The Grocer—Yes.

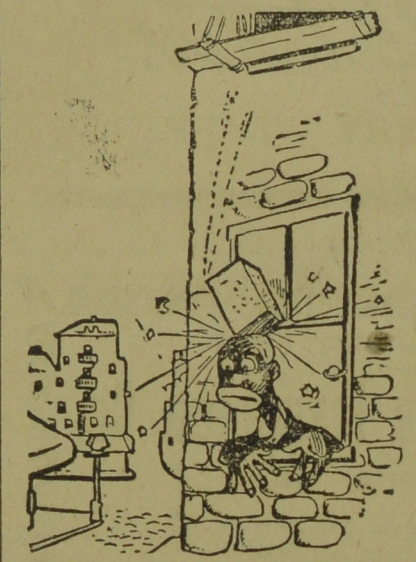
