PECULIAR LEGISLATION.

At St. John yesterday and today respectively, the Dental and Medical boards of New Brunswick conducted examinations for admission to practise, of gentlemen who have recently graduated from the leading dental and medical universities of the continent. Such a course is required by legislation which the dental and medical profession were able to secure from the Assembly, and which on the face of it looks like the highest kind of protection to the professions concerned, and as extremely unjust to those who are compelled to take the examinations.

Before a young man can practise dentistry in this province, after having obtained his degree at some recognized college, it is obligatory on him to pass the examination prescribed under the dental act, and to reside in the province six months. What reason or justification is there in any such regulation. If a man has successfully passed the final examinations at his college and received his degree, why should he be compelled to undergo further examination at the hands of the dental board. Is his graduation not sufficient evidence that he is qualified to practise his profession?

Similar regulations also apply to medical men in this province. The Herald has in mind a young gentleman who graduated in arts at Mount Allison University, took the full medical course and graduated with honors in medicine at McGill University, and has practised a year in one of the leading hospitals of the continent. Yet when he returns to his native province he is compelled to undergo examination before the New Brunswick medical board before being permitted to open an office for business.

Is not this all very absurd? Does it not look like attempted monopoly by those who were in practise and secured the unreasonable legislation.

It seems to the Herald at least, that the legislature should lay hands on the restrictions with which the dental and medical professions in this province have surrounded themselves.

THE PRINTING CONTRACT.

Mr. Pitts affects to believe that the Herald supports the holding of the Fredericton Exhibition because this office has been awarded the contract for printing in connexion with the enterprise, and the suggestion contains about as much sense and truthfulness as anything that emanates from the disarmed sectarian agitator and humpty dumpty showman. JOURNALISTIC MODESTY.

Our esteemed friend, Editor Simonds has received from himself a copy of a work he has written, and thus modestly

compliments himself editorially in his newspaper.

"We have received a pamphlet of 36 pages by Mr. C. E. A. Simonds, B. A., B. C. L. barrister-at-law, and registrar of the Diocese of Fredericton, entitled the Rectorial System in New Brunswick. It deals in a very precise and luminous manner with what has been a somewhat vexed question."

Mr Simonds then proceeds to declare that Mr. Simonds shows "A thorough and laudable acquaintance with the whole subject," and concludes with the exceedingly modest observation that "Mr. Simonds has rendered a great service to churchmen by his publication of this timely, judicious, and learned brochure, and, although all his positions may not be universally accepted, it is to be hoped that it will be widely distributed."

If all authors were permitted to review their own works, what an innumerable host of great literary men we should have. Mr Simonds is to be congratulated on having written such an exceedingly able book, but more especially is he to be felicitated on having had the opportunity of reviewing the work himself in the columns of his newspaper, a task that would have somewhat abashed a less modest man than "Mr C E A Simonds, B. A., B. C. L., barrister-at-law, and Registrar of the Diocese of Fredericton."

Speaker Henderson of the United States House of Representatives, who is visiting London, was accorded an interview with King Edward, and in recounting his experience with His Majesty declares "The King was perfectly frank and agreeable and looks forward to even more cordial relations than now exist between the English-speaking nations. America may depend upon the fact that she has no more cordial friend in the world than King Edward. While the details of our conversation may not be repeated, I can assure my American friends that England may be depended on in any ordinary controversy which may arise between the United States and the remainder of the world."

Hon John Costigan whose name has frequently been mentioned as the probable successor to Sir Louis Davies, as Minister of Marine and Fisheries, evidently has no expectation that he will be called to that position. To a Montreal Star reporter, Tuesday, Mr. Costigan in reply to the query "who will be the next Minister of Marine and Fisheries," said "I have no official information on the subject, but I understood that Sir Louis Davies will resign the portfolio shortly, if so, I am of the opinion that Hon. H. R. Emmerson will be appointed to the vacancy."

Mr. Pitts, who seems to be suffering this week from undue political excitement, and to whose case a dose of Cook's remedies should be applied, observes that "The men of York know how to conduct their own affairs, and they will do it." Just so. The men of York knew their duty in that respect in February, 1899, and they left Mr. Pitts stranded on the shore of political oblivion by a majority of some 1500.

The liberal conservatives of York have received a good deal of advice as to their course in the coming by-election. But they are of age and competent to decide for themselves.—Sun.

Most of the advice came from the Sun, which was very plainly told by the recognized organ of the party here to mind its own business.

The Conservatives of Nova Scotia are encountering difficulties in securing candidates for the approaching local elections. Mr McMullen, M P P, nominated in Colchester, has declined, and McKinnon and Macdonald who were offered a nomination in Cape Breton also refuse to sacrifice themselves.

The Dominion cabinet ministers at present in London, viz, Hon A G Blair, Sir Louis Davies, Hon W S Fielding, Hon Sydney Fisher and Hon David Mills, are to be honored with a banquet by the National Liberal Club.
