FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

The Americans won the international cricket match at Ottawa, beating the Canadians by 97 runs.

Rev. A. S. Morton, of the Presbyterian church, St. Stephen, was married Wednesday afternoon at Houlton, Me., to Miss L. C. Cushing. Mr. and Mrs. Morton have left on a trip through Quebec and Ontario.

The French cruiser d'Estress, a magnificent boat of the most modern type, expressly sent to the French Government to salute H. R. H. the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, arrived Wednesday at Quebec.

The Committee of Trial in the investigation of the charges against Rev. Foster McAmmond and Rev. D. C. Sanderson has been called to meet at Smith's Falls, Ont., on Wednesday next to receive the report of the Syracuse commissioner.

In addition to the regular train staff, the following special employees will accompany the royal train, across the continent; one chef and 2 second cooks; 1 pastryman, 2 pantrymen, 3 waiters, 6 porters, 1 operator, 1 electrician, 1 car inspector and 1 dining car inspector.

The Czar and Czarina and their children, the King and Queen of England, the King of Greece and 28 Royal Princes and Princesses, all on one train, arrived at Copenhagen, Denmark, Tuesday from Fredensborg, and were present at a farewell luncheon on board the Russian Imperial yacht Standart.

The citizens of Richmond, Quebec, Thursday witnessed a state of things which has not existed for 23 years, namely, the license system in operation. The three hotels have exchanged ginger ale for the stronger waters, and "old Tom" gin has taken the prominent position in two of the grocery stores formerly occupied by tomato cans and pain-killers.

The Marquis of Anglesey was robbed Tuesday night of jewels valued at £30,000, which were taken from a room at Walsingham House while he was at the theatre. A warrant has been issued for the arrest of a Frenchman named Gault, on suspicion of being the thief. Gault, who has disappeared, had been in the service of the Marquis of Anglesey only three weeks.

Melton Prior, the doyen of English war artist correspondents, the sketcher of a hundred battles, the hero of twenty-four campaigns, and the seven time wounded champion of journalism, arrived at Montreal on Thursday, the representative of the Illustrated London News, for the purpose of sketching and describing the trip of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York through Canada.

Hon Dr Borden, Minister of Militia, has received a cable from Lord Strathcona announcing that Lord Roberts has mentioned in a despatch for distinguished service the following: Major Williams, now in Ottawa, of the R C D; Major Cartwright, Major Forrester, Major Sanders, Northwest Mounted Police; Capt Stairs, of Halifax, and Lieut Borden (deceased), son of Hon Dr Borden, and Lieut Morrison, of Ottawa, and Lieut Mason, of Toronto. Some of the above have been promoted in rank since the war.

Justice of the Peace William Kelly, of Bay City, Michigan, tried and convicted his own angriest person of assault and battery, and thereupon imposed a fine on himself of \$5 or ten days' imprisonment. The Justice rather than go to jail paid his own fine—to himself—and then allowed himself to go free. The case arose out of a pummeling which Kelly administered to Dr. C. A. Stewart, a well known physician, because the latter is said to have stated publicly that President McKinley deserved to be shot. Justice Kelly says he would do the same thing over again, and considers it was worth \$5 to whip any defamer of the President.

Mr. Myeda, a high official of the Japanese Government has been making inquiries of the Canadian Fisheries Depart-

ment respecting the canning industries of the Dominion. He asked for information with respect to the packing of lobsters, crabs, shrimps, sardines, herring and other fish. While Canada possesses the largest lobster fisheries in the world, having over 800 canneries in operation, crabs and shrimps have not hitherto been packed in this country. The so-called sardines found in great abundance on the coasts of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are shipped to the United States canneries and packed there.

The new list not only contains the distribution list of the active militia of Canada, but also a schedule of the war services of officers in the Canadian militia. This list, which is a new feature of the book, will be scanned with much interest. Not only are the campaigns in which these veteran officers served mentioned but the specific actions at which they were present or in which they were active participants.

THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

The Provincial Synod Discusses the Question.

A MOTION IN FAVOR OF THE GOTHENBURG SYSTEM

Brought Forward and Supported
—It Meets with Strong Opposition from the Prohibitionists.

Montreal, Sept. 13.—The Lower House of the Provincial Anglican Synod listened to a lengthy debate yesterday on the advantages and defects of what is known as the Gothenburg system of controlling the sale of spirituous liquors in towns and cities.

The discussion arose over a motion of the Rev. C. L. Ingles, that the Synod take action upon the lines of the Gothenburg system as the best system for the control of the liquor traffic and the promotion of true temperance reform.

This system is one, it may be said, whereby the licenses for the retail and bar sale of spirits are entrusted in the municipality to a trust company composed of shareholders, who, for reasons of philanthropy, have undertaken to manage the bars in the public interest, each shareholder receiving merely a nominal rate of interest for his paid-up capital.

The balance, after the payment of expenses, goes to objects of public utility on the vote of the shareholders. The managers of the bars are servants of the company, and receive a fixed salary for their work, irrespective of the quantity of spirits they may sell, as well as a commission on the sale of non-alcoholic beverages and cooked foods.

C N Vroom, a strong prohibitionist, of St Stephen, New Brunswick, very vigorously attacked Mr Ingles' motion. He spoke for upwards of an hour, and in that time read copious extracts from a great many of the leading Scotch, Irish and English journals, and from the statements of prominent statesmen and ecclesiastics, condemning the system in its entirety. From statistics compiled in Sweden and Norway, where the system had originated, it was shown that drunkenness had increased to a very considerable extent since it had superseded the old condition of affairs, the increase in certain places being as high as 44 per cent. It not only had increased the consumption of liquor, but it had opened the door to all sorts of trickery and questionable methods. In regard to the philanthropic aspect of the case, it had also made the public house an attractive resort for hundreds of young men who could not otherwise be influenced to enter a saloon. The system was, therefore, a dangerous one, and the church had no right to set the stamp of its approval on anything that would encourage, rather than lessen, drunkenness. It was absolutely impossible to suppress an evil by giving it permission to exist.

The Rev. F. G. Scott pointed out that the church would willingly support prohibition if such could be enforced. He believed the system under discussion was the best that had yet been devised for dealing with the evils of the liquor traffic.

The discussion was still in progress at the hour of adjournment.

CRAZED BY A PANTHER.

California Girl is Incurably Mad From a Fright She Received by Meeting One in the Woods.

Berkeley, Cal., Sept. 13.—Pearl Wagner is a raving maniac, haunted by visions of wild beasts ready to spring. She was frightened out of her mind by a panther in the mountains of Trinity and now the physicians say she is incurably mad.

For a while after her return to her home at Peralta park, Miss Wagner seemed to be on the way to regain her reason fully, but last night she suffered a complete relapse and now her case is considered hopeless. She will be removed as soon as possible to a private asylum or some state institution.

A few days ago Miss Wagner was able to give some connected account of the fright that filled her soul when she saw the beast's eyes looking down hungrily into her own, as she rode alone on a mountain trail. Then her friends hoped that the crisis had passed, but late last night the change came and fearful that she might injure herself, it was deemed necessary to strap her to her bed.

Last year Pearl Wagner was in the freshman class at the university, but her highly nervous nature was unable to stand the strain of the work and her health gave way. For the purpose of regaining strength, she went to her father's mine in the mountains of Trinity county, at Coffee Creek. On a day about a month ago, she mounted her horse and started for a long ride to visit some friends. While on the way out she saw a rattlesnake on the road and this unnerved her.

From the disconnected story that she told her relatives it seems that on her way home she met the panther. The beast lay crouching on the bank, level with her eyes, as she rode along. The wicked glare of his glittering eyeballs transfixed her with horror, and started the horse on a mad race for home. Miss Wagner was so frightened that she lost consciousness. She fell on the neck of her horse and how she got to the mine she could not say. Her clothes were torn and her body bruised as from a fall. She raved incessantly.

One of the men rode 30 miles for a doctor and the girl hovered between life and death for several weeks. Then she began to improve a little and she was brought down from the mountains to the home of her sister, Mrs Winfield Schmidt at Peralta park.

"At times she moved about the house and then, strangely enough, she played the piano as though she was perfectly well," said her sister today. "She could not talk, however, without wandering. For the last few nights, when the dogs in the neighborhood barked, she seemed to connect the noise with the cries of the panther in the mountains, and she cowered with fear. The physicians say that it is a most extreme case of fright upon one whose physical condition was not of the strongest."
