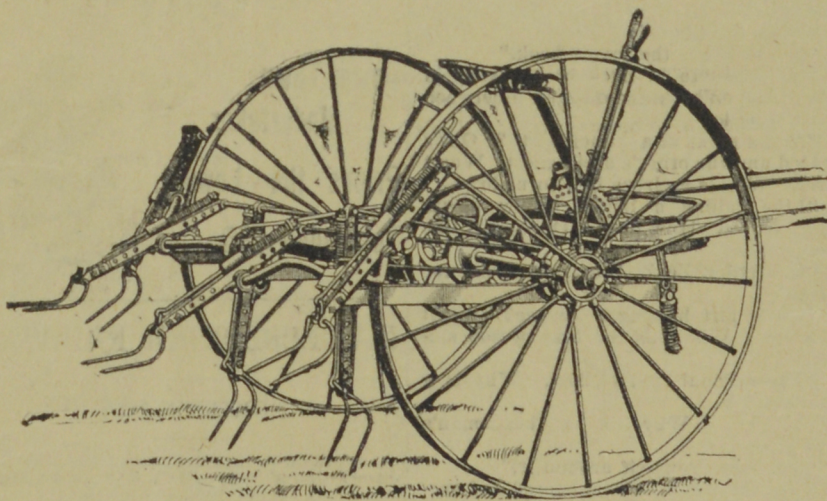

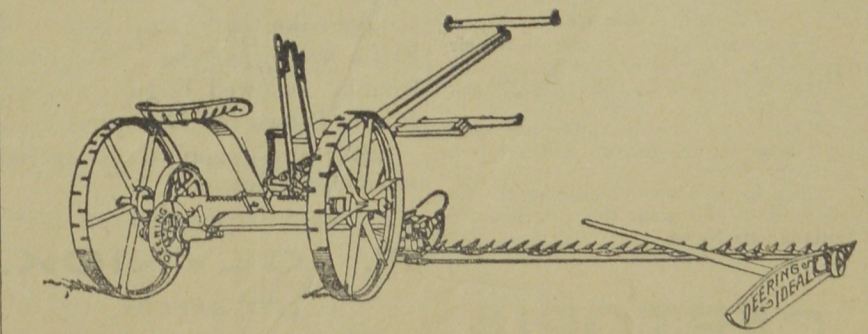
