THE BIG TAXPAYERS.

List of Those Who Will Contribute More Than \$50

TOWARDS DEFRAYING THE COST OF THE CIVIC GOVERNMENT.

Peoples' Bank of N. B. Heads the List.

F. B. Edgcombe the Heaviest Individual Taxpayer.

THE POLL TAX FIXED AT \$620, AND THE RATE OF TAXATION IS \$6.20

Principal Assessor Henry and his assistants have completed the assessment roll for the current year and handed it over to the city treasurer, who is now busy making out tax notices. The rate of taxation is \$1.03 per hundred on real or personal property and \$5.15 per hundred on income, an increase of 42 cents, and the poll tax is \$6.20, or 20 cents more than last year. There are in all 1720 polls, or twenty less than last year. A list of the ratepayers who will be called upon to contribute more than \$50 to the civic machine is as follows:
