The contract for the substructure of the Andover bridge over the river St John has been awarded to Albert Brewer, of Carleton county.

The military authorities have commenced the erection of a picket fence on the Carleton street side of the barracks square. Harry M Clarke is doing the work.

Bullet Removed.

A boy named Fred Mitchell, who was shot in the shoulder while trying to burglarize a junk shop on Westmorland street some months ago, had the bullet extracted from his body a few days ago by a local physician.

A Circus Coming.

The Pan-American circus is to give two performances in Scully's grove, here on July 20th. Charles Ellis the advance agent, is now here and the first advertising car will arrive on Saturday. The circus will arrive in two trains over the Canada Eastern and will go from this city to Woodstock.

Trackmen on Trial.

The examination of Thomas Kennedy and Edward Appleby, of Millville, who are charged with interfering with the maintenance of the C P R, was commenced before Col Marsh at the police court this morning. A. J. Gregory appeared for the prosecution and J. H. Barry, K. C., for the defence. Andrew Acton, roadmaster of the C P R at Millville, was the first witness and he had not finished his testimony when the court adjourned at noon. The case is going on this afternoon.

Government Meeting.

The local government met last evening and heard a delegation composed of Col.
